San Francisco Redistricting Unity Map Coalition

The Unity Map Coalition is made up of organizations and individuals representing low-income communities and people of color across San Francisco.

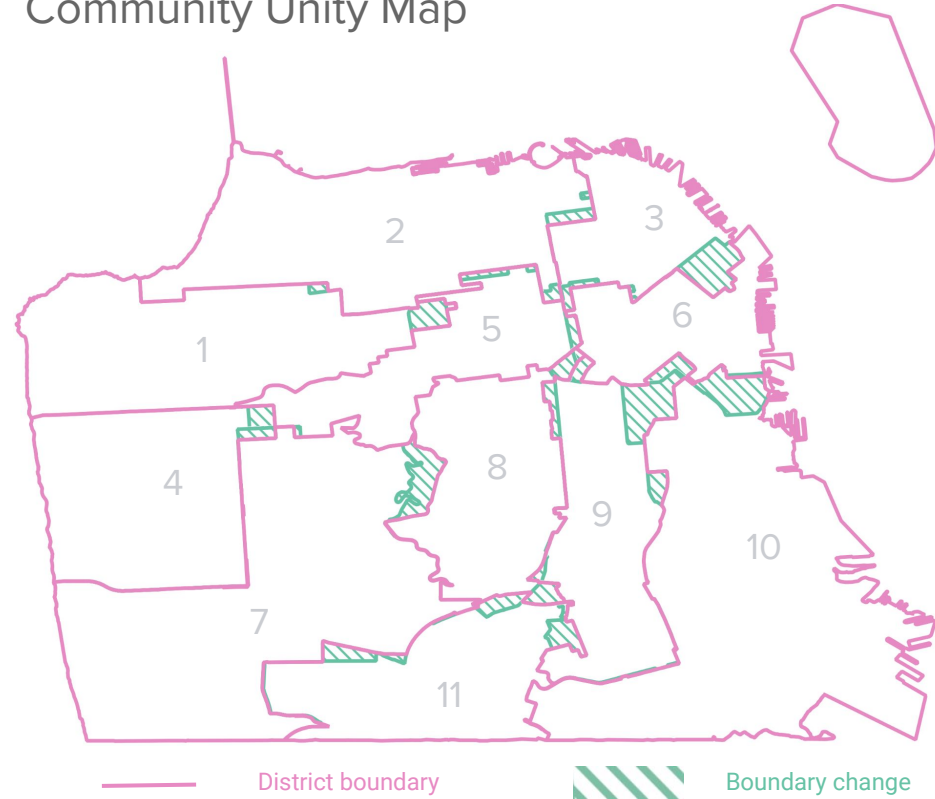
We convened and consulted over 85 organizations across all districts of San Francisco through a communities of interest survey, multi-district stakeholder meetings, one-on-one conversations, tracking public comments at Redistricting Task Force meetings, and a collaborative decision making process since October 2021.

Historically, redistricting has been used to water down the power of low-income communities and communities of color. We decided to come together to ensure that marginalized communities in San Francisco don't get left out of the local redistricting process.

Guiding Principles of Unity Map Coalition

Keep communities of interest, groups of people with shared backgrounds, identities, values, or experiences, together.

Maintain the voice and representation of low-income communities and people of color, including:

- American Indian community
- African American/Black community
- Arab community
- Chinese community
- Filipinx community
- Latinx community
- LGBTQIA+ community
- Pacific Islander community
- Southeast Asian community

Avoid cutting through cultural districts and historical neighborhoods who have long been integral to San Francisco's rich and diverse culture.

Incorporate input from community of interest survey respondents, Community Unity Mapping meetings, & one-on-ones with allied organizations and community members.

Minimize negative impacts on communities that have suffered the most harm from gentrification and borne the brunt of previous redistricting changes.

Fulfill **requirements of the Voting Rights Act** while limiting major district boundary changes.

How will redistricting change the current supervisor districts?

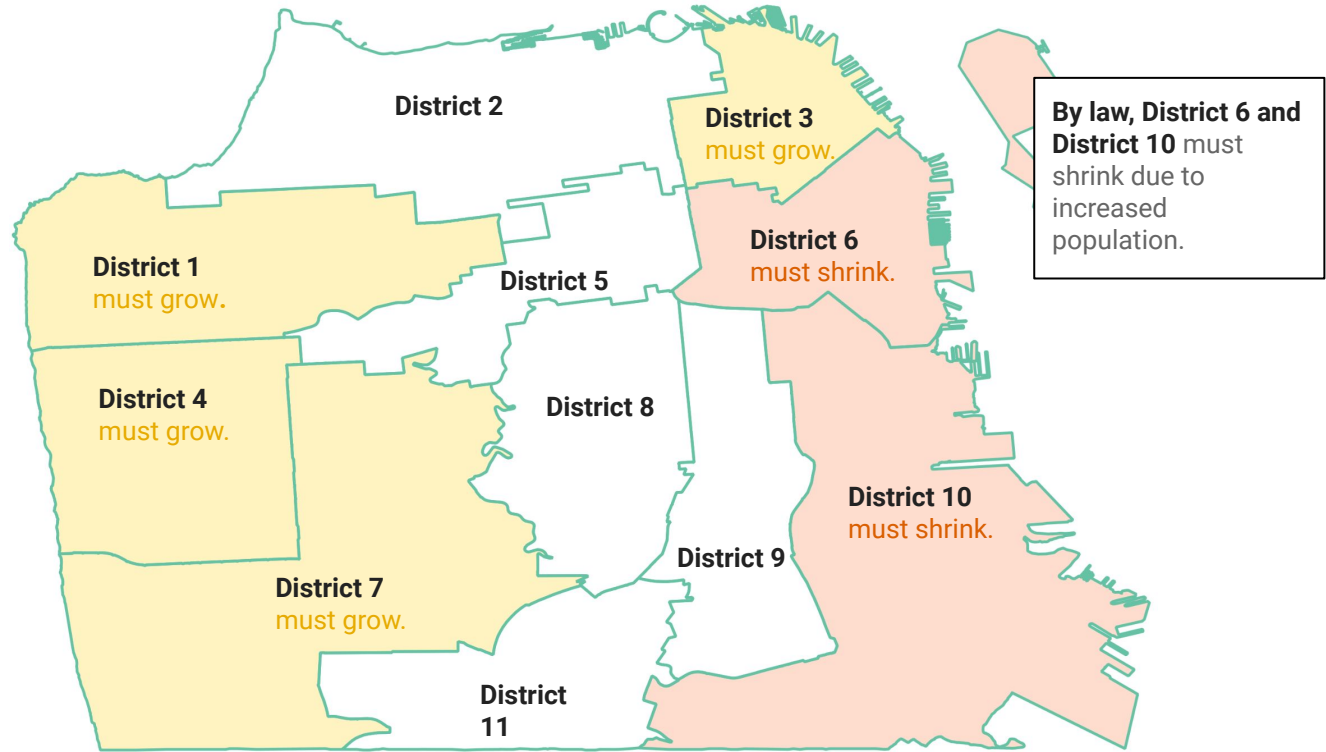
The 2020 census reported an increase of 70,000 people in San Francisco – mostly on the East side.

The current supervisor districts **must change their boundaries** to match the ideal population of 79,545 per district.

The law allows a 5% variation from ideal population, so each district has a range of population to gain or lose.

Which Supervisor Districts Must Change?



By law, which districts must grow by how much?

- District 1 must add at least 2,700 people.
- District 3 must add at least 3,000 people.
- District 4 must add at least 2,800 people.
- District 7 must add at least 130 people.

Which districts must shrink by how much?

- District 6 must remove at least 20,000 people.
- District 10 must remove at least 2,800 people.

What changes are in the Community Unity Map?

This map shows the proposed redistricting lines for the Community Unity Map.

The new districts are drawn with pink lines.

Boundary line changes from the existing supervisorial districts are shaded in green.

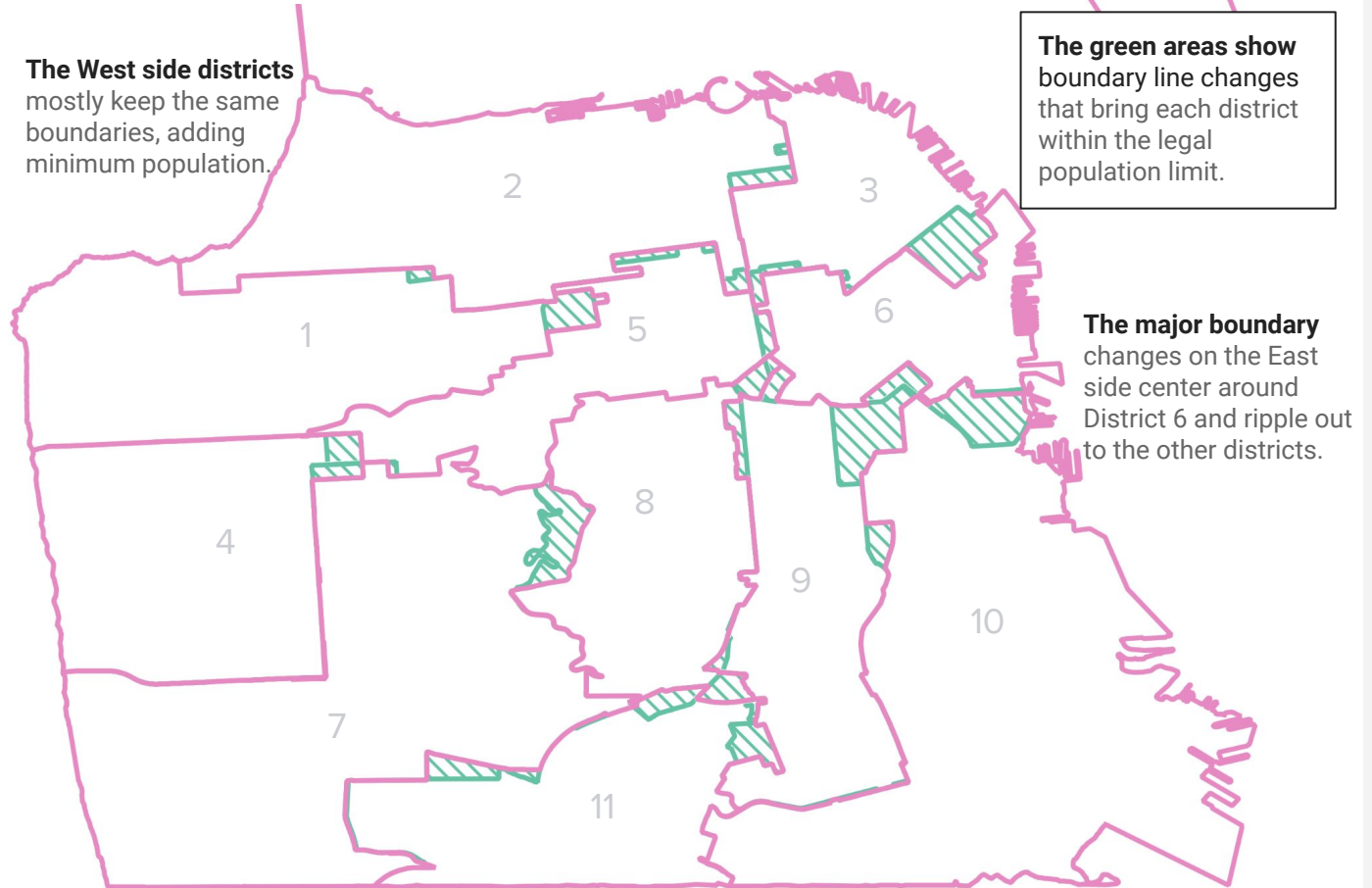

Community Unity Map

The West side districts mostly keep the same boundaries, adding minimum population.

The green areas show boundary line changes that bring each district within the legal population limit.

The major boundary changes on the East side center around District 6 and ripple out to the other districts.

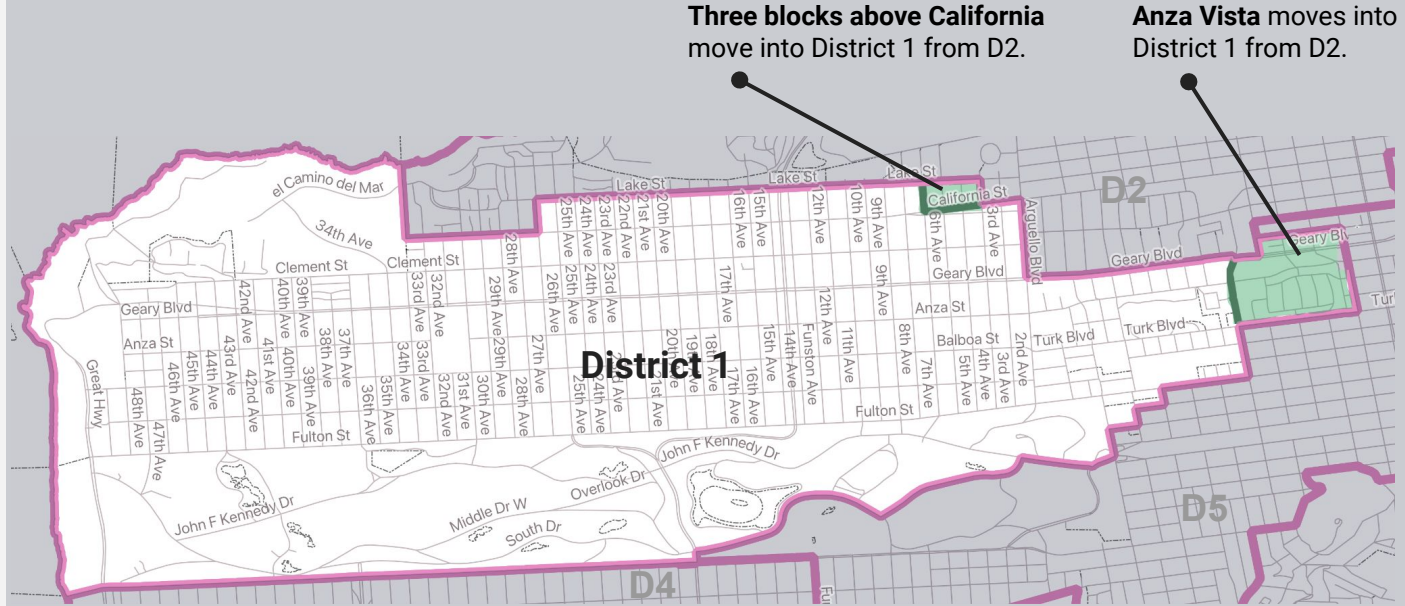

Adds **2,163** residents from Anza Vista (District 2).

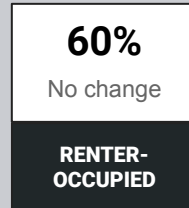
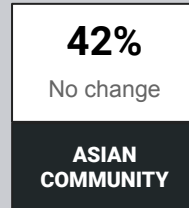
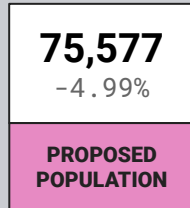
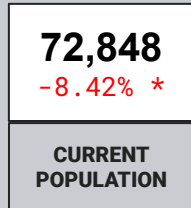
Adds **567** residents from three blocks of California between 3rd and 6th Ave (District 2).

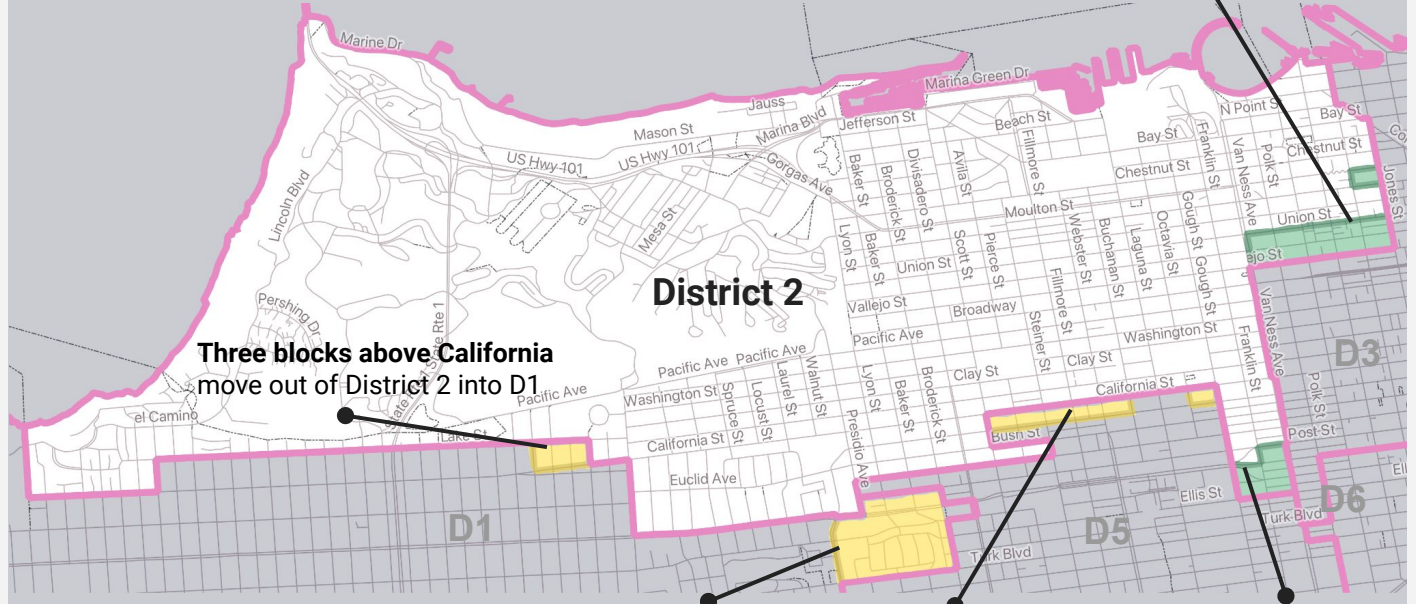
Adds 3,091 residents from Russian Hill to Vallejo and Jones (District 3).

Removes 1,158 residents from Japantown to California and Scott.

Removes 2,163 residents from Anza Vista.

Removes 567 residents from three blocks of California between 3rd and 6th Ave.

What changes are there to District 3?

Adds **8,470** residents from SOMA to Harrison and 2nd (District 6).

Adds **3,500** residents from the Tenderloin above Geary, down to Polk and Turk (District 6).

Removes **3,091** residents from Russian Hill to Vallejo and Jones.

Russian Hill to Vallejo & Jones moves out of District 3 into D2.

Part of SOMA moves into District 3 from D6.

By law, District 3 must grow by 3,094 residents.

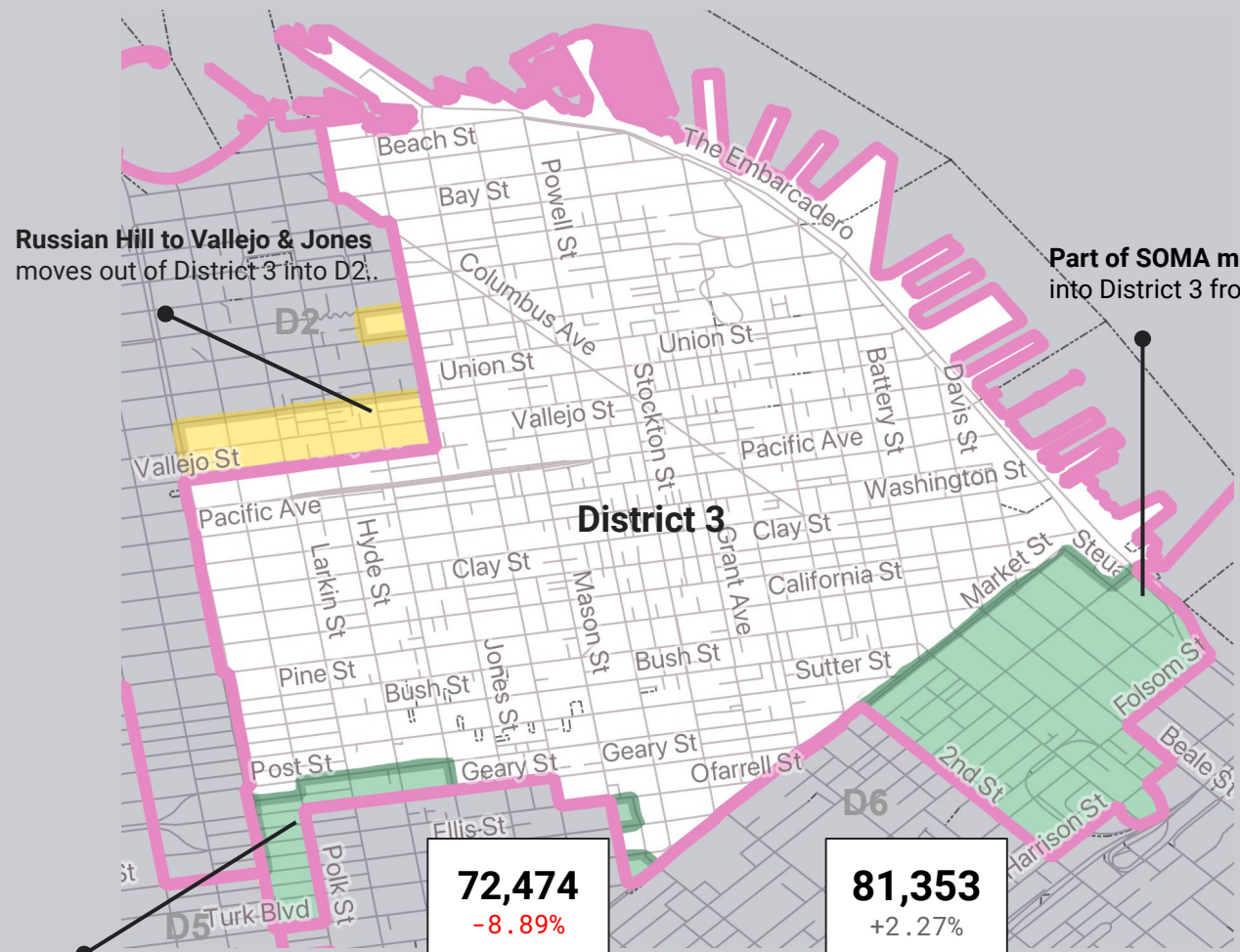

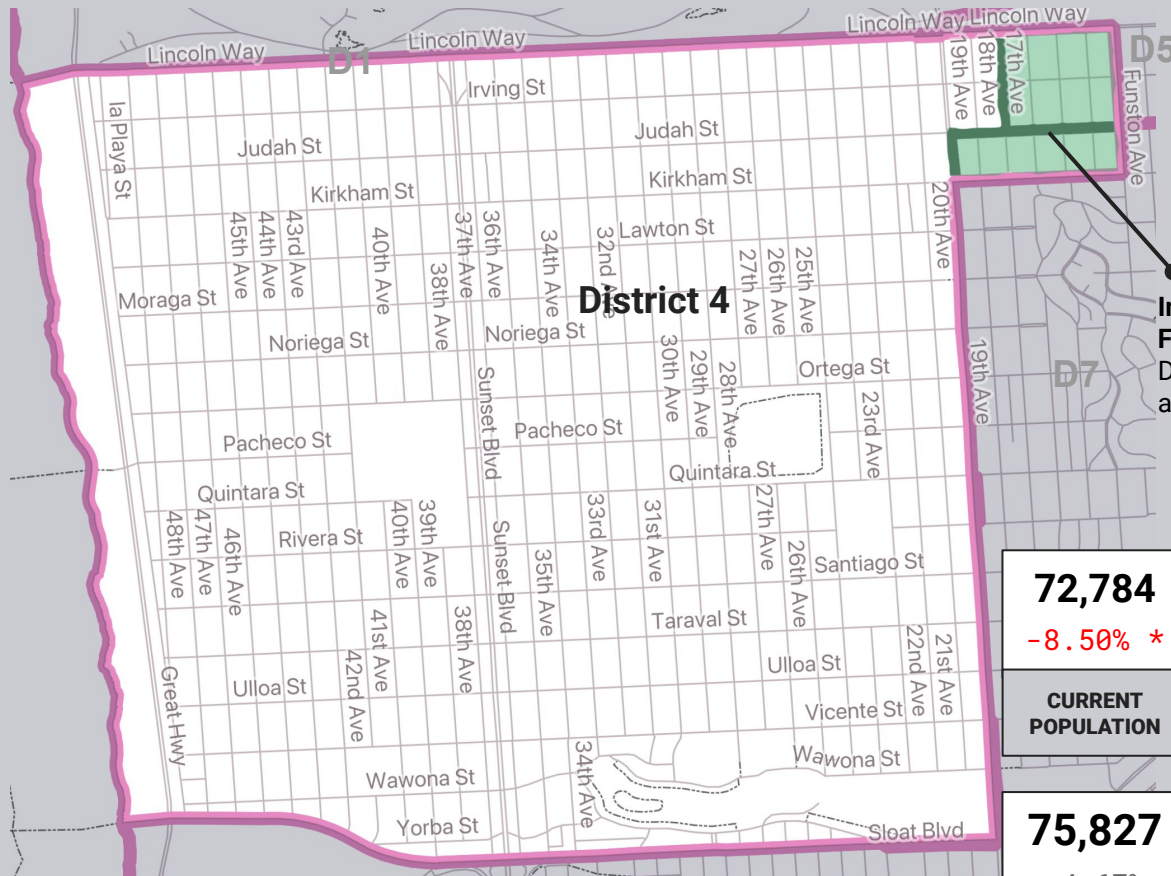

Adds 1,911 residents from Inner Sunset to Funston and Judah (District 5).

Adds 1,132 residents from Inner Sunset to Funston and Kirkham (District 7).



Inner Sunset to Funston moves into District 3 from D5 and D7.

By law, District 4 must grow by 2,784 residents.

What changes are there to District 6?

Removes 8,470 residents from SOMA to Harrison and 2nd.

Removes 3,500 residents from the Tenderloin above Geary down to Polk and Turk.

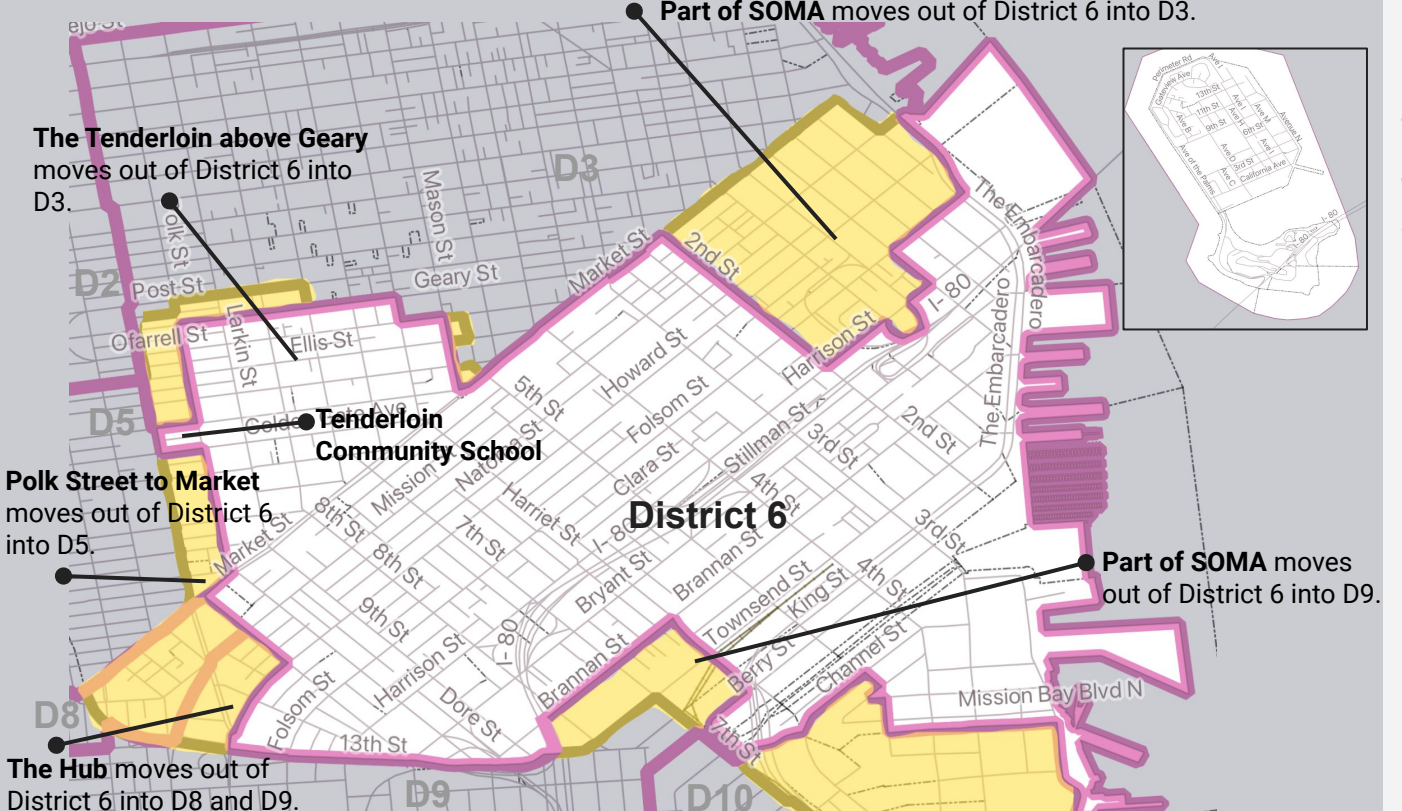
Removes 2,327 residents from Mission Bay to Mariposa and 7th.

Removes 1,500 residents from SOMA to Brannan and 6th.

Removes 2,183 residents from Polk south of Golden Gate.

Removes 2,083 residents from the Hub.

Unity Map keeps Tenderloin and Central SOMA united in District 6.

Adds 2,183 residents from Polk south of Golden Gate to Market (District 6).

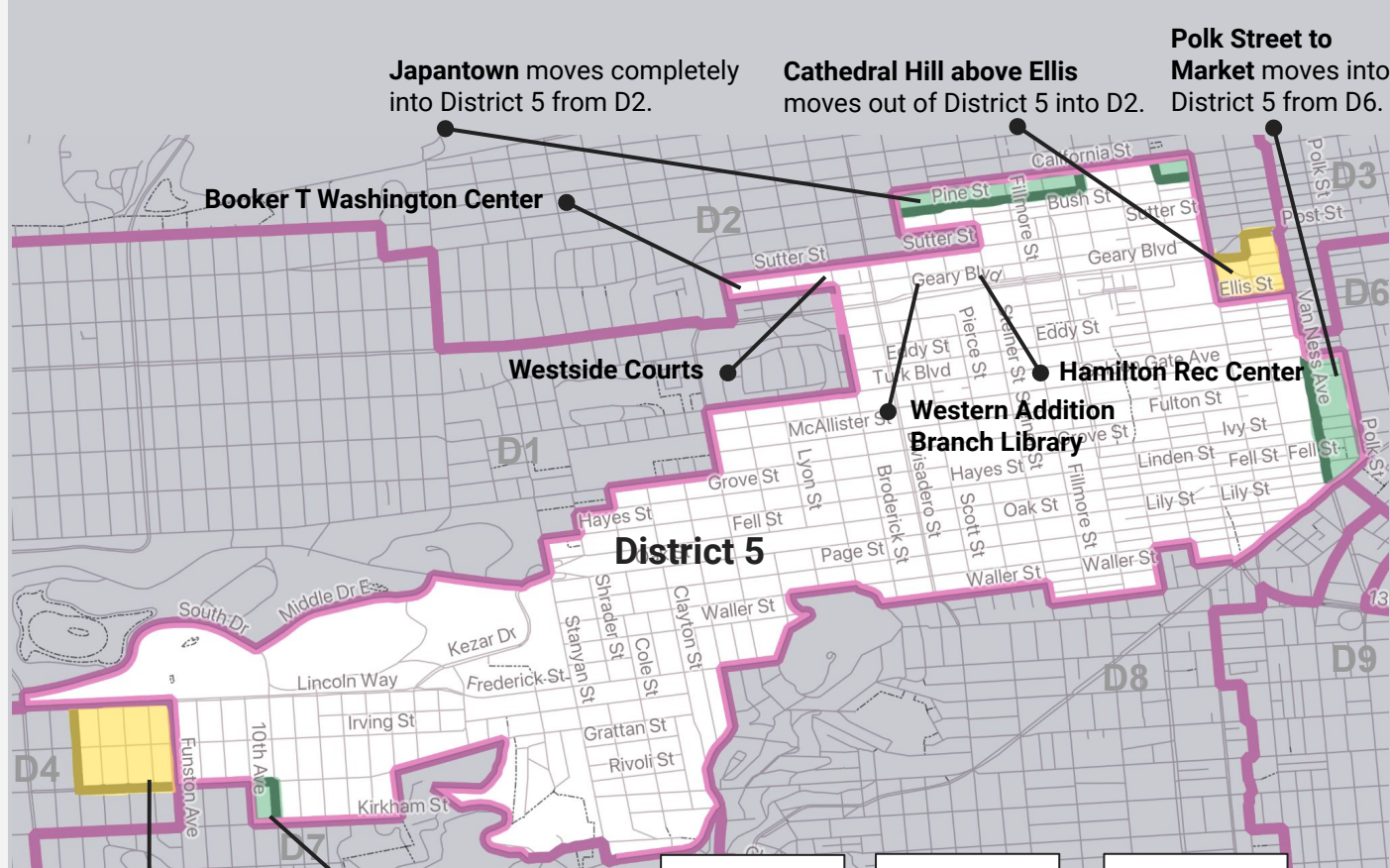
Removes 828 residents from Cathedral Hill above Ellis.

Removes 1,911 residents from Inner Sunset to Funston and Judah.

Adds 185 residents from Inner Sunset to 10th and Kirkham (District 7).

Adds 4,430 residents from Twin Peaks, to Market and Clayton (District 8).

Removes 2,843 residents from the OMI along Ocean Avenue.

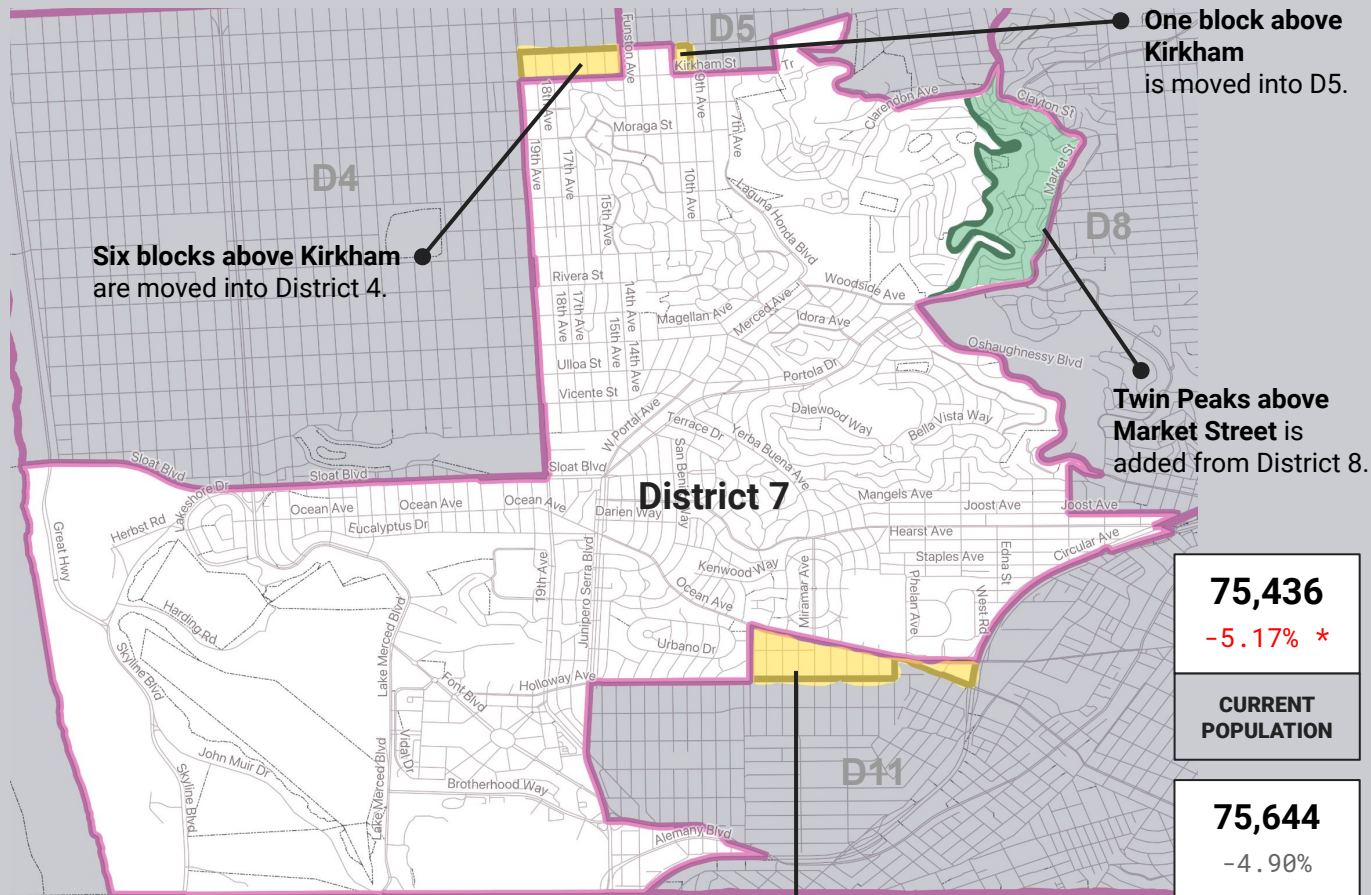
Removes 1,132 residents from Inner Sunset to 19th and Judah.

Removes 185 residents from Inner Sunset to 9th and Kirkham.

By law, District 7 must grow by 132 residents.

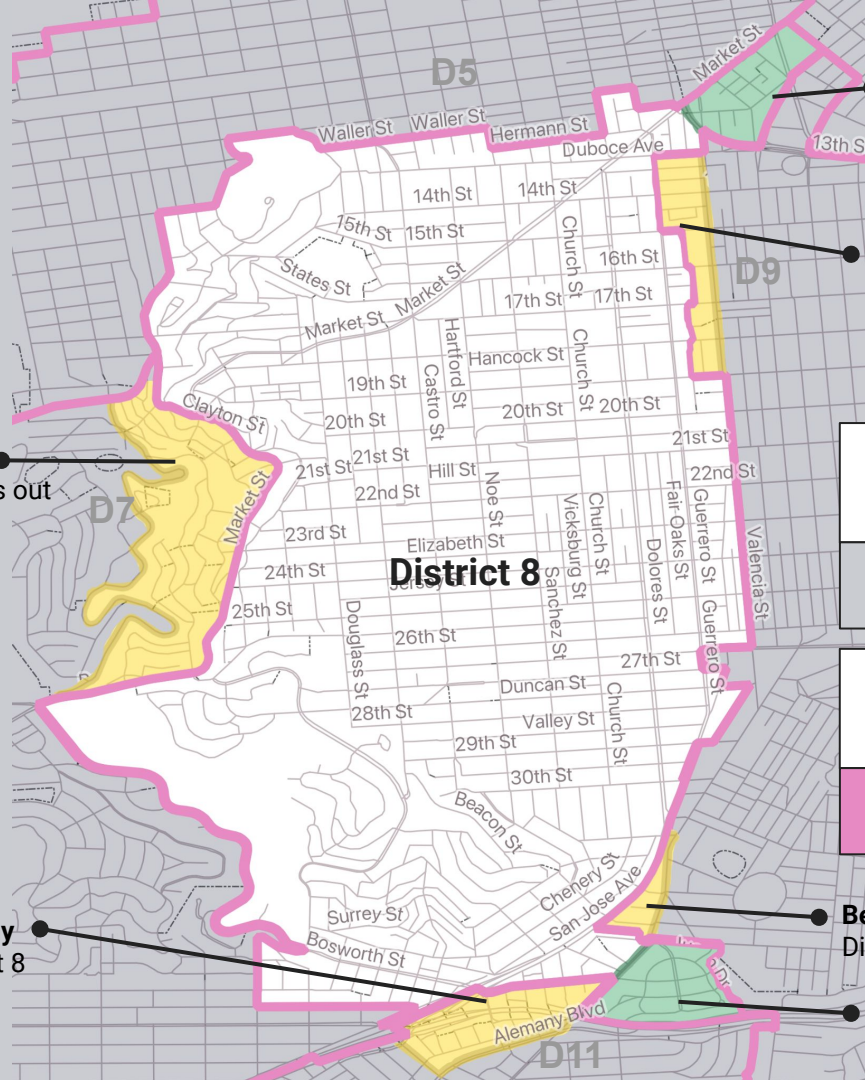

Adds 3,171 residents from Valencia to Guerrero between Duboce and 19th St (District 8).

Adds 3,146 residents from Eastern Mission, bordered by Highway 101 (District 10).

Adds 1,956 residents from the Design District (District 10).

Adds 1,500 residents from Eastern SOMA and **762** residents from the Hub (District 6).

Adds 556 residents from Bernal Cut (District 8)

Removes 1,411 residents from St. Mary's.

Removes 2,552 residents from Portola/Excelsior to Cambridge.

Part of the Hub moves into District 9 from D6.

Valencia to Guerrero from Duboce to 19th moves into District 9 from D8.

Bernal Cut moves into District 9 from D8.

St. Mary's Park moves out of District 9 into D8.

Some blocks of the Portola move out of District 9 into D11.

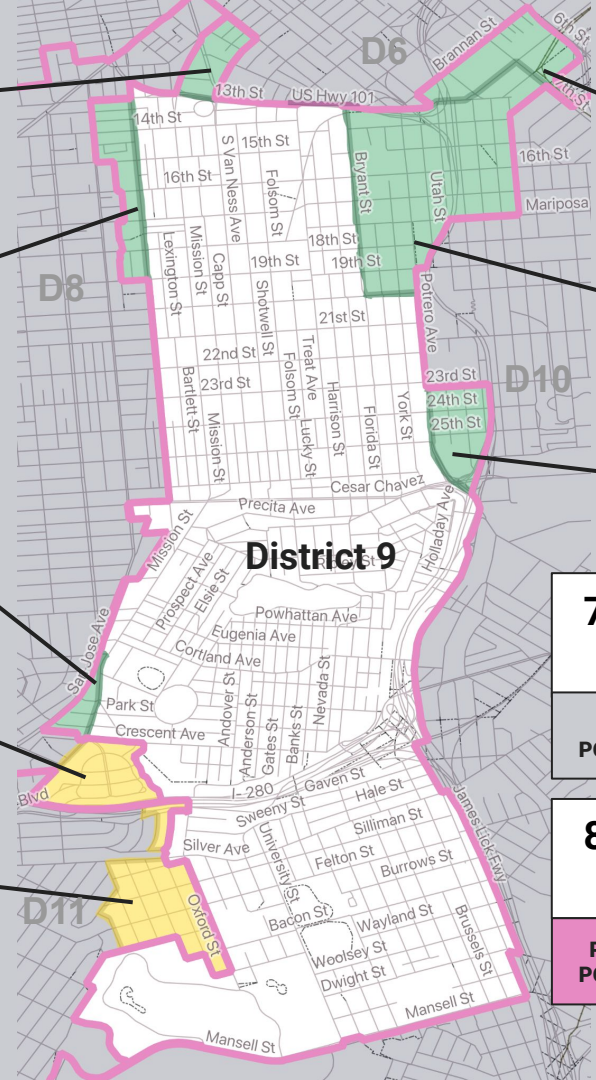

What changes are there to District 10?

Removes 3,146 residents from Eastern Mission, bordered by Highway 101.

Removes 1,956 majority Asian residents from the Design District.

Adds 2,327 residents from Mission Bay/Chase Center (District 6).

By law, District 10 must shrink by 2,801 residents.

Eastern Mission and the Design District moves out of District 10 into D9.

La Raza Park moves into District 9

SF General Hospital stays in District 10

The southern half of Mission Bay moves into District 10 from D6.

Chase Center is moved into D10.

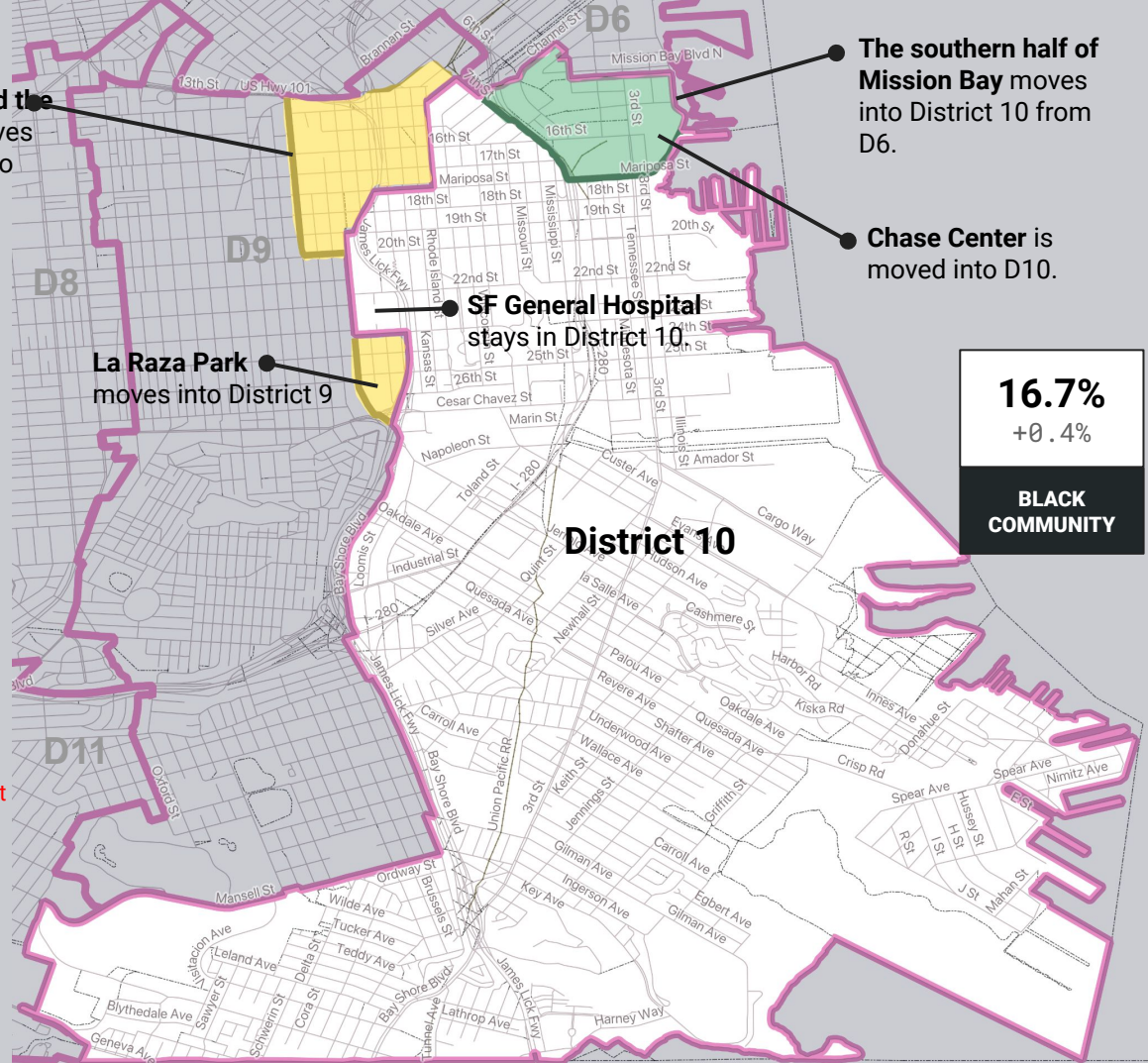

Adds 2,843 residents from the OMI (District 7).

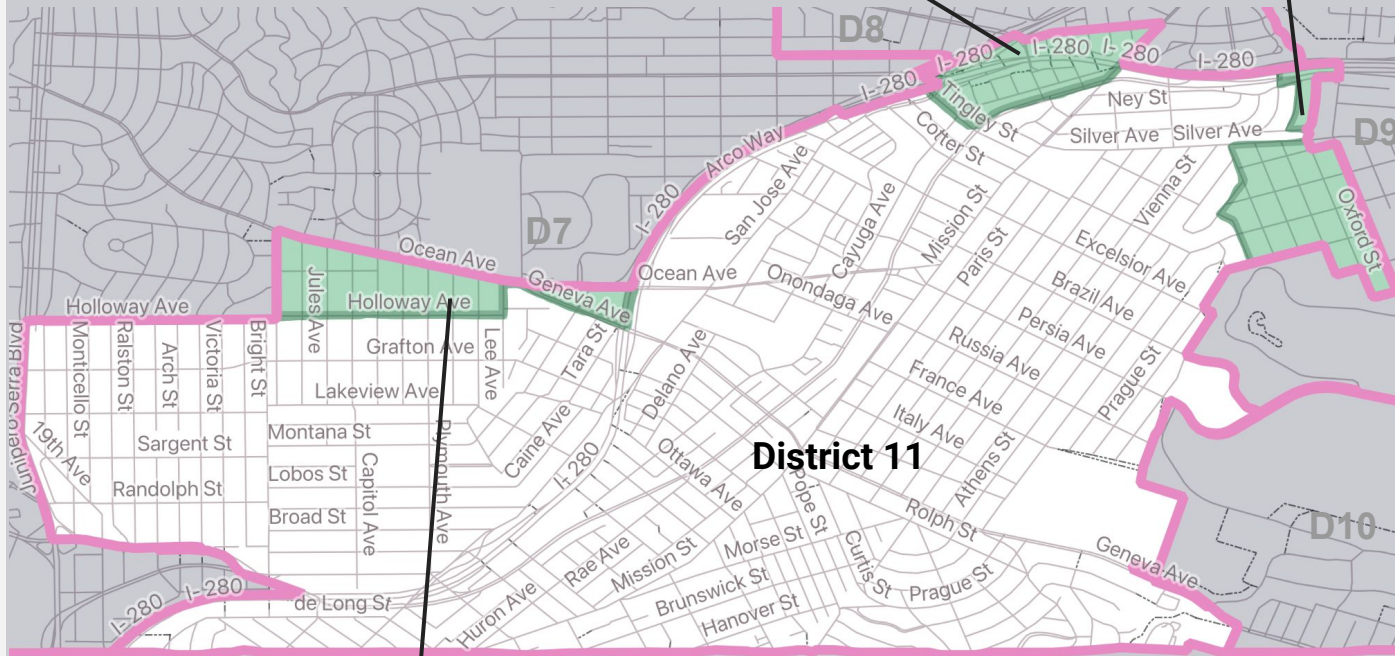
Adds 1,240 residents from Mission Terrace, from Alemany to 280.

Adds 78 residents from Saddleback Drive south of Geneva (District 10).

Bosworth to Alemany moves into District 11 from D8.

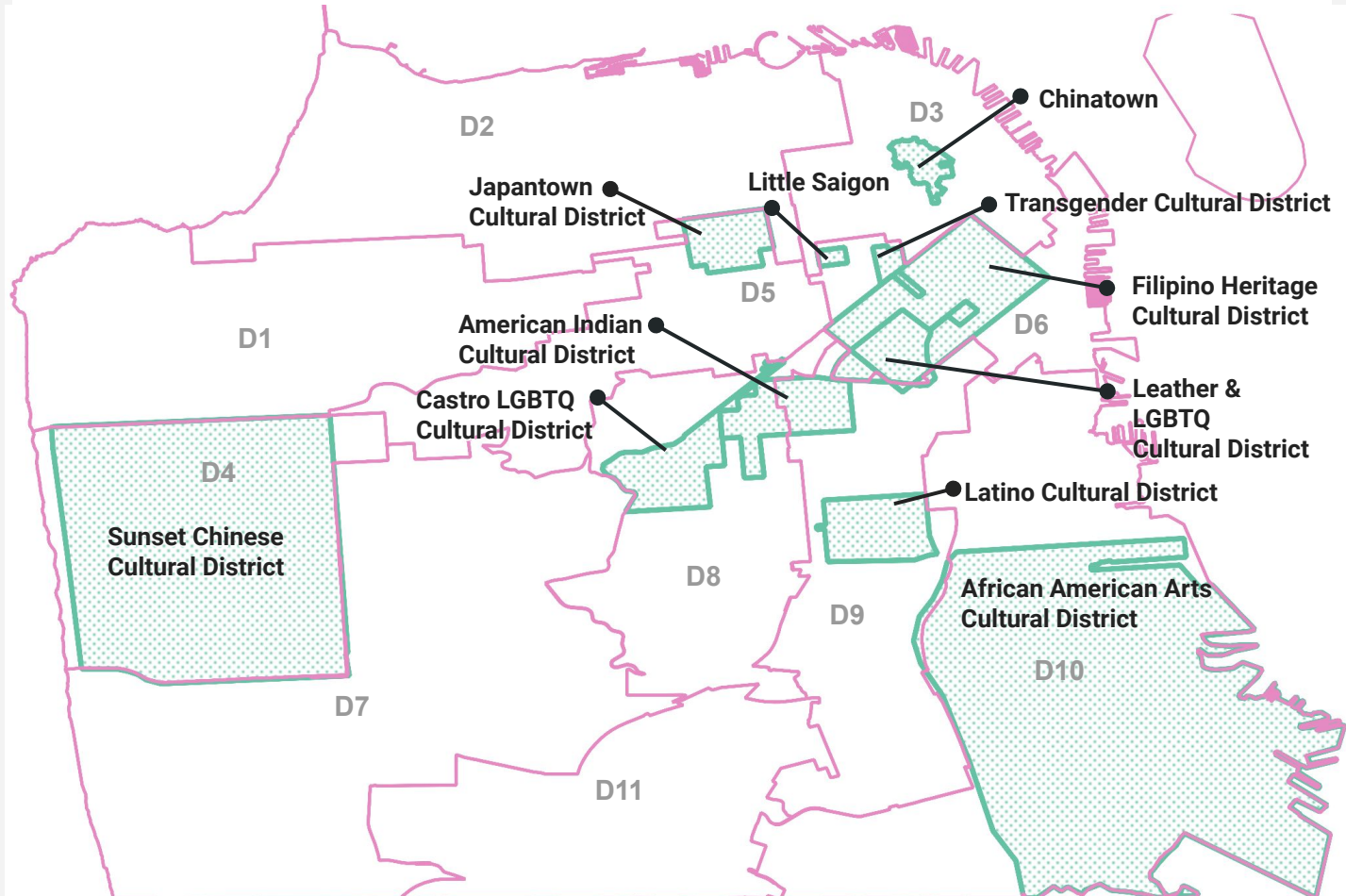

What changes are there to our Cultural Districts?

The Community Unity Map's boundary changes reflect the desires of cultural districts that wanted to be kept whole in one supervisorial district.

District 6, though losing 20,000 population, was able to keep all three cultural districts intact as well as Little Saigon.
