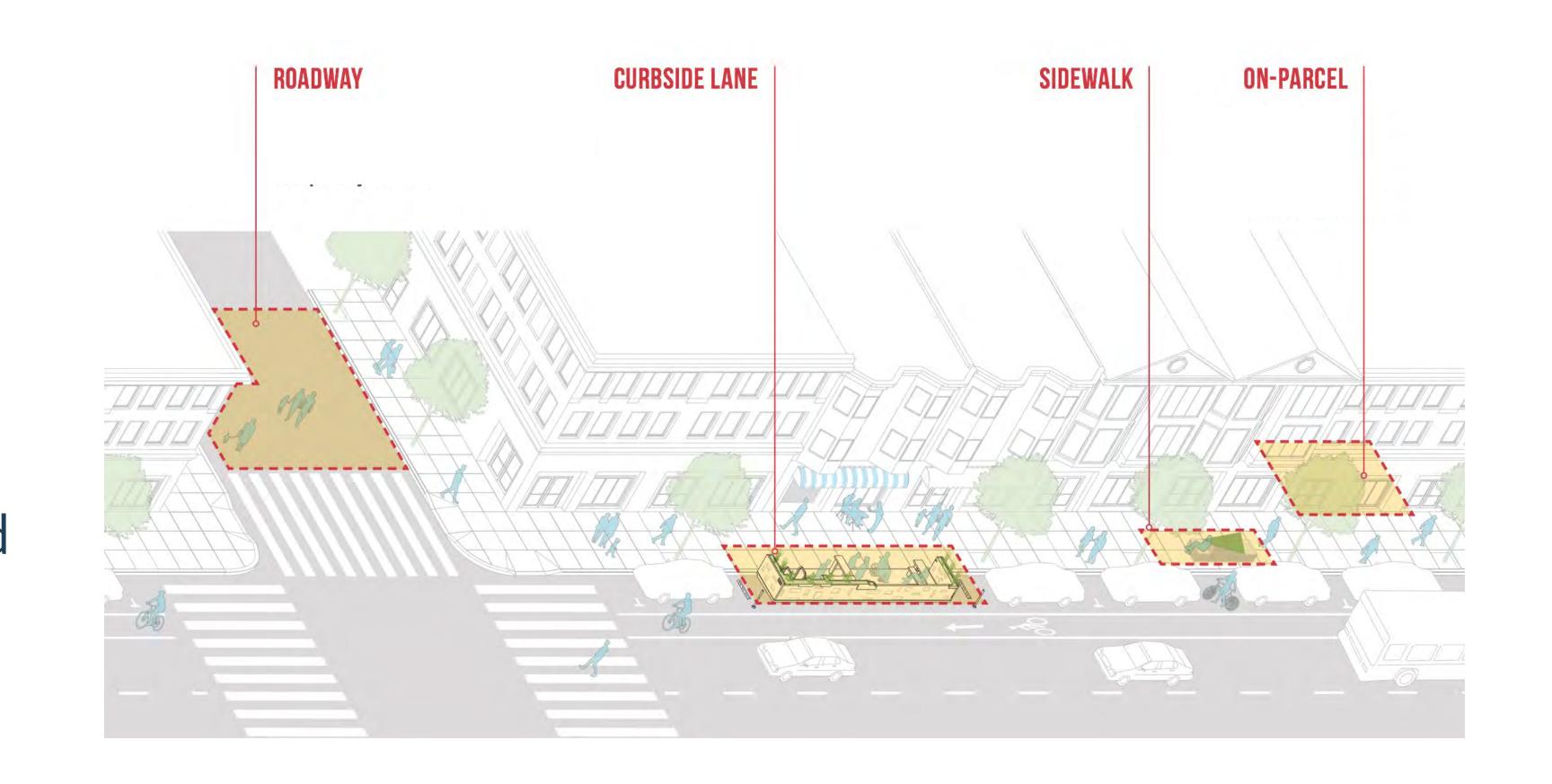

- > Shared Spaces allows local businesses to apply to temporarily use public spaces near their business to operate outside.
- Keep people safe by conducting business outside where virus transmission is more difficult than inside
- > Help businesses survive and recover after a period of extreme difficulty, preserving the economy, employment, and tax base
- > Contribute to a vibrant, interesting street life

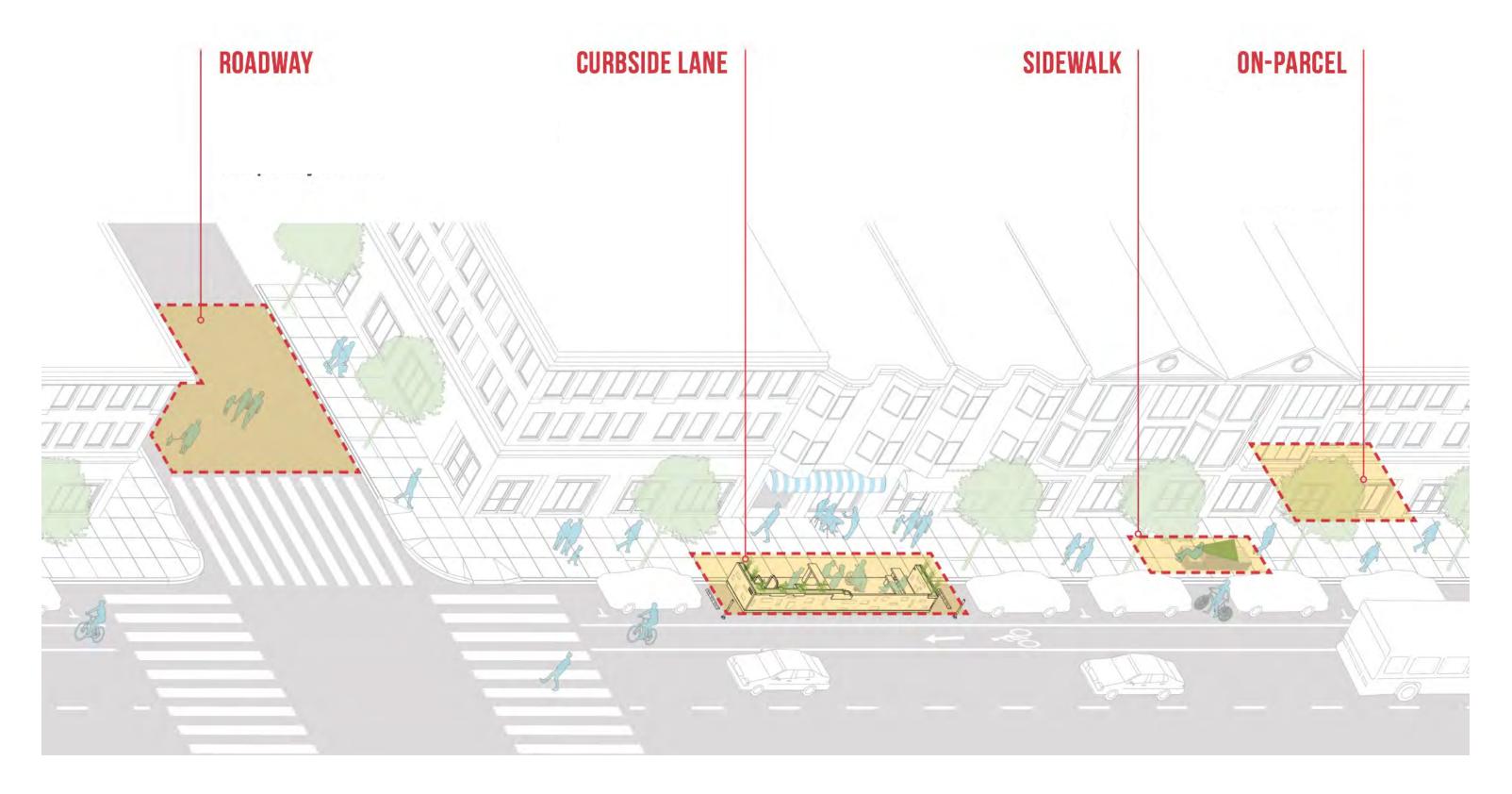

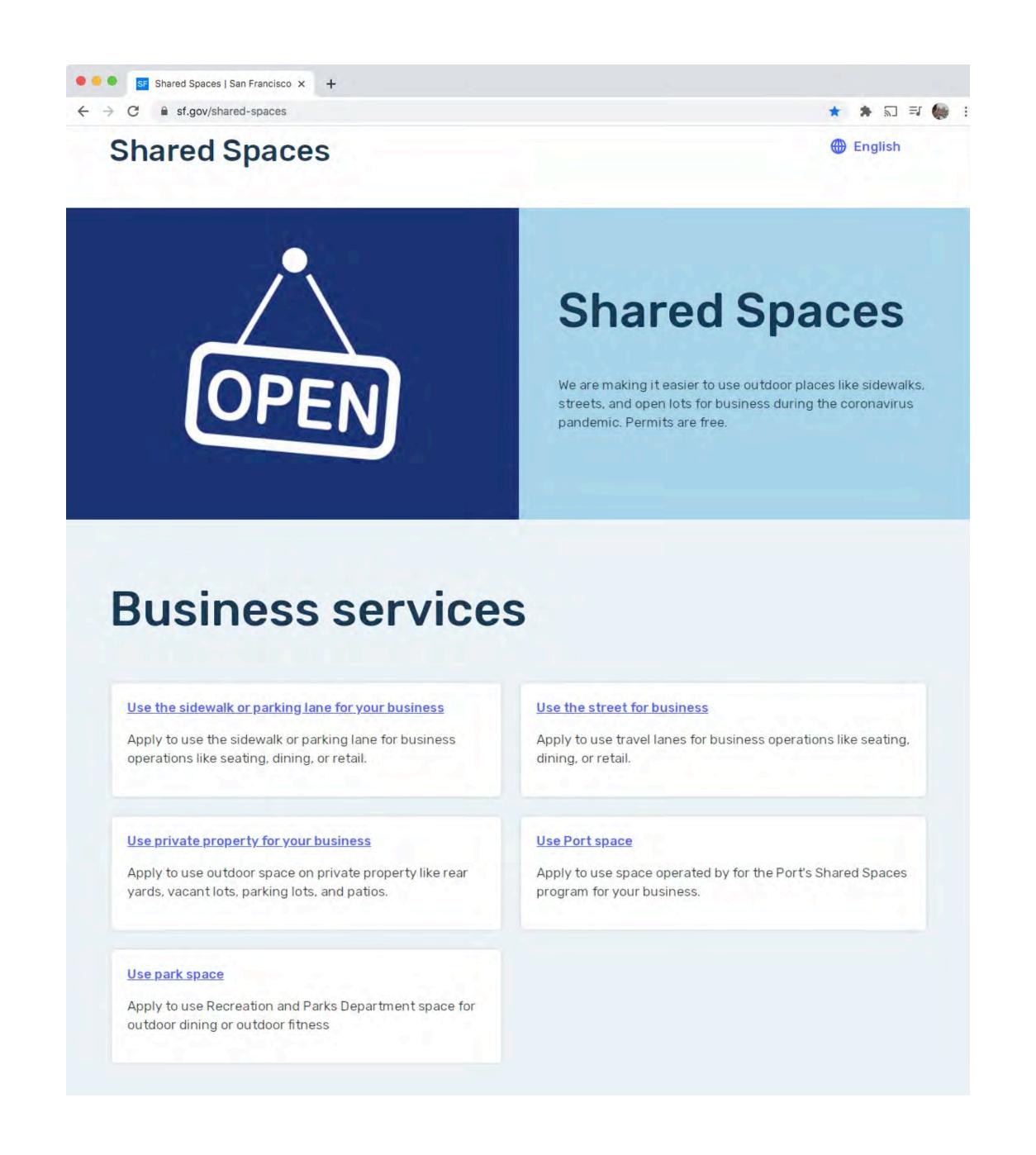








- Permits will not have any associated fees
- Application and program details available at sf.gov/sharedspaces
- Permit expiration tied to end of State of Public Health Emergency





- > Business is expected to:
 - O Identify location(s)
 - O Self certify compliance with rules
 - O Provide furniture and barriers
 - O Operate as Good Neighbors

- Insurance: \$1m in general commercial liability + workers comp
- A business can occupy the sidewalk or the curbside lane in front of a neighboring business with written permission of that business owner



Supporting San Francisco by allowing neighborhood businesses to temporarily use the sidewalk and street space for safe economic recovery



Wear a face covering

Stay 6 feet apart

Streets, sidewalks, and parklets must remain publicly accessible.



Updated 7/13/2020

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- > Enforcement is complaint driven.
- Report concerns or issues to 311
- Permits are temporary, can be modified and revoked at any time if permit holder does not comply, or if emergency situtation changes

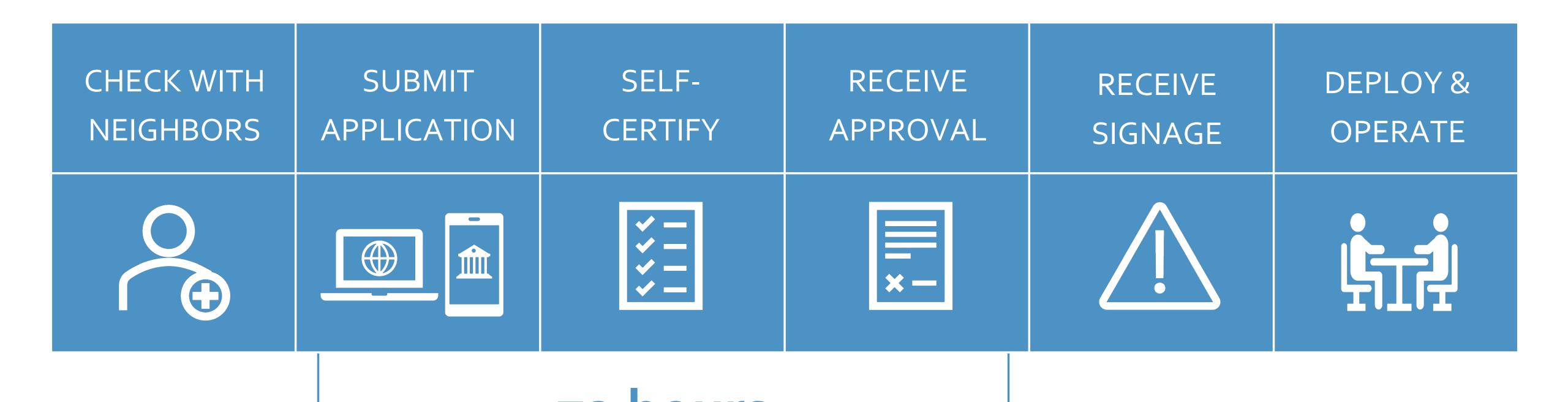


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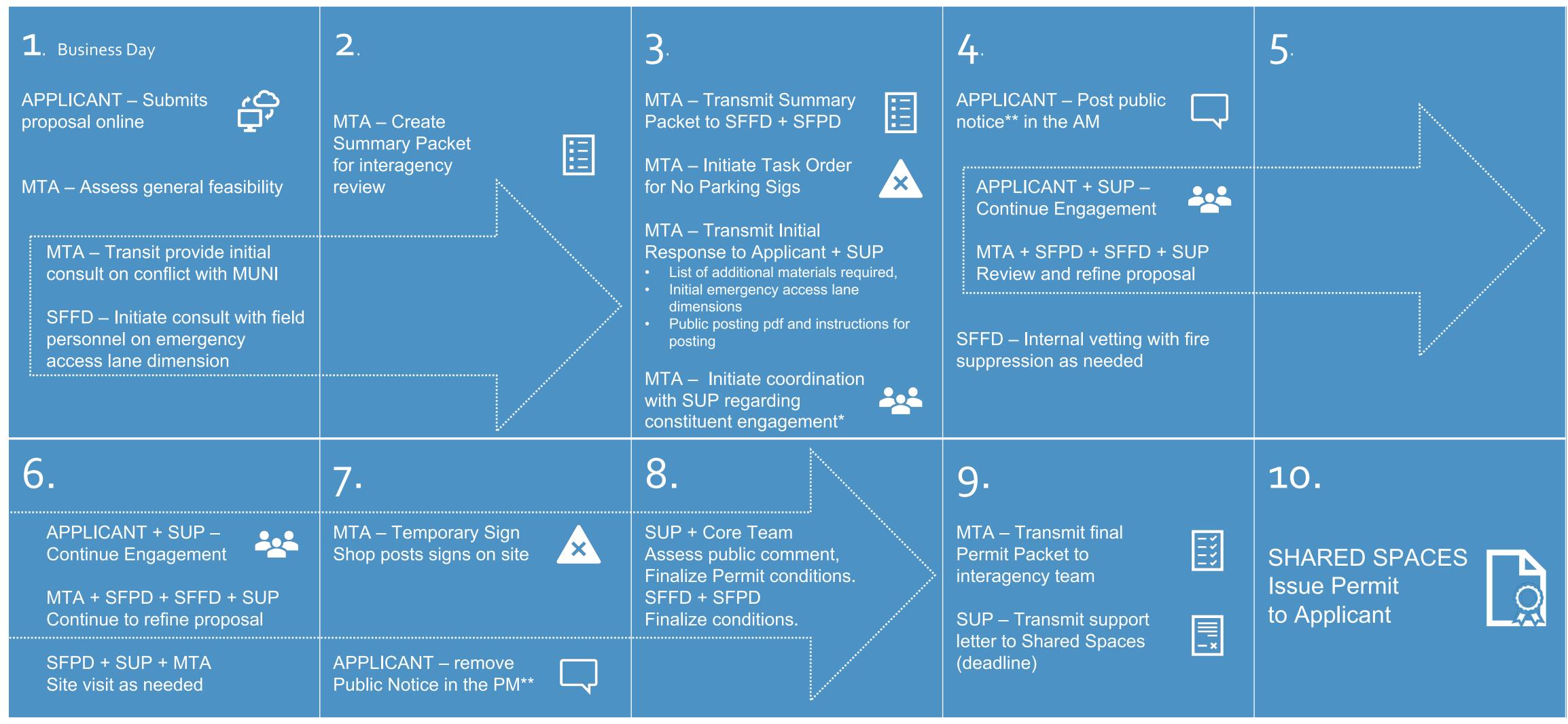

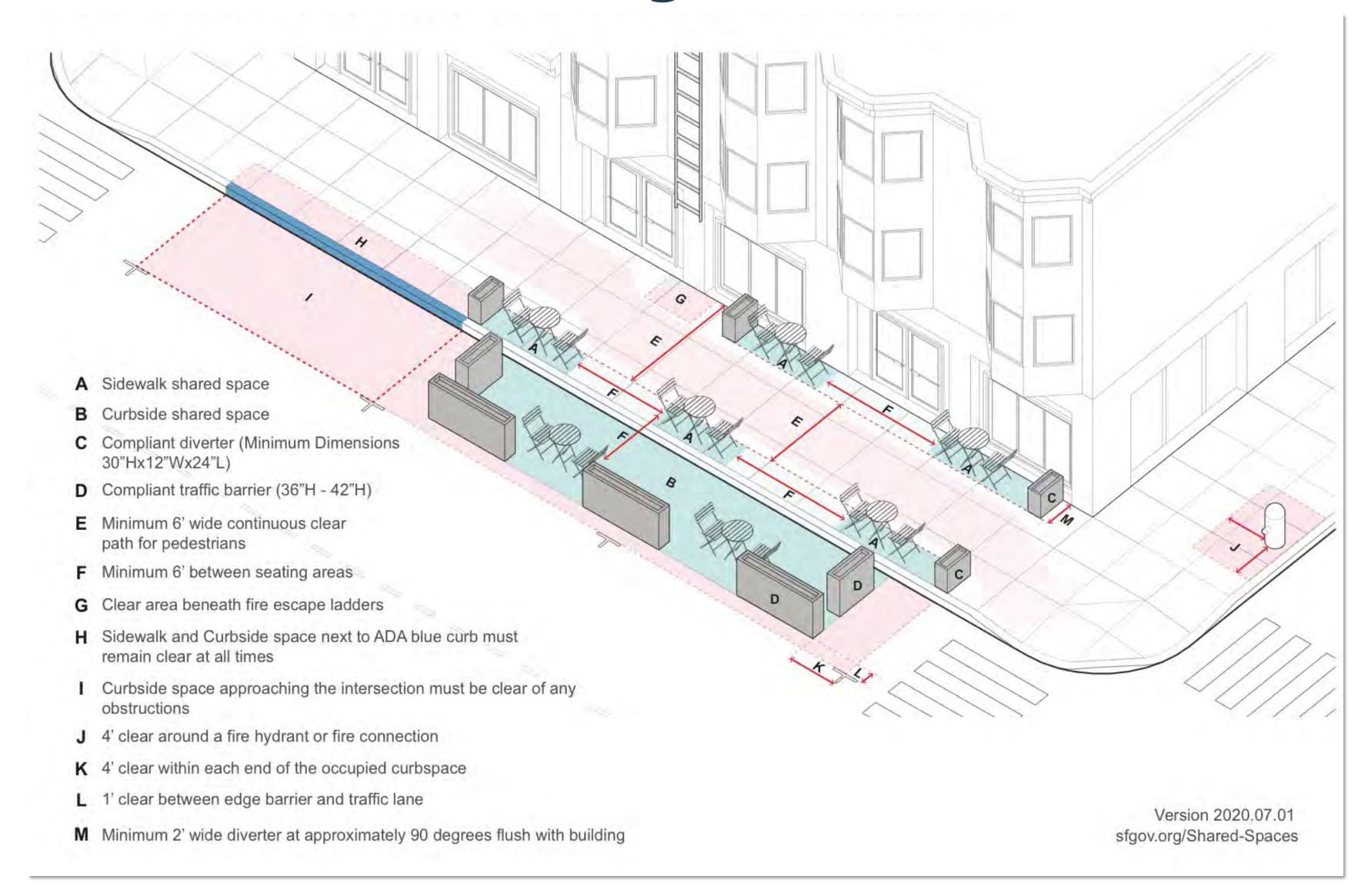

Sidewalks and Curbside: Shared Spaces Platforms

Shared Spaces Platform Building a platform or deck in the parking lane

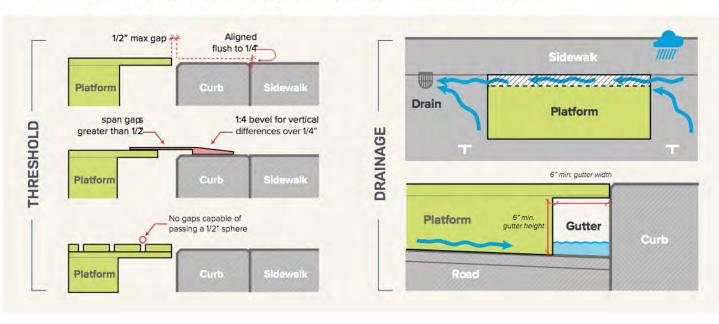
Before you build a platform, consider:

- If you can provide the same amenities to your patrons in a safe and accessible way, you don't need to build a platform
- You can invest in higher quality (sturdier and durable) traffic barriers, and amenities instead
- If you are able to sufficiently meet accessibility requirements as listed (Make your Shared Space accessible) or equivalent access at sidewalk level, you don't need to build a platform
- If you're not able to provide equivalent facilities, you can provide an accessible ramp to your parking lane Shared Space: 8.3% maximum slope (1:12), with raised side edges, (example).

Platform Design Criteria

Platform

- Durable materials that can withstand wear and tear of elements. It's your responsibility to maintain all platform elements in good condition.
- All structures on parking lane must allow for access to public utilities for maintenance and repairs (e.g. provide access panels, removable pavers, and etcetera)
- Threshold: Deck or platform must be flush with sidewalk and must not leave a gap greater than 1/2 inch, nor a vertical separation greater than 1/4 inch.
- Bolting into the sidewalk or pavement is highly discouraged. A restoration plan and performance bond is needed if bolting is proposed.
- Concrete: Pouring concrete for Shared Spaces platforms is not allowed. You may use concrete pavers on a platform structure instead.
- Surface materials must be textured or treated with a non-skid coating to ensure a safe walking surface. Loose particles, such as sand or loose stone, are not permitted.
- Drainage: Platforms should allow for curbside drainage flow. A 6 inch x 6 inch minimum clear gutter space must be provided along the entire length of the proposed platform.

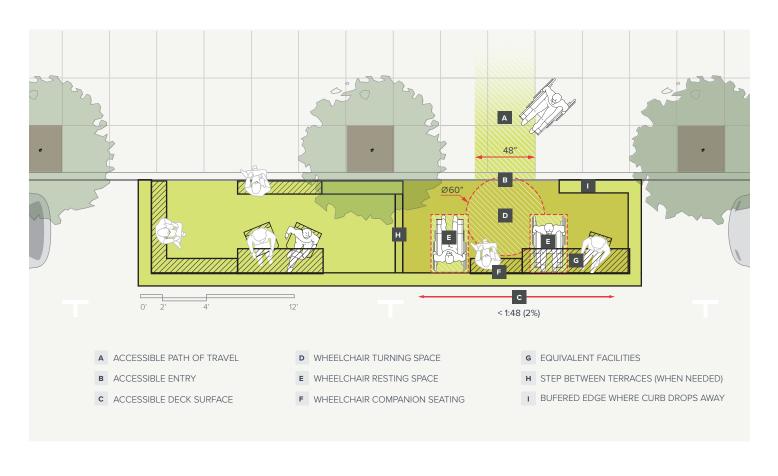

Accessibility

All accessibility elements of the proposed platform shall be designed, constructed and/or conform to the applicable provisions, rules, regulations and guidelines of the: San Francisco Building Code (SFBC) and Americans with Disabilities Act 2010 Standards accessibility requirements (ADAAG). See diagram for reference.

- Accessible Deck Surface: The portion of the parklet deck connected by the accessible path of travel to the wheelchair turning space and wheelchair resting space must be level. The accessible deck surface maximum cross slope (perpendicular to the sidewalk or curb) cannot exceed 1:48 (2%). The accessible deck surface maximum running slope (parallel to the curb) cannot exceed 1:48 (2%)
- Accessible entry: minimum 48 inches wide
- Accessible path of travel: It must connect the sidewalk to the accessible entry, deck surface, wheelchair turning space and wheelchair resting space
- Wheelchair turning space: Shall be 60 inches in diameter and located entirely within the platform; a
- 12-inch maximum overlap on the curb and sidewalk is acceptable.
- Wheelchair landing: A 30- by 48-inch clear floor area. It's permitted to overlap with the Wheelchair Turning Space by 24 inches maximum in any orientation

Building a platform or deck in the parking lane

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Enclosure

If you're building a platform, you will need to integrate an enclosure to act as a traffic barrier that complies with the following requirements:

- Stable and sturdy enough not to fall over or be pushed over (must withstand 250 lbs of force)
- Height: Enclosure should range between 36 inches and 42 inches tall for the long edge (parallel to parking lane), and 17 inches minimum for side buffer (perpendicular to parking lane). If you wish to install wind barriers taller than 42 inches, you will have to use transparent materials like Acrylite, Plexiglass, plastic films, etcetera.
- Visibility: The enclosure should not block the view of conflicting movements of traffic, including pedestrian traffic, nor block the view of traffic control devices such as traffic signs, traffic signals, and other traffic warning devices. It should not obstruct motorists' visibility of at least two traffic signals from 200 feet away (about half a block) from a signalized intersection.
- If the platform spans more than one parking space (20 feet), you will need to provide a 3-foot gap in the enclosure for emergency access

Furniture

- Follow same guidance for Shared Spaces seating or dining
- Follow physical distancing protocols

Enclosure example

Maintain visual connection with the sidewalk while providing a safe enclosure

Do not block visibility

If you want to use partitions higher than 42 inches, use see-through, transparent materials

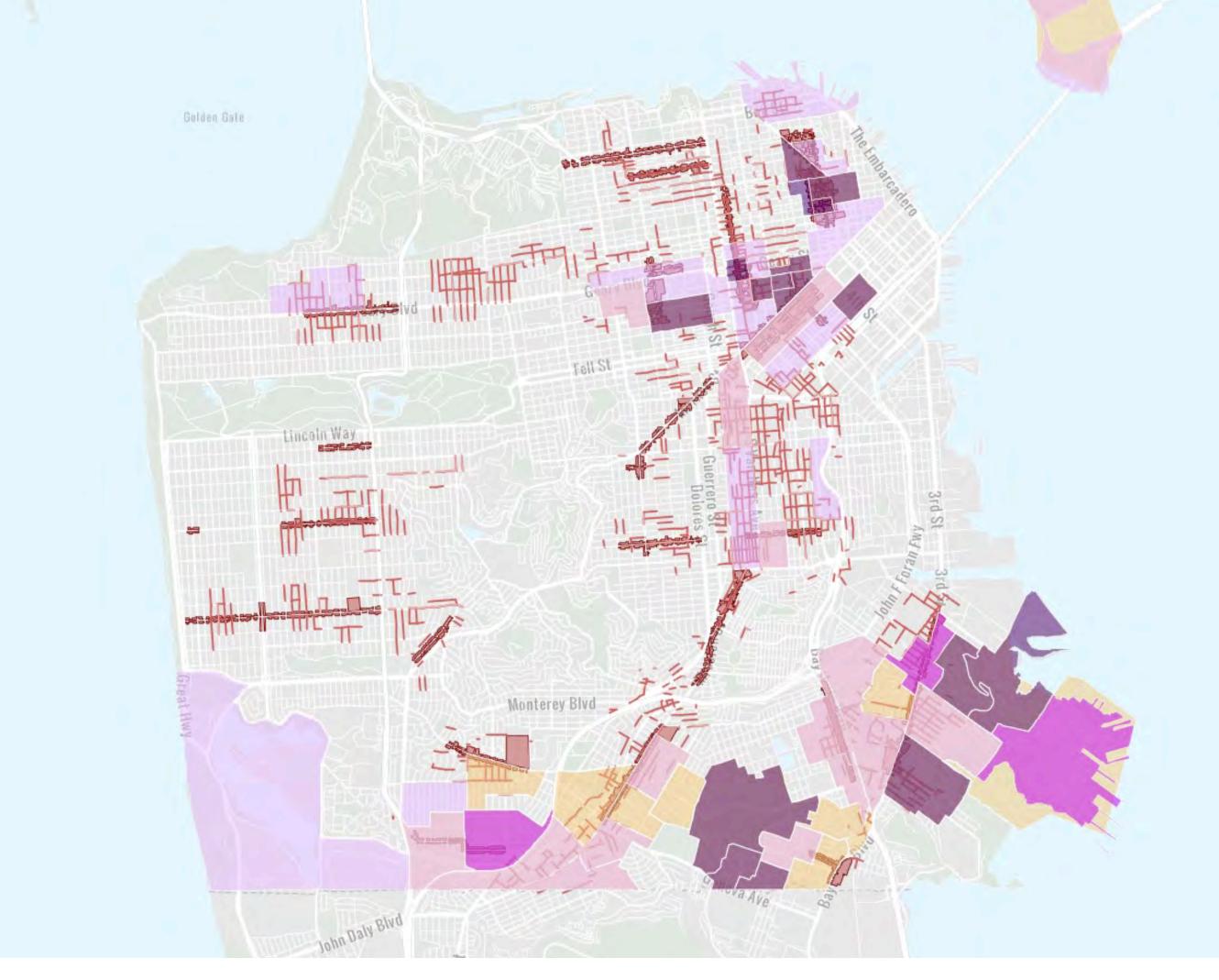

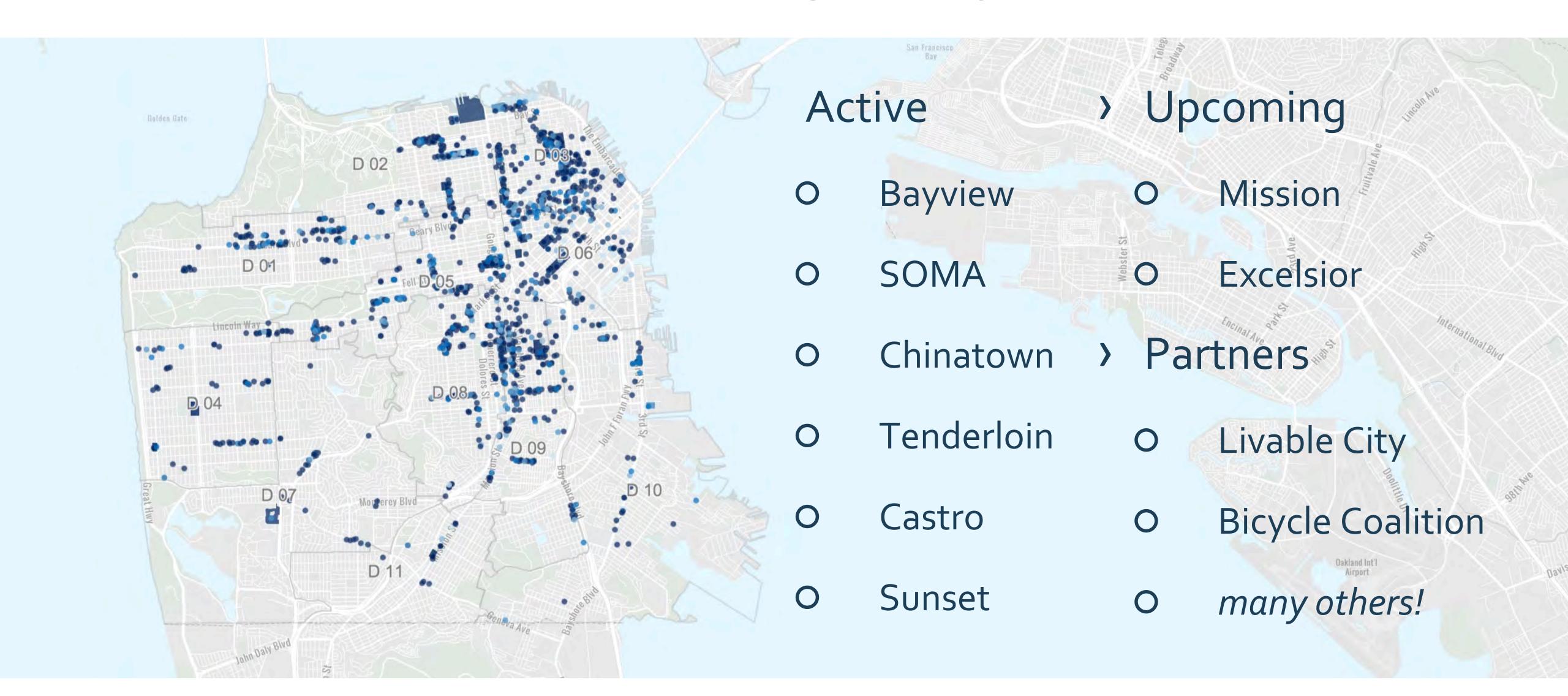
