Subject: Slides to highlight from the October 2024 Monthly Data Report, prepared for the 12/11/24 Juvenile Probation Commission meeting

The Juvenile Probation Department would like to direct your attention to the following slides from the October 2024 Monthly Data Report:

JH Charts 4.1 & 4.2: Admissions to Juvenile Hall (slides 17 & 18)

- There were 22 admissions to Juvenile Hall in October, 19% lower than the YTD average of 27.
- 82% of admissions were mandated by state law.

JH Chart 1.2: Average & Peak Population in the Juvenile Justice Center (slide 7)

- In October, the ADP in the Juvenile Justice Center increased to 29 youth, the same as the 2024 YTD average. The peak population was 33 youth.

JH Chart 3.1: Average Length of Stay for Detained Youth Released (slide 14)

- In October, the median length of stay for detained youth released increased to 9 days.

PS Chart 1: Referrals to Probation & Diverted Referrals (slide 22)

- There were 80 referrals to JPD in October, 8% higher than the YTD average.
- 13 referrals were diverted: 11 were counseled or referred & closed and 2 were diverted to CARC.

PS Chart 5.1 & 5.2: Active Warrants by Type & Age of Warrant (slides 39 & 40)

- While the number of warrants has trended downwards for the past 6 months, the average age of warrants has been increasing steadily.
- In October, the mean age of active warrants was 278 days, and the median age was 308 days.
