PRIMARY TARGET POPULATIONS

Agreement's Primary Target Groups	UC Citywide Case Management Program supports services to all ethnicities and populations. The services in this program will have a focused expertise to provide culturally congruent services for Black/African American or individuals that identify as Transgender/non-binary. The clients who will be served, are residents of San Francisco with serious mental illness who are high utilizers of psychiatric emergency or acute services, have multiple contacts with street-based behavioral health teams, may be involved with the criminal justice system, are disproportionately experiencing homelessness, and/or other extraneous circumstances that make them vulnerable and in need of care.
Agreement's Primary Target Neighborhood or Area	Residents of the City and County of San Francisco.

Purpose of Agreement:

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The goal of UC Citywide Case Management is to provide field-based, wrap-around, high intensity, high frequency services to mitigate the need for acute care and hospitalization, and to stabilize and transition the clients served to lower intensity clinic-based services within the San Francisco Health Network and other resources as appropriate. Services are primarily field based and include targeted clinical case management, integrated mental health and substance use disorder treatment, medication support services, crisis interventions, and collateral work with family/natural support systems or other service providers. Services integrate peer-based services/individuals with lived experiences, offer culturally congruent care, and prioritize diverse staffing and increased language capacity in the threshold languages. Goal of services is to stabilize, support clients on recovery and wellness goals, live safely in the community, and transition to less intensive care.

The Regents of the University of California, San Francisco was selected under RFGA 7368, Behavioral Health Intensive Case Management Services. The RFP allows for an Agreement of up to 10 years which includes contract options which may or may not be exercised. The services went out to bid to issue additional funding available to expand Intensive Case Management programs along with funding from an existing program that was authorized by a sole source waiver. As it turned out, that existing vendor, did not submit a proposal to continue their services. Therefore, this contract will assume the capacity previously with the prior vendor, as well as the expansion funding. The funding is a mixture of General Funds, realignment, MHSA, and MediCal funds. The start date of this contract was November 1, 2023. The contract is retroactive due to delays in receiving contract documents from the vendor largely due to this being a new service. There were also delays in coordinating approval by the City Attorney as many of our contracts were transferred to different approvers in their office.

Monitoring Report/Program Review & Follow-up:

This Agreement will receive annual monitoring through the DPH Business Office of Contract Compliance (BOCC), including for performance and fiscal stability.

Health Equity and Inclusion Compliance:

The Vendor will provide the necessary information to comply with the Department's Office of Health Equity (OHE) requirements and will work collaboratively to remove systemic and operational barriers that impede providing appropriate levels of services to meet the needs of disadvantaged BIPOC stakeholders and communities.
