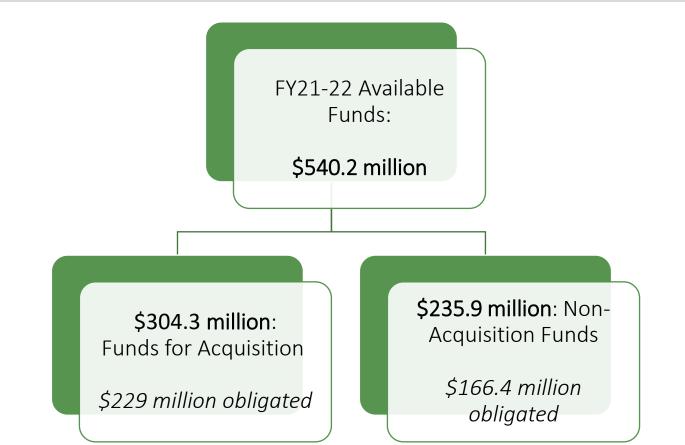

Housing: Capacity Update

Adults:

• 879 Flex Pool PSH+ 270 Medium-Term Subsidy Slots

TAY:

• 65 Flex Pool PSH + 160 Medium Term Subsidy Slots

Family:

• 71 Flex Pool PSH Slots

Total: 1,445 units added

Be Housing: PSH Acquisitions Update



1321 Mission Street (Adults and Families): \$54.8 million Homekey Award received.



3061 16th Street (TAY): Closed on property in Dec. 2021.



835 Turk Street (Adult): Approved by Board of Supervisors in Feb. 2022.



5630 Mission Street (TAY): In closing process.



Diva (Adult) and Granada (Adult): acquired in 2020 - 339 units operating with Prop C funds.

\$123.6 M for 6 Acquisitions with 690 units added.

Begin Housing: FHSP and RRH Updates

Flexible Housing Subsidy Pool

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- Goal: Deploy 1,075 new adult FHSP slots:
 - Prop C funds added to 10 contracts with 6 providers.
- Solicitation of Interest: In Process
 - \checkmark Bayview FHSP closed and under review.
 - ✓ TAY and Family FHSP to be issued in early March.

Medium Term Subsidies

- Goal: Deploy 350 adult mediumterm subsidies with workforce development:
 - ✓ Remaining Prop C funds added to grants by end of Feb. 2022.
- Goal: Deploy up to 160 TAY mediumterm subsidies (Rising Up)
 - In process adding Prop C Funds to Rising Up Budget.

Boost Housing: FHSP & EHV Support Update

•HSH pairing EHV subsidies with Prop C funds for support services to:

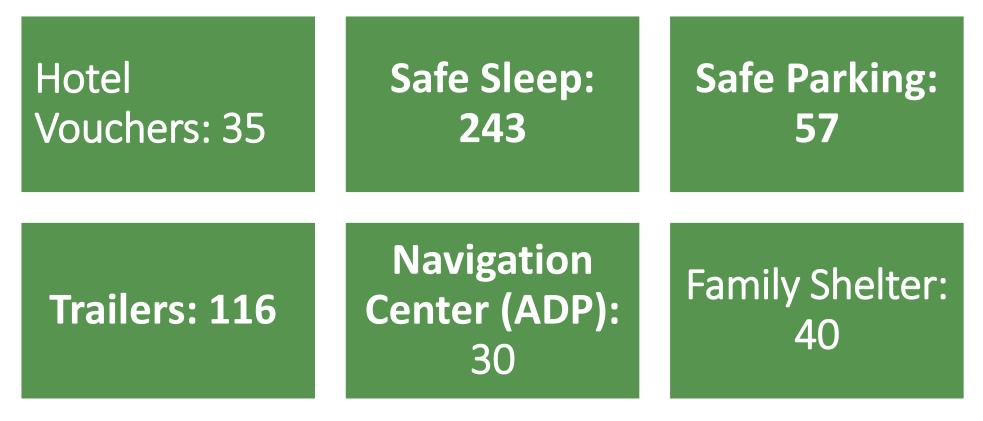
- Ensure voucher holders stabilize and maintain housing.
- Leverage Prop C investments to increase number of households served.

← As of Feb. 16: 441 applications submitted, 64 households housed.

←385 households will receive supportive services with FHSP Prop C funds.

Shelter: Capacity and Spending Update

521 total capacity (beds) added with C Funds as of Feb. 2022:



Shelter Update: Vehicle Triage Center

- •Vehicle Triage Center at Candlestick State Recreation Area opened at partial capacity on January 19, 2022.
 - 54 of 58 households from Carroll Emergency Lot moved to Bayview VTC; lot at Carroll closed.
 - Phase 1: VTC at full capacity with **57 vehicles** and 100 people.
 - Phase 2: in ramp up up to 130 vehicles by fall 2022.
 - Leveraging **\$5.6 million** in state money for capital expenses.
- •Site provides 24/7 staffing, security, bathrooms, mobile showers, potable water, and mobile blackwater pumping services.
- **•Case management** begins in **February 2022.**

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Shelter: Additional Program Updates

- Navigation Center for Justice-Involved Adults (ADP):
 - Opened Jan. 2022.
 - Serving up to 30 guests.

• Trailer Site: Continue to operate 116 trailers.

• Hotel Vouchers: Deployed 35 vouchers for TAY via partnership with MOHCD.

Prevention: Capacity Update

Targeted Homelessness Prevention: 432 households

Problem Solving: 355 households

PSH Shallow Subsidies: 2,800 households

Total: 3,587 system capacity added

Prevention: Problem Solving Updates

• Expansion of Problem Solving to **12 family shelters**:

• Budget modifications completed, training planned for mid-February.

••Enhance Problem Solving at Access Points:

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- TAY: Refining implementation plans for 3 sites; proposals incoming for 2 more.
- Adult: Planning meetings in Dec./Jan. Prop C funding allocation in process.

Pilot new Access Points for veterans and justice-involved people:

- Swords to Plowshares veteran AP now open at 6th and Howard.
- Working with reentry partners: January Safety & Justice Council Meeting.

Prevention: Additional Updates

- **Targeted Homelessness Prevention** Services: \$10 million
 - As of Feb. 11, 2022: 432 households served and \$2.6 million disbursed.
- Fully rolled out rent subsidies to cap rent in all HSH permanent supportive housing to 30% of income.

•Workforce Services Pilots:

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- HSH, OEWD, HSA collaborating with consultant and providers on ~\$4.5 million implementation proposal to serve prevention/problem solving clients.
- \$2.5 million work ordered to OEWD to serve adult rapid rehousing clients starting this FY.
- ►TAY Direct Cash Transfer Pilot:
 - Vetting different program models; seeking provider and city partner feedback



\$25.9 million awarded:

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• Eviction Prevention & Housing Stabilization Programs - \$18.5M

- Tenant Right to Counsel (Eviction Legal Defense)
- Tenant Counseling, Education & Outreach
- Tenant-Landlord Mediation
- Housing Retention in City-Subsidized Housing (*New Program*)
- Financial Assistance
 - Ongoing Shallow Subsidies
 - Emergency Rental Assistance (see Targeted Homelessness Prevention)

• MOHCD Targeted Homelessness Prevention - \$10M

Frontline Worker Bonus Pay

 \$10.1 million in Prop C funds allocated as
 Frontline Worker Bonus
 Pay across the HRS.

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Targeted to frontline
 workers working on site
 during COVID-19 earning
 less than \$24 per hour
