

Highlights of the March Report

- The San Francisco Controller's Office has been tracking the state of the city's economy with monthly reports on a variety of local economic indicators.
- San Francisco metropolitan division lost 11,100 jobs during January and February, though most of the losses were for seasonal or weather-related reasons.
- Local tech employment has led the drop, though this decline is not seasonal and is related to the many layoff announcements made in the last several months. Tech employment is down by 7,600 jobs, or 4.5%, since December.
- The city's unemployment rate rose to 2.9% in February, a 0.7 percentage point increase since December.
- Other indicators have been more positive. New business formation has ticked up since the start of the year, and both Muni Metro and BART ridership recovery improved.
- But February's hotel data was the weakest since March 2022, with revenues at only 57% of February 2019 levels. Hotel occupancy improved somewhat during March.



...But Tech Employment Has Dropped Since Late 2022


Employment Change by Industry Sector, San Francisco Metro Division: Since the Start of the Pandemic, and the Most Recent Two Months





Monthly Unemployment Rate and Employed Residents, San Francisco, Through February 2023





New Business Locations in San Francisco, 3-month Moving Average, Selected Industries: January 2019 - March 2023





Weekly San Francisco Hotel Occupancy Rate and Average Daily Room Rate, Through March 18, 2023




February SF Hotel Revenues Were 57% of 2019 Levels





SF Domestic Air Travel Edged Slightly Up in January






Bridge Crossings Continue to Trend Downward





Average Monthly PM Freeway Speed in San Francisco, Through February, 2023




Muni Metro Ridership at 52% of 2019 Levels in February




Downtown BART Ridership Up to 30% in February

BART Exits At Downtown San Francisco Stations, as a Percentage of the Same Month in 2019, Through February 2023






Though Systemwide BART Ridership Dropped in March


The City's Apartment Rents Remained Flat in March






