The Police Commission of the City and County of San Francisco met via videoconference at 5:34 p.m.

Commissioners Elias congratulated Commissioners Yee and Carter-Oberstone for their reappointment. She also welcomed Commissioner Benedicto and asked him to say a few words about himself.

Commissioner Benedicto addressed the Commission and stated that it's an honor to be a member of this commission and is looking forward to working with his fellow Commissioners, the Department and DPA to ensure continued progress on criminal justice reform, continued progress on the remaining DOJ recommendations and that we have effective, pragmatic, and progressive oversight of the department.

Francisco Dacosta spoke in regard to the decrease in the police force and asked the Commissioners how are they going to address this issue. He went on to talk about quality of life issues in the City.

### Chief's Report

- Weekly crime trends
- Major/Significant Incidents

Assistant Chief Bob Moser for Chief Scott reported on crime trends YTD: Violent Crime up 4 percent; homicide up 25 percent; rape up 4 percent; robbery down 2 percent; assault up 10 percent; human trafficking down 43 percent. Property Crimes up 11 percent; burglary down 30 percent; motor vehicle

theft up 4 percent; arson down 21 percent; larceny theft up 27 percent. Gun violence is down 12 percent compared to 2021; 3 shooting incidents for the week ending on 5/1/22; total 60 incidents resulting in 68 victims YTD. No homicide for the week ending 5/1/22; there are a total of 15 homicides YTD.

Shooting Incidents: 3 shooting incidents: May 1, on Giants Drive in the Bayview, officers responded to shot spotter activation and located 15 rounds. While enroute, call was received that a shooting victim was located inside a residence suffering from gun fire. Victim was transported and in stable condition. Investigation is ongoing; April 29th, on the 300 block of Turk Street in the Tenderloin,

victim located with a gun shot wound. Video evidence showed that subject following the victim, pulling a handgun from his waistband, and firing a shot at the victim. Victim attempted to block the gunfire and was shot. Suspect fled the scene. Investigation is ongoing; April 29th, at 3 and Quesada the Bayview, officers responded to shot spotter activation and located 12 casings. Shortly after, a walk-in shooting victim was dropped off at hospital. Video showed a vehicle pulling up to 3d and Quesada firing a gun and people in the area running for cover. No arrest made; investigation is ongoing.

Significant Incidents: Responded to demonstrations regarding Row v. Wade leaked draft ruling which remained peaceful; Salesforce Tower, officers viewed individual climbing the exterior of the tower and refused to climb down. Officers were able to take him into custody on the 64th floor, cited for trespassing and delaying arrest. Arson barricaded subject, at the 600 block of Larkin. Officers responded to an incident where the subject set fire to mattress in his room; threw the mattress out the window; subject armed with a knife and barricaded himself in the bathroom. Members of hostage negotiation team responded along with SFFD personnel. Subject left out of an opened window and officers were able hold on to him while SFFD pulled up a ladder and safely take him into custody.

Stunt Driving Incident: Three stunt driving incidents occurred over the weekend. (1) Officers responded in the area of Harrison and Vane. There were approximately 100 vehicles and 200 spectators. Once officers arrived, the group disbanded. (2) Officers responded in the area of Delano and Geneva with approximately 50 vehicles and 300-400 spectators. Once officers arrived, the group dispersed. There were reports of shots fired however no casings or damaged to vehicles and buildings were located. (3) Officers responded to the intersection of 13th and So. Van Ness as cars were gathering and vehicles were in the intersections doing donuts. Once officers arrived, the group dispersed. All incidents are under investigation.

Fatal Traffic Collision: On May 1, near Turk and Taylor, a vehicle struck an occupied scooter and fled the scene. Rider of scooter was transported and succumbed to their injuries.

Director Henderson reported: In the year 2022: 221 cases opened; 203 closed; 292 pending; 16 cases sustained; 29 cases past 270-day; 6 cases mediated. Cases received in the past week: 27 new cases; 43 percent behaved and spoke inappropriately; 11 percent failed to write an incident report; 9 percent used unnecessary or excessive force; 7 percent made an arrest without cause; 5 percent engaged in biased policing or discrimination.

Audit: On April 27th, survey was sent out to current and former members of the Police Commission to obtain input on information received from the Department about the topic of misconduct.

Outreach: Can be found on community calendar on the DPA's website and posted on Tweeter, Facebook, Instagram and on DHR's website: DPA participated in community meetings at Southern, Richmond, and Park Stations.

Director Henderson stated that the monthly statistics are online and does not need to be discussed.

Commissioner Carter-Oberstone reported that he has been meeting weekly with DPA and the Department to discuss the pretext stops DGO that will be on the agenda for next week.

Commissioner Elias reported that she had asked the Chief that moving forward, to start tracking the race and gender of officers who are subject to discipline in the Internal Affairs report.

Commissioner Byrne reported that he is scheduled to go out with patrol on Friday evening and spoke of a recent attack on one of the Alchemy patrols. He reported that he went through Golden Gate Avenue just as De Marillac Academy was letting out and stated that it was wonderful to see the children running around the neighborhood without any fear.
