BUSINESS DESCRIPTION

Developing Environments is an artist live-work space located at 540 Alabama Street in the Mission neighborhood. Founded in 1972 and formally incorporated as a non-profit in 1976, the organization emerged when a group of artists identified a vacant, three-story warehouse at the corner of Alabama and Mariposa streets and transformed it into a space for artists. The organization's founders envisioned a place where artists could live, create, and be in community with one another. At first, the founders fashioned makeshift studios with cloth barriers and tents; eventually, with the support of building's landlord, the artists erected new walls, electric wiring, plumbing, and windows, bringing the structure up to code. Today, Developing Environments features 46 live-work units, and has provided safe and affordable studio space to more than 375 artists since its inception in the 1970s.

Developing Environments operates with a consensus based, non-hierarchical governing structure. Artist-members share resources, collectively maintain the building facilities, and support each other's careers. The organizational philosophy traces its roots to the hippie movement and co-housing experiments of the 1960s, but continues to be shaped and upheld by the participation of its artist-members. Developing Environment's values also manifest in the layout and physical features of the building, which include communal kitchens, bathrooms, and laundry facilities, along with meeting rooms and shared gallery space.

Artist-members at Developing Environments work in a variety of mediums and forms including performance, writing, photography, painting, jewelry, textile, sculpture, and digital art. Although members have displayed their work in museums and galleries around the world, their primary impact is in San Francisco, where they contribute to the local community in countless ways. Members have served as curators for the Queer Cultural Center, volunteered at the Mission Food Hub, advocated for bikeable and walkable streets, held teaching positions at local colleges, and founded new programs including the San Francisco Electronic Music Festival, Marigold Project, and SF Art & Film. In a city that has been losing artists in recent decades, Developing Environments has also served as a model for how San Francisco can support artists and cultivate a vibrant creative community.

Yes, Developing Environments has contributed to the history and identity of the Mission neighborhood and San Francisco.

- Although Developing Environments is not associated with a culturally significant art/craft/cuisine/tradition as a collective organization, many individual artist-members have worked on culturally significant art and/or craft projects over the years.
- Developing Environments is associated with the transformation of Showplace Square from an industrial area to a hub for artists. The neighborhood now features numerous artsoriented businesses, organizations, and communities.
- Developing Environments has received coverage in the San Francisco Chronicle and San Francisco Examiner. Additionally, numerous articles about individual artist-members have appeared in the press. The organization received a commendation for Mayor London Breed for its 45th anniversary.

CRITERION 3

Is the applicant committed to maintaining the physical features or traditions that define the business, including craft, culinary, or art forms?

Yes, Developing Environments is committed to maintaining the physical features and traditions that define the organization.

Written Historical Narrative

INTRODUCTION

a. Describe the business. What does it sell or provide?

Developing Environments is an artist live/work community located at 540 Alabama Street in the Mission District.

Developing Environments is an ever-evolving social experiment in being a fully consensus-based community. They are governed by by-laws and dedicated to a completely non-hierarchical system of living collectively, maintaining their facility collectively, updating and archiving organizational systems collectively, and collectively utilizing their individual and shared resources to enhance each other's careers and build new resources. Through their time-tested ability to adapt and respond to the shifting socio-economic priorities of San Francisco, the artist-members of Developing Environments have created a continuous cultural impact with their artwork and civic engagement, which is especially notable in a city where artists and creatives are, arguably, the very thing that has made San Francisco the deeply ineffable and inimitable cultural destination that it is today.

b. Describe who the business serves.

Developing Environments serves a number of communities, from the active member-residents themselves to the broader artist communities that benefit from the members activities and efforts, locally and worldwide.

Since its inception, Developing Environments has housed over 375 artists who have individually and collectively made an immeasurable impact on the Bay Area. The breadth of artistic, programmatic, and serviceable work that branches out from Developing Environments is tremendous, ongoing, and indeed a living, breathing force. The artistic expression varies widely: performance (singers, dancers, circus performers), writers, photographers, painters, craft (jewelry, textiles), sculpture, installation art and digital art.

In addition to their artistic endeavors, many of the artist-residents are engaged in local civic community service. Some examples: leading advocacy projects with the SFMTA to keep San Francisco walkable and bike-able; fostering hard-to-home dogs for the SFSPCA; and ongoing core volunteer support for the Mission Food Hub, SF/Marin Food Bank, and Maitri AIDS Hospice.

c. In about 2-5 words (15-30 characters), describe what the business is known for.

Artist live/work community.

CRITERION 1: The business has operated in San Francisco for 30 or more years, with no break in San Francisco operations exceeding two years

a. Provide a short history of the business, including locations and owners.

Developing Environments was founded in 1972 by a small group of artists seeking an affordable space in which they could live and make work. They discovered a vacant three-story warehouse at the corner of Alabama and Mariposa streets in the Mission District that they could transform into an artist community. They moved in, created make-shift studios divided by improvised cloth barriers and tents, and began making art. The landlord, Ken Royce, soon became aware of their presence in his building and chose to help them rather than evict them. With his advice and assistance, they were able to obtain a low-interest loan to finance the renovation of the building. Sheet rock walls, electrical wiring, plumbing, lighting, and a sprinkler system were installed. They sledge-hammered openings in the exterior walls to recreate the windows that had been closed up. The artists brought the building up to code, obtained a long lease, organized an internal system of self-governance based on consensus, and formalized their structure as a legal artist live/work community. Since that time, Developing Environments has been providing truly affordable live-work space for locally-based artists.

Developing Environments was formally organized and incorporated as a California Not-for-Profit Corporation on December 27, 1976.

Since Developing Environments was first founded, it has operated continuously at the same location—540 Alabama Street. While individual artists have come and gone over the decades, the primary role of Developing Environments—to provide a safe and robust self-governing community of affordable live-work spaces—has not changed.

b. Provide the ownership history of the business in a consolidated year-to-year format.

Developing Environments has been a California Not-for-Profit Corporation since its incorporation in 1976. It is governed by a Board of Directors (aka 'Management Team') that is comprised of active artist residents. Developing Environments is currently applying for 501(c)(3) nonprofit status.

c. Describe any circumstances that required the business to cease operations in San Francisco for any significant length of time.

Developing Environments has not ceased operations since it was incorporated in 1976.

CRITERION 2: The business has contributed to the neighborhood's history and/or the identity of a particular neighborhood or community

a. Describe the business' contribution to the history and/or identity of the neighborhood, community, business sector, or San Francisco as a whole.

Developing Environments has created a powerful legacy of effectively safeguarding the arts in San Francisco, by providing affordable live-work space for locally-based artists, since 1972. Developing Environments has been a creative hub and a secure home to artists across all disciplines, acting as a critical haven for their minds and bodies, and ensuring that their dynamic practices have a healthy and robust place to incubate and grow.

The creation of Developing Environments coincided with several movements within San Francisco. The organization embraced the artist-hippie movement of the late 1960s and early 1970s incorporating the ethos of the time into their internal governance and hierarchical structures. Beyond the neighborhoods of the Haight-Ashbury and the Castro, part of the Mission District was a 'no man's land'. The move into the empty warehouse on the eastern edge of the Mission District made the organization an early pioneer in the transformation of this part of the city into a vibrant artist neighborhood.

b. Is the business associated with significant people or events, either now or in the past?

To this day, Developing Environments is run on a consensus-based philosophy of decision making that has its roots in the hippie movement of non-hierarchical governance. Developing Environments is also an example of the communal co-housing model of living that has roots back to the early 1960s.

Over the years, there have been many significant artists that have lived and worked at Developing Environments. Some are nationally and internationally known. Other artists are important for their contribution to their specific craft and community. And some are teachers and administrators that have brought insight and development to the art community. Developing Environments believes that all the artists who have lived and worked there are significant and bring their own contribution to the greater community.

As a pioneer in the transformation of the east Mission warehouse area, Developing Environments has been a champion for the development of the arts in the area. The transformation of the neighborhood is ongoing. Along with adjacent artist buildings, Developing Environments is now part of a thriving artists area (including Project Artaud, 1890 Bryant, Pacific Felt Factory, Art Explosion, and others). While not a specific event space, Developing Environments has been instrumental in helping the neighborhood and encouraging art business development in the area.

c. How does the business demonstrate its commitment to the community?

Since its inception, Developing Environments has demonstrated its commitment to the wider San Francisco and artists communities through the individual artists that have been allowed to nurture their craft and expertise in an affordable, supportive environment. Their contributions to the community vary.

The performers at Developing Environments have showcased their talents from the local Pickle Family Circus to symphony and chamber music collaborative performances. Visual artists have shared their work at hundreds of venues from small start-up galleries in San Francisco to the de

Young Museum to major venues around the world. There are Developing Environments artist's work in the permanent collection of the National Gallery of Art in Washington, D.C., the J. Paul Getty Museum, San Francisco Museum of Modern Art, Berkeley Art Museum, Los Angeles County Museum of Art, among others. There is an exhaustive list of artistic honors, awards, and exhibitions garnered by the artists (including a Grammy award, shows at the Whitney Biennial, the Rome Prize, and National Endowment of the Arts Fellowships).

Beyond their primary art practices, Developing Environments' artist-members are consistently involved in collaborations outside of the walls of the building, nurturing expansive, cross-disciplinary, and transformational art and social practice events that change the cultural schematics of San Francisco and beyond. Some of the extracurricular projects that have been instigated by Developing Environments members are:

- Curating for the Queer Cultural Center.
- Founding the San Francisco Electronic Music Festival.
- Founding the Marigold Project, which has led the Day of the Dead Festival of the Altars since 1993.
- Founding SF Art & Film (classes for high school students).
- Holding arts-based teaching posts at Cal State East Bay, San Jose State University, San Francisco Art Institute, Stanford, UC Berkeley, and Mills College.

d. Has the business ever been referenced in the media, business trade publication, and/or historical documents?

Developing Environments has been covered in the local media (e.g., San Francisco Chronicle; San Francisco Examiner) in various ways over the years. But the main contribution of Developing Environments is the artists, who have been covered in literally hundreds of articles in local media and trade publications for their artwork and contributions for their particular crafts.

e. Has the business ever received any awards, recognition, or political commendations?

Developing Environments has received commendations from the State legislature and City and County of San Francisco over the years. The most recent was a commendation from Mayor London Breed for Developing Environments' 45th anniversary.

f. How would the community be diminished if the business were to be sold, relocated, shut down, etc.?

As we all know, San Francisco has been losing artists due to high rents and cost of living. As one of the oldest surviving artists communities from the 1970s, Developing Environments is a connection to the communal-living era of the past, but is also a thriving artist community of the present. Providing 46 affordable live-work spaces for a wide variety of artists is a part of the essential fabric of a city trying to maintain its vibrant creative environment. The arts have supported San Francisco's reputation as a culturally significant city. As our city loses more

artists, saving Developing Environments not only saves valuable work space, but also vital living space as well.

CRITERION 3: The business is committed to maintaining the physical features or traditions that define the business

a. Is the business associated with a culturally significant building, structure, object, signage, mural, architectural detail, neon sign, or any other special physical feature that defines the business?

While the exterior of the Developing Environments building is no different than most of the other buildings in the area – large warehouse structures – the activities inside are unique. The artists that began Developing Environments completely renovated the interior, laying out studio spaces and public hallways that flow through the shell of the building, creating unique spaces that now serve as meeting spaces, gallery spaces, and communal utility spaces. The walls are lined with artwork created by the visual artists in the building, again, turning the warehouse into a living example of the artistic creations of the original visionaries and of the current inhabitants.

The building reinforces the communal aspect of the organization. There are communal kitchens, laundries, and bathrooms that foster interaction and supportive living. The layout of the building is a physical manifestation of the community's philosophy of living.

b. In a few words, describe the main business activity you commit to maintaining.

The commitment to helping artists with affordable live-work space in a city that has seen opportunities for artists diminish over the years and to foster community and self-reliance is an essential part of what Developing Environments provides.

While many businesses that began in the 1960s and 1970s have transformed their management style and focus over the years to 'keep up' with the times, Developing Environments is one of the unique businesses that has not significantly changed its by-laws or self-governing rules. The organization is still a completely consensus-based decision-making entity.

c. What challenges is the business facing today?

The current Management Team at Developing Environments is working to continue the businesses success far into the future. They are working on federal 501(c)(3) status, securing a long-term extension on the building lease, looking at other ways to increase the financial security of the organization, and continuing to foster the arts (and artists) in San Francisco. Financial security is by far the biggest challenge facing Developing Environments. Rising rents, utility and operating costs make each year more difficult to offer truly affordable live-work space to the artist community.

Legacy Business Program staff will add the following details:

a. Features or traditions that define the business and should be maintained for the business to remain on the Legacy Business Registry.

Artist live/work community.

b. Other special features of the business location, such as if the property associated with the business is listed on a local, state, or federal historic resources registry.

Developing Environments is located at 540 Alabama Street in a corner building at the intersection of Alabama and Mariposa streets in the Mission. The building also has an entrance on Mariposa Street (2901 Mariposa).

The historic resource status of the building at 540 Alabama Street/2901 Mariposa Street is classified by the Planning Department as Category B, Unknown / Age Eligible. The property is not listed on any local, state, or federal historic resource registry.

The building is a three-story reinforced concrete industrial structure built in 1922. The original owner was the Illinois Glass Company and the building was used as a warehouse. The Glass Company's offices were at 1855 Folsom (now the UCSF Mission Center) and the glass manufacturing building was where the parking lot is located at 15th and Harrison. The train tracks along Harrison connected the manufacturing building to the warehouse where the tracks ran right up to the side entrance of the warehouse. The builder of the warehouse was the Ralph McLeran Company. (Ralph McLeran was a San Francisco Supervisor and was involved in San Francisco politics at the time.) The building changed hands a few times over the years before the current ownership—a private family trust.



Recommendation: Adopt a Resolution to Recommend Approval

Business Description

Developing Environments is an artist live-work space located at 540 Alabama Street in the Mission neighborhood. Founded in 1972 and formally incorporated as a non-profit in 1976, the organization emerged when a group of artists identified a vacant, three-story warehouse at the corner of Alabama and Mariposa Streets and transformed it into a space for artists. The organization's founders envisioned a place where artists could live, create, and be in community with one another. At first, the founders fashioned makeshift studios with cloth barriers and tents; eventually, with the support of building's landlord, the artists erected new walls, electric wiring, plumbing, and windows, bringing the structure up to code. Today, Developing Environments features 46 live-work units, and has provided safe and affordable studio space to more than 375 artists since its inception in the 1970s.

Developing Environments operates with a consensus based, non-hierarchical governing structure. Artist-members share resources, collectively maintain the building facilities, and supporting each other's careers. The organizational philosophy traces its roots to the hippie movement and co-housing experiments of the 1960s, but

continues to be shaped and upheld by the participation of its artist-members. Developing Environment's values also manifest in the layout and physical features of the building, which include communal kitchens, bathrooms, and laundry facilities, along with meeting rooms and shared gallery space.

Artist-members at Developing Environments work in a variety of mediums and forms including performance, writing, photography, painting, jewelry, textile, sculpture, and digital art. Although members have displayed their work in museums and galleries around the world, their primary impact is in San Francisco, where they contribute to the local community in countless ways. Members have served as curators for the Queer Cultural Center, volunteered at the Mission Food Hub, advocated for bikeable and walkable streets, held teaching positions at local colleges, and founded new programs including the San Francisco Electronic Music Festival, Marigold Project, and SF Art & Film. In a city that has been losing artists in recent decades, Developing Environments has also served as a model for how San Francisco can support artists and cultivate a vibrant creative community.

Developing Environments is located at 540 Alabama Street in a Category B (Unknown / Age Eligible) structure on the southwest corner of Alabama and Mariposa Streets in the Mission neighborhood. It is within the PDR-1-G (Production, Repair & Distribution – 1 - General) Zoning District and a 68-X Height and Bulk District.. 540 Alabama Street was included in the Showplace Square/Northeast Mission Historic Resource Survey and received status codes of "6L" and "7R." Despite these evaluations, the property maintains a Planning Department historic resource status of "B" (Unknown / Age Eligible).

Staff Analysis

Review Criteria

1. When was business founded?

Although Developing Environments traces its roots to 1972, the organization was formally established as a California Not-for-Profit Corporation in 1976.

2. Does the business qualify for listing on the Legacy Business Registry? If so, how?

Yes. Developing Environments qualifies for listing on the Legacy Business Registry because it meets all of the eligibility Criteria:

- a. Developing Environments has operated continuously in San Francisco for 46 years.
- b. Developing Environments has contributed to the history and identity of the Mission neighborhood and San Francisco.
- c. Developing Environments is committed to maintaining the physical features and traditions that define the organization.

3. Is the business associated with a culturally significant art/craft/cuisine/tradition?

No, not as a collective organization. However, many individual artist-members have worked on culturally significant art and/or craft projects over the years.



4. Is the business or its building associated with significant events, persons, and/or architecture?

Developing Environments is associated with the transformation of Showplace Square from an industrial area to a hub for artists. The neighborhood now features numerous arts-oriented businesses, organizations, and communities

- 5. Is the property associated with the business listed on a local, state, or federal historic resource registry?

 No.
- 6. Is the business mentioned in a local historic context statement?

No, not as of the date of this Executive Summary.

7. Has the business been cited in published literature, newspapers, journals, etc.?

Yes. Developing Environments has received coverage in the San Francisco Chronicle and San Francisco Examiner. Additionally, numerous articles about individual artist-members have appeared in the press. The organization received a commendation for Mayor London Breed for its 45th anniversary.
