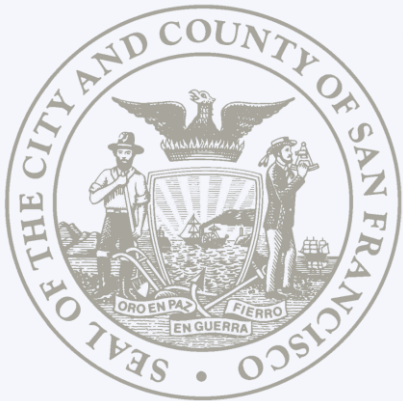

JUSTIS Program Status

JUSTIS Program

Key Objectives FY21/22

- Mainframe Retirement: migrate mainframe reports, transactions, and queries by redeveloping them to run on the JUSTIS Data Hub
- Modernize JUSTIS Hub Data Design: migrate the JUSTIS data from the flat file structure inherited from the mainframe to a relational database
- Superior Court C-Track Interface: JUSTIS team is developing an interface to exchange data with C-Track (CMS replacement system). This interface is required for C-Track go live which in turn enables the retirement of CMS on the mainframe.
- Data Center of Excellence: design and implement the data analytics capabilities required to support the reporting needs of the criminal justice agencies and their stakeholders



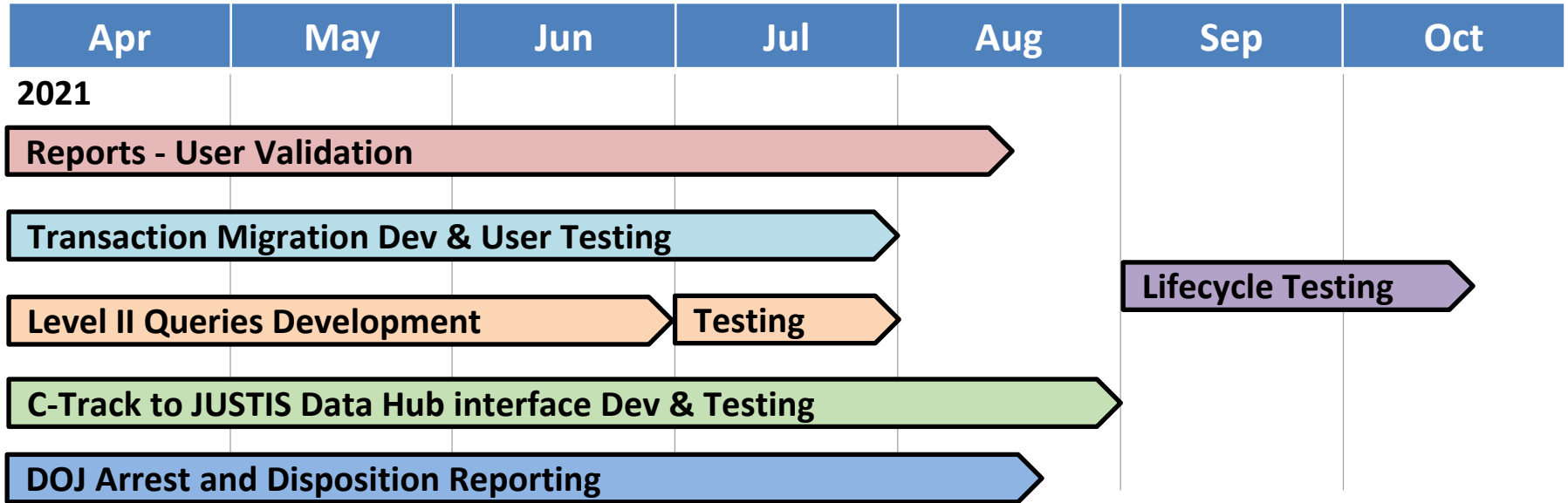
COIT Budget

COIT FY21/22 JUSTIS Budget: \$511K


- This program will result in the redesign and implementation of the JUSTIS Data Hub in modern technologies that will lower the cost of maintenance and increase operational resiliency.
- \$100K Design and implement monthly and weekly CA-DOJ reporting processes currently on the mainframe to run on the JUSTIS Data Hub.
- \$100K Design and implement new reusable API message broker for agency replacement systems - i.e. JMS, C-Track, e-Prosecutor.
- \$300K Data Center of Excellence: design and implement advanced data analytics tools and data repositories in support of justice department needs.

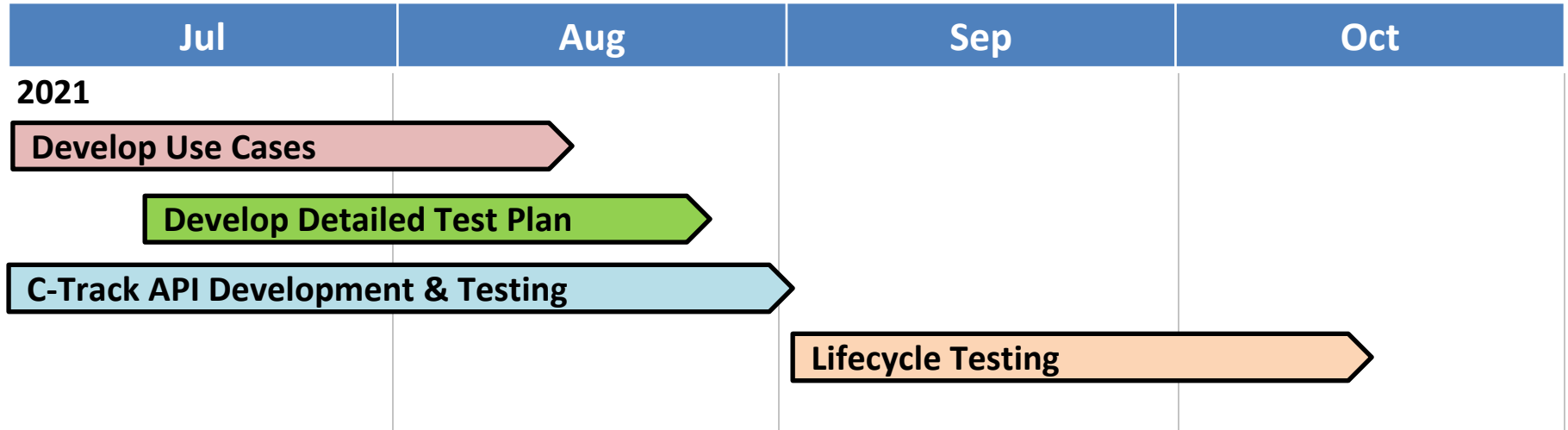

- In support of the SFPD's effort to migrate their applications off the mainframe, in April, the JUSTIS Team agreed to develop the replacement for the 2 Arrest Systems. That added 6 additional transactions to the scope.
- There are 15 of the Level II queries that were identified as no longer needed so they were removed from scope in April. We also identified one additional query that was added to the Level II query scope. The total Level II queries in scope is 16.

Lifecycle Testing

Timeline



- The level of participation for the JUSTIS partner agency resources is 2 hours per week from July through mid-August
- The level of agency participation for Sep & Oct will be defined during the development of the Detailed Test Plan

Lifecycle Testing

Why and What

Why?

- The C-Track implementation requires significant changes to the JUSTIS Data Hub:
 - A new data exchange interface (i.e. API) between JUSTIS and C-Track
 - A new JUSTIS database that accommodates the new and expanded data fields made available by C-Track
- Additionally, the mainframe reports and transactions redeveloped for the JUSTIS Hub need data validation testing since the underlying data will now be sourced from C-Track instead of CMS

What?

- Lifecycle operations testing with the JUSTIS partners is needed to confirm production readiness of the JUSTIS Hub changes



Production Readiness Testing

Upcoming Activities

- **Use Case Development**
 - › JUSTIS Team will lead the use case planning effort
 - › We need participants from the JUSTIS partner agencies to work with us on the use case development
- **Test Plan Development**
 - › JUSTIS Team will develop of the detailed API C-Track test plan which will include the approach, specific test events, resource plan and the schedule
 - › We need participants from the JUSTIS partner agencies to work with us on the test plan development
- The level of participation for the JUSTIS partner agency resources is 2 hours per week from July through mid-August

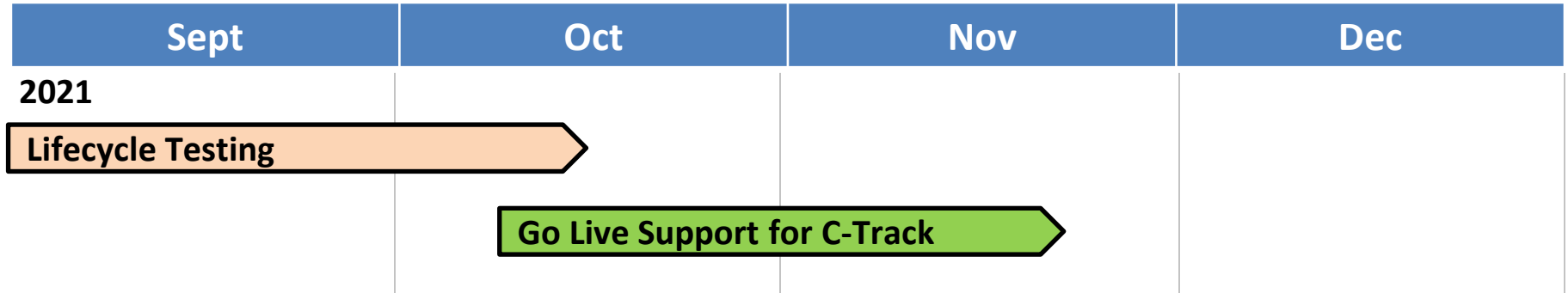

6. Migrated mainframe transactions
7. Level II queries migrated to JUSTIS
8. DOJ Reporting
 - a. MACR
 - b. 8715 Disposition Reporting

Timeline



Successful Go-Live Planning

- Completed test plans for each agency
- Log questions in ServiceNow
- JUSTIS will establish incident severity levels, track defects and resolve based on severity
- Weekly or daily calls to coordinate fixes and retesting in the teams
- Expect 4-6 weeks to normalize operations

Architecture and Data Sharing

FY21/22 Workplan

- With the retirement of the mainframe on the horizon, the work of the committee has shifted its focus to completing data-related workplans and tasks in an effort to develop the Data Center of Excellence (DCOE)
- The Data & Architecture Committee FY 21/22 workplan was developed in close cooperation with the workplan of the Performance and Strategy Committee and is designed to be supportive and complementary
- The committees will continue their close coordination and communications throughout the execution of the workplan activities to remain aligned

Cross system Benefit

1. Establish source and methods for race and ethnicity variables for city-wide KPIs.

3. Validate and expand Justice Dashboard for tracking subsequent criminal justice contact.
4. Explore the use and impact of custody holds and processes related to them, establishing cross-departmental protocols and new JUSTIS workflows

Well Being

5. Expand knowledge about High User Analysis and make recommendations for well-being indicators.



Architecture and Data Sharing + Performance and Strategy Collaboration

Desired Outcomes for Committee Collaboration

- Establish shared definitions for key metrics (e.g. crime type, race and ethnicity) so that statistics and key performance indicators can be more easily standardized across departments.
- Develop processes, protocols, and documentation for creating shared data products.
 - › Key resource: Justice Dashboard and its development process
- Integrate cross system goals associated with the Coordinating Responses to Prevent Repeat Offenses Initiative announced on February 24th.

City Leaders Join Together to Announce Two New Initiatives to Prevent Recidivism and Gun Violence

Law enforcement agencies are joining together to implement a coordinated response throughout the criminal justice system to prevent repeat offenses

San Francisco, CA — Today, San Francisco Mayor London N. Breed, District Attorney Chesa Boudin, Police Chief Bill Scott, Sheriff Paul Miyamoto, and Adult Probation Chief Karen Fletcher announced two initiatives to prevent repeat offenses and gun violence in San Francisco. The first is an agreement among the justice partners to implement coordinated efforts to prevent individuals from committing repeat offenses in San Francisco. The second is an initiative aimed at preventing gun violence as part of an effort with the San Francisco Police Department and San Francisco's Street Violence Intervention Program.

"To confront the public safety challenges we face in San Francisco, we all need to acknowledge where we are falling short and where we can work together to do more," said Mayor Breed. "Whether it's dealing with the challenges around people committing repeat offenses and ending up back on our streets, or the struggles we are having with gun violence in many parts of our City, we need creative and collaborative solutions. I appreciate the leaders of our public safety departments coming together to focus on keeping our City and our residents safe."

Coordinating Responses to Prevent Repeat Offenses

The first initiative, which is a partnership between Sheriff Miyamoto, Police Chief Scott, District Attorney Boudin, and Adult Probation Chief Fletcher, will coordinate efforts to prevent individuals from committing repeat offenses in San Francisco. As each of these agencies plays a critical role in public safety in the City, each agency has committed to improved communication to support swift and coordinated responses designed to promote public safety.

Included in this coordinated effort are plans to:

- Develop communication tools across agencies to inform one another of identified persons who have committed repeated, recent offenses in the same category of crime.
- Ensure that when persons are booked into jail, their probation, parole, and/or federal probation status as well as the existence of any warrants will be immediately confirmed and communicated to justice partners.
- Ensure that every booking notification is reviewed and evaluated.
- Establish verification processes to ensure that holds are placed each and every time someone is arrested while on probation or parole.
- Communicate across agencies regarding any contextual information or specific issues that may warrant consideration for detention.
- Provide updated information to the Court regarding any previous noncompliance with court orders regarding conditions of release, including any failures to comply with electronic monitoring, and
- Establish communication procedures both to and from justice partners regarding any decisions to refer a case to another agency and any updates as to actions taken by that agency.

In addition to this effort, Mayor Breed has arranged to provide additional staffing, including two additional prosecutors to ensure enhanced interagency communication and coordination.
