<p><b>Availability during Interim Plan Phase</b></p>	<p>(July 1-Dec 31)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Sonoma County is still finalizing the inter-county contract agreement process and rate</li> <li>• Under contract, secure youth treatment programming will be available, provided there are open beds</li> <li>• Total capacity is 20 (10 of which are currently available to other counties, including San Francisco)</li> <li>• Sonoma currently serves smaller, Northern counties at their camp</li> <li>• Santa Cruz is planning to use Sonoma (Alameda, San Mateo are planning to use their own juvenile halls; Contra Costa &amp; Santa Clara still developing plans)</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Space is available</li> <li>• Long-term secure youth treatment programming and staffing do not currently exist</li> <li>• SPY has the capacity to offer long term behavioral health programming</li> <li>• Juvenile Hall is scheduled to close on December 31, 2021; we do not yet have an alternative facility identified</li> </ul>

Ensure that young people have access to all resources they need/ wealth of resources available in SF.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A place that young people can learn and thrive.</li> <li>• A place that feels less like a prison/locked facility and more homelike – including windows, bedrooms, beds, bathrooms.</li> <li>• Outdoor green space and structure that allows for outdoor time and activities.</li> <li>• Need to consider safety of young people and staff in terms of security/secured features of facility to prevent harm to young people, staff, and AWOLS</li> <li>• On site education space</li> <li>• Space for gender non-conforming youth</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Sonoma is using their juvenile hall; they do not plan to designate a unit for secure track</li> <li>• Sonoma juvenile hall is the same design as SF juvenile hall</li> <li>• Indicated that there are some visiting and classroom spaces that they are “softening”</li> <li>• <i>To discuss: physical space of Sonoma</i></li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• For interim, SF would be using juvenile hall, which has outdoor space</li> <li>• <i>To discuss: physical space of SF; designated unit?</i></li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Evidence-based, long-term programming models: Does an out of county facility or SF Juvenile Hall have the capacity to offer this?</li> <li>• Case plan that is inclusive of time in secure facility through successful reentry into the community.</li> <li>• SF services with access to facility so young people remain connected to community and have continuity of care upon release.</li> <li>• Diverse array of education and vocational opportunities, including post secondary education.</li> <li>• Meaningful supportive aftercare options.</li> <li>• Life skills training; documents; ID</li> <li>• Ombudsman services: local in addition to state?</li> <li>• Physical fitness space/ services.</li> <li>• Access to staff/ CBO providers with lived experience to connect with young people for both in custody and reentry programming.</li> <li>• Opportunities for expressive arts (music, dance, creative writing, visual arts)</li> <li>• Services for gender non-conforming youth</li> <li>• Services for LGBTQ youth</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Sonoma currently provides long-term programming for young people committed to their juvenile hall</li> <li>• Utilizes case managers within their juvenile hall to provide streamlined case planning, in collaboration with Probation and CBOs</li> <li>• Amenable to working with SF CBO/program professionals</li> <li>• Provides Career &amp; Technical Education courses; in discussion with local community college to provide on-site classes</li> <li>• Contracts with or provides programming through Seneca and local CBOs, including sex offender treatment; in discussion re: additional CBO partnerships, including girls programming.</li> <li>• <i>To discuss: programming in Sonoma</i></li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• SF does not currently provide long-term programming in juvenile hall</li> <li>• Programs and services have access to juvenile hall, including Omega Group, Sunset Youth Services, Success Centers, FLY, Block 2 Block, Beat Within, Art of Yoga, Young Women’s Freedom Center, Power Source, Life Skills &amp; Mentoring, Youth Narrative, San Dimas Church</li> <li>• Currently, SFUSD provides high school programming and is exploring/planning higher education options.</li> <li>• SPY has staff on site 12 hours a day/7 days a week. They do have the capacity to provide long term programming utilizing EBPs and develop individualized treatment plans. SPY Staff can collaborate with community providers to develop an individualized treatment and re-entry plan.</li> <li>• Advantages to this are by the time a youth receives a DJJ commitment they would have already been assessed and connected to a SPY clinician.</li> </ul>
