

Philip K. Eure is a police oversight consultant who throughout his career has worked on a variety of police accountability and policing issues. He was the first Inspector General for the New York City Police Department (NYPD). Having started up that office, he held the position from 2014 until 2021. Mr. Eure previously started up the District of Columbia's Office of Police Complaints and led its work in investigating, adjudicating and mediating complaints by the public alleging police misconduct, as well as issuing investigative reports and recommendations for improvements at Washington D.C.'s Metropolitan Police Department.

Mr. Eure served from 2008 to 2010 as President of the National Association for Civilian Oversight of Law Enforcement (NACOLE), a non-profit organization of law enforcement oversight agencies and practitioners that works to enhance accountability and transparency in policing and build community trust through citizen oversight.

Prior to his leadership at Washington, D.C.'s police accountability agency, Mr. Eure served for a decade in the Civil Rights Division of the U.S. Department of Justice, first as a Trial Attorney and later as a Senior Trial Attorney. He has also been a panelist and presenter on police oversight issues nationally and in other countries, including Brazil and Canada, and has been quoted in newspapers around the United States as an expert in the field of independent police oversight.

Mr. Eure received his law degree from Harvard Law School and his undergraduate degree in Political Science from Stanford University.
