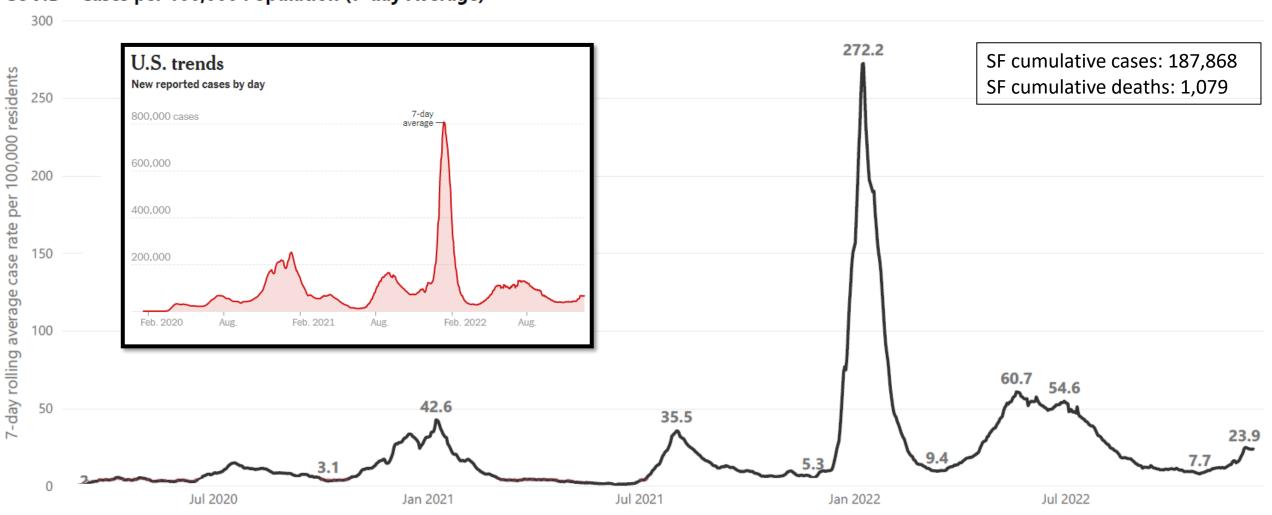


# SF COVID cases per 100,000 residents



### COVID+ Cases per 100,000 Population (7-day Average)

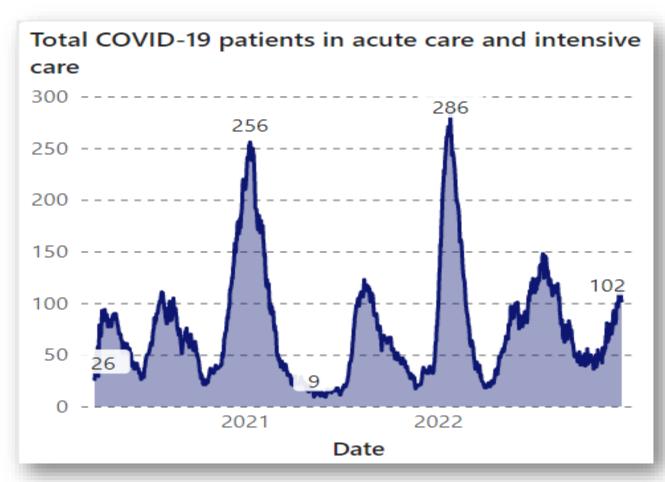

# Bay Area officials push vaccines and caution ahead of holidays

Bay Area health officials are urging residents to get the COVID-19 bivalent booster and the flu shot ahead of the holiday season, noting the region is primed to experience a surge of respiratory infections as people travel and gather indoors. The San Francisco Health Department on Wednesday also encouraged the use of non-pharmaceutical interventions such as masks and rapid tests to help reduce the spread of viruses, including RSV, for which there is currently no vaccine.



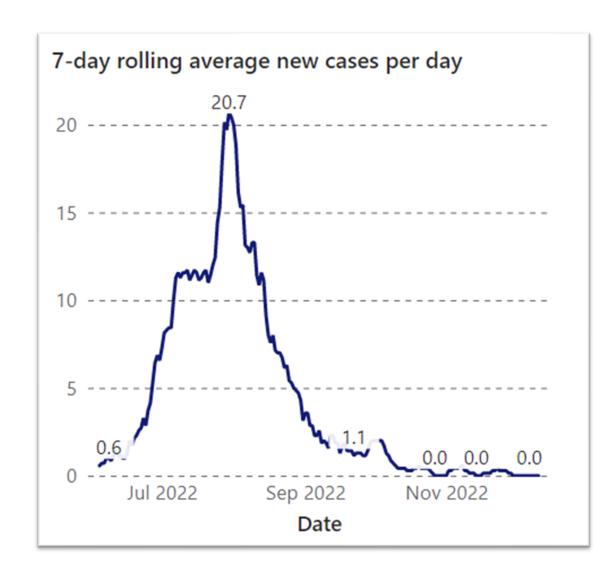


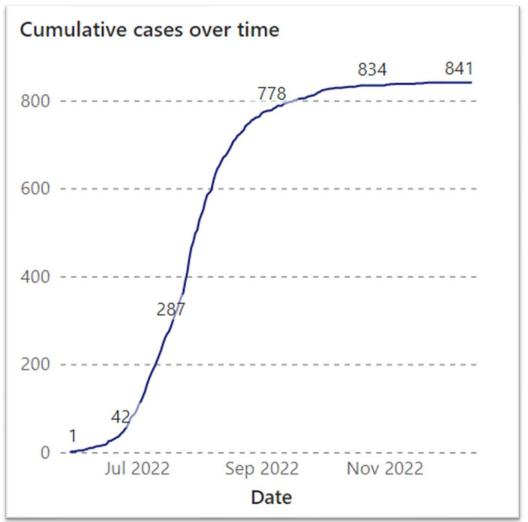
# Community Outreach

- Partnered with SFUSD to provide pop-up flu and bivalent booster vaccinations at school sites in previously identified priority communities.
  - 6 school pop-ups in December and November
  - 7 school pop-ups scheduled in January 2023
- Working with vendors and community partners to ensure continuity in testing and vaccine services in the new year
- Continuing to connect community partners to additional COVID Response resources.
- Last week, held a celebration event and presented Public Health Hero certificates to 20 of our community partners acknowledging their incredible dedication and service to saving our communities.

# Summary



- SF COVID case rates have increased.
  - DPH continues to focus efforts and messaging on improving vaccination/booster rates. This is the best way for individuals to protect themselves from the health impacts of COVID.
- With high levels of flu and RSV cases, we are continuing to closely monitor adult and pediatric hospital bed availability as well as monitoring CDPH communications about hospital capacity, as it is a statewide issue.
- Protect yourself and others this season:
  - Get your bivalent COVID booster if you haven't yet
  - Get your flu shot (sf.gov/flu-vaccines)
  - Protect others—stay home when you're feeling sick
  - Practice good hygiene: wash hands, cover coughs and sneezes, and avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth (flu can spread on surfaces or on your skin)
  - Know how to reach a doctor. If you're not feeling well, they can discuss your symptoms and treatment options.
  - Keep a well-fitted mask on hand for crowded, indoor spaces (N95, KN95 or KF944 are best)
  - Keep a supply of rapid test kits on hand. You can once again receive free test kits through the US mail by visiting www.covid.gov/tests
  - If possible, increase air ventilation or air filtration when indoors or gather outdoors.
- DPH is working with the State to plan for the end of the CA State of Emergency in Feb. 2023
