




Assistance	Amount
Move-In Assistance for housing outside the San Francisco HRS, including deposits and first month's rent	\$814,373
Furniture, such as a bed, if reasonable and directly linked to a housing resolution	\$140,749
Travel and relocation support outside of San Francisco that will result in a housing connection - airline, train or bus ticket	\$123,939



## Family Shelter & Housing Update: Safer Families Plan

### **Rapid Rehousing**


- Expanding four family rapid rehousing agreements
  - All will be taking referrals by March 2025, with the first taking referrals as early as November 2024
  - Total of 130 Safer Family Plan slots across four providers
- ► 50 TAY RRH vouchers; intent to award announcement in December.

### **Shallow Subsidy for Families**

- Mission Neighborhood Centers (September HOC) began taking referrals in October 2024
  - 2 families have been placed into housing
- → Referrals through Coordinated Entry and transfers from the family rapid rehousing program as they stabilize in housing following the 24–36-month program


### **180 Jones St Grand Opening**



- ► In November HSH join Tenderloin Neighborhood Development Corporation, California Department of Housing & Community Development & the San Francisco Mayor's Office of Housing and Community Development in celebrating the opening of 180 Jones.
- → This new affordable housing, previously a parking lot, brings 70 100% affordable homes for low-income residents, 35 of which will be reserved for people exiting homelessness.





## 2024-2025 Interfaith Winter Shelter Program: Now Open



- November 25, 2024, through March 30, 2025
- →Open to single adults for selfreferral daily from 6pm to 7am.
- ► Partnership with Episcopal Community Services, San Francisco Interfaith Council, and many host church sites.

## Shelter System Process Improvements

- Call down the list: After reservation specialists call all the people at the top of the waitlist during the 10am-noon reservation window, they call down the rest of the list until they fill their beds prior to ending the reservation window.
- ► Change eligible ratio: Reservation specialists offer shelter beds to people at the top of the waitlist at a 3:1 ratio. This means for every shelter bed available they move 3 people to the top of the list. We increased the ratio of moving people to the top to a 4:1 ratio.
- ► ONE System: HSH moved the waitlist beds into the ONE system, where HSH can better track bed utilization and other placement data.
- Reallocation of Shelter Waitlist: HSH offers beds that do not get used by reservation specialists on a given day to outreach teams to utilize.

### **Adult & Family Shelter Waiting Lists**

### Family Shelter Waiting List

There are currently 498 families on the waiting list. 74 of these families are in an HSH-funded, congregate or time-limited family shelter.

124 families joined the waiting list in October 2024.

Average time on waiting list = 48 days (for families who accepted placement offers)

In October 2024, 27 families were placed into non-congregate shelter from the list.

### Adult Shelter Waiting List

There are currently 316 people on the waiting list.

569 people joined the waiting list in October 2024.

Average time on waiting list = 11 days (for people who accepted placement offers)

In October 2024, 149 people were placed into shelter from the reservation system.

## Candlestick Vehicle Triage Center (VTC) – Winddown

#### Challenges


- 132 households served and 37 vehicle repairs
- 26 households exited the VTC to housing
- High-cost program with limited success
- Assessibility challenges

#### Fall/Winter 2024

- Winddown begins
- HSH stopped new intakes
- Community meeting with guests and beginning of working closely with each guest to identify housing solutions and we will offer alternative placements for all guests

#### Spring 2025

- Facilitate client placements
- All guests will have received an offer of shelter or housing.
- Site closure



### Cova Closure

- ← Closing the program by Spring 2025
- ← ECS staff notified on November 22<sup>nd</sup>
- All guests will be assessed for housing and provided the support needed to get document ready.
- → All guests will be offered housing or alternative shelter.

## **Legislative Update**

### Upcoming Legislation in December:

#### **Introductions**

Grant Agreement Amendment – Episcopal Community
 Services – Adult Rapid Rehousing

#### Hearings

- Grant Agreement Amendments:
  - St. Vincent de Paul MSC South Shelter
  - Compass Urgent Accommodation Vouchers for Families and Pregnant People
  - HomeRise 5th and Harrison Transitional Housing
- 1174 Folsom Ground Lease and grant agreement with Abode Property Management

### Legislation heard in November:

- Amendments to the Shelter Standards of Care
  - Amended Admin Code Article VII Chapter 20 with updates from HSH and the Shelter Monitoring Committee including:
    - Allowing the Committee to focus their efforts on investigating shelters that are out-of-compliance or receive multiple complaints,
    - Expand criteria for Seat 1 (currently vacant); and
    - Update programmatic terms and reflects the transition of the Committee from DPH to HSH and HOC.



## Legislative Update: Family Rapid Rehousing

 On October 22, 2024, Supervisors Ronen, Peskin and Walton introduced an <u>Ordinance</u> proposing to make it City policy to provide up to 5 years of rapid rehousing assistance to any eligible family household enrolled in city-funded rapid rehousing programs, and require an annual hearing and report at the <u>Homelessness Oversight Commission</u> on the implementation of this proposed policy.

#### Proposed Ordinance Details:

- Applies to Family Rapid rehousing
- Applies to both HSH and HSA funded rapid rehousing programs
- Applies to all funding sources (OCOH, GF, Federal (CoC) and State (CalWorks)

#### Fiscal Impacts:

- The proposed legislation would require new funding to implement.
- HSH estimates implementation could cost between \$19.7 million and \$32 million for both HSH and HSA, depending on the number of households eligible for extensions up to 5 years.

#### Legislative Process:

 The proposed legislation was heard at the Rules Committee on November 18th, and is expected to be heard by the Full Board on December 3rd and December 10th.

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






## Adult Shelter Waiting List Metrics: People Active on the List Over Time
