The Juvenile Probation Department would like to direct your attention to the following slides from the September 2024 Monthly Data Report:

JH Charts 4.1 & 4.2: Admissions to Juvenile Hall (slides 17 & 18)

- There were 26 admissions to Juvenile Hall in September, about the same as the YTD average of 27.
- 81% of admissions were mandated by state law, and the remaining 19% were for felony firearm offenses and no non-secure options available.

JH Chart 1.2: Average & Peak Population in the Juvenile Justice Center (slide 7)

- In September, the ADP in the Juvenile Justice Center increased to 26 youth, however, that was 10% lower than the 2024 YTD average of 29 youth. The peak population was 32 youth.
- 30% of the September ADP was youth who had been committed to Juvenile Hall or Secure Track.

PS Chart 1: Referrals to Probation & Diverted Referrals (slide 22)

- There were 64 referrals to JPD in September, 14% lower than the YTD average.
- 72% were felonies (34% were 707(b) offenses), 16% were misdemeanors, and 13% were warrants/probation violations.
- Five referrals were diverted: 2 were counseled or referred & closed and 3 were diverted to CARC.

PS Chart 2.1: Probation Active Caseload (slide 25)

There were 348 youth on active caseload as of September 30, 10% lower than the 2024 YTD average.
