Powered Scooter Share Program Update

- Current permits have been extended to June 30, 2024
- Sidewalk detection technology, rider notifications, and monthly reporting requirements
- Two permittees (Lime and Spin)
- Program Evaluation Underway




Program Evaluation


- Consultant-led evaluation process is underway
- Evaluate current program and make recommendation program updates
- Includes focus on sidewalk detection technology requirements
- Vehicle design requirements best practices for safe vehicles
- Climate and Equity impact, peer city review, rider surveys, and a review of reporting requirements all part of evaluation process



Program Evaluation

- Consultant has analyzed SFMTA scooter data including: collision data, travel data, monthly reports, enforcement and citation data
- Rider surveys will be distributed by permittees this month
- Peer city interviews have been conducted
- Key stakeholder interviews in process
- Expect final recommendations by late summer






Scooter Safety Campaign: Phase I

- Scooter Safety Campaign targeting all scooter riders launched on May 1 and will run through July 31
- Three Golden Rules to Improve Scooter Safety
 - 1. No sidewalk riding
 - 2. No speeding
 - 3. No double riding (two people riding one device)







Scooter Safety Campaign: Phase I

- Public safety posters on Muni fleet (interior and exterior)
- Digital displays in the Central Subway stations
- ❖ Blog: <u>Three Golden Rules to Improve Scooter Safety | SFMTA</u>
- Social media messages
 - Facebook, Tweeter, Instagram
- Postcards to hand out at public outreach events





Scooter Safety Campaign: Phase II in Development

- Develop additional safety messages and design content
- Develop Public Service Announcement (PSA) videos with safety messages
- SFMTA would like to collaborate with MDC on PSA videos – including script development, safety messages, spotlighted speakers, etc.
- Target launch October 2023



Street Infrastructure

- Permittees pay rack fee to support SFMTA's bike rack program
 - 3,000+ racks installed since beginning of scooter permit program
 - 11,000+ bike racks available citywide for scooter parking
 - Scooters allowed in bike lanes, not on sidewalks
 - 465 miles of bikeways in San Francisco
 - 78 miles off-street paths
 - 139 miles of bike lanes (Class II)
 - 43 miles of separated bikeways (Class IV)
- ❖ 45+ miles of bike lanes & separated bikeways added since 2018
- 33 miles of Slow Streets
- Active Communities Plan underway



Permanent Adaptive Program

Permit Terms and Conditions

- Adaptive scooters required to comprise 5% of on-street fleet
- Adaptive scooters must be available for reservation through the permittee's mobile application
- Monthly reporting requirements, including ridership, deployment data, and a narrative summary





Complementary Adaptive Program

- Lime and Spin committed to Complementary Adaptive Programs, with additional adaptive devices available for pre-scheduled drop-off and pick-up
- Complementary Adaptive Program devices have longer rental timeslots and are available to riders free of charge
