#### PRIMARY TARGET POPULATIONS

Agreement's Primary Target Groups	The Citywide CARE Court is specifically tailored to meet the needs of individuals that meet the legal criteria of the Welfare and Institutions code (WIC) under the CARE Act. These are adults who are severely mentally ill and have a diagnosis in the schizophrenia spectrum and other psychotic disorder class that are not engaged in treatment, at risk of deterioration in the community and subsequent psychiatric crisis contacts and determined to meet legal criteria for the Community Assistance, Recovery, & Empowerment (CARE) Act by the Department of Public Health.
Agreement's Primary Target Neighborhood or Area	Residents of the City and County of San Francisco.

### **Purpose of Agreement:**

The Citywide Community Assistance, Recovery, & Empowerment (CARE) Court Team aims to deliver comprehensive intensive case management (ICM) to adults who are severely mentally ill and have a diagnosis in the schizophrenia spectrum and other psychotic disorder class who have voluntarily agreed to services, entered into a Care Agreement or have been court ordered to participate CARE Court. The primary objective of the program is to offer intensive outpatient support to individuals with the aim of enhancing their quality of life, reducing the likelihood of further psychiatric hospitalizations and incarcerations, and facilitating their access to appropriate ongoing treatment services. Through personalized CARE plans and dedicated support, the program endeavors to empower individuals to manage their mental health challenges effectively and to facilitate their integration into suitable CARE pathways for sustained treatment and support.

Clients receive services both at the Citywide Office, on Mission Street, and in the community. Clients are assisted in attending appointments, access social services, and participating in psychosocial program within Citywide. The focus of Citywide CARE Court is on supporting individuals who are not engaged in treatment, at risk of deteriorating mental health in the community, and potentially facing psychiatric crisis situations. These individuals are identified and determined to meet the legal criteria for CARE Court by the Department of Public Health. In addition to addressing the clinical needs of participants, Citywide CARE Court is designed to be culturally and linguistically responsive to the diverse communities of San Francisco. This means that the program considers the cultural backgrounds, beliefs, and languages spoken by participants, ensuring that services are accessible and appropriate for all individuals involved. By providing targeted support to individuals who meet the legal criteria for CARE Court and incorporating cultural and linguistic considerations into its approach, Citywide CARE Court aims to improve

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outcomes for participants, reduce psychiatric crises, and enhance overall community wellbeing. The team will be comprised of a part-time psychiatrist, a clinical supervisor, 3 licensed clinicians, and a nurse; a total of 5.39 FTE.

The start date of this contract is May 1, 2024. The contract is retroactive due to delays in receiving contract documents from the vendor largely due to this being a brand-new service. There were also delays in coordinating approval by the City Attorney as many of our contracts were transferred to different approvers in their office.

#### **Monitoring Report/Program Review & Follow-up:**

This Agreement will receive annual monitoring through the DPH Business Office of Contract Compliance (BOCC), including for performance and fiscal stability.

### **Health Equity and Inclusion Compliance:**

The Vendor will provide the necessary information to comply with the Department's Office of Health Equity (OHE) requirements and will work collaboratively to remove systemic and operational barriers that impede providing appropriate levels of services to meet the needs of disadvantaged BIPOC stakeholders and communities.
