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> SDDT FY 23-24 and FY 24-25 Budget – Sally Ma, Mayor's Office Deputy Budget Director [Discussion and Possible Action] – 30 minutes
>  Sally Ma presented on the city's budget process, summary of SDDT budget and food security budget.

In March 2023, the financial forecast projected \$780M General Fund deficit with increasing deficits in later year due to post-pandemic economic changes. Thus, the city budget required for making reduction and tradeoffs, including the use of non-General funds and reserves. The Mayor's focus was on sustaining critical services while making targeted investments in priority areas, including health and homelessness.

The FY 24 and FY 25 SDDT budget maintains FY23 SDDT program funding level. Mayor's budget office worked with DPH for a one time saving oral health school-based education and case management for \$200K. Any questions regarding the soda tax funded programs, please contacted the designated departments.

In addition to the soda tax budget, a big investment of the city's budget was directed towards food security investments within the city. The city budget funding enhanced pandemic-era food security programs at \$20M in FY 24 and \$10M in FY25 through the Human Services Agency budget. There will also be additional funding for food access programs also made available through DPH and the Human Rights Commission around \$6.3M in FY 24 and \$5M in FY 25.

Member asks what informs the decision for budget categories to get cut? Is there a one sentence rational when budget cuts are made? Sally responds that the goal is to maintain the budget for critical services. The budget process starts before the Mayor releases city department instructions, then the budget office forecasts and looks ahead of budget planning; departments hold public meetings throughout spring and the Mayor's Office hosts public meetings regarding the budget.

Member asked if a line item is decreased in the SDDT budget, to recoup those funds to make whole, are we to go to the departments to seek if there are additional department funds to support the deficit? Sally responds that is the adopted Mayor's SDDT budget. Sally will follow up with staff regarding water access funds designation to public schools or public access.

- 7. DPH Staff Report [Discussion and Possible Action] 15 minutes
  - a. 5 Year Soda Tax Implementation Celebration

Staff has been working with the steering committee of the 5-year Soda Tax celebration to plan for events to commemorate the passing of the tax. SFPHF submitted an event sponsorship proposal on behalf of Shape Up SF Coalition to Kaiser for just over \$20,000 to support these events. Staff will continue to update SDDTAC members on event planning. Tentative events are scheduled for:

Member asked about the vetting of funding for Florence Fang Community Farm, as they do not work with the Black community in a wholistic and robust way. Staff replied and provided grants process and replied that their proposal submission proposed to work with black families and scored high orally and in their proposal, reviewed with a community review panel. Even though proposals may score high, it is still not authentic. SDDTAC member and staff will continue discussion.

Member suggests for future recommendation, if we want to add healthy equity and representation lens, having this perspective that it is part of our work, having a thought process through our work, will hopefully bring to light other departments, so as it doesn't get lost as the committee does its recommendations, so it doesn't strike a chord with others.

8. SDDT Data Report Update [Discussion and Possible Action] – 20 minutes Christopher shares update with SDDTAC on SDDT Data Report. Some data indicators have been updated, while there are others there isn't data that is usable. Christina notes that there are challenges to getting data to get accurate snapshots of data. Updates to data report will be updated and shared with SDDTAC and will continue to brainstorm proxy ways to get pricing on sugar sweetened beverages in the city.

Member asked if there is data on the increased purchasing of packaged food and beverage for those living in their cars. Chris replies that he is unaware of data related to packaged food purchases.

10. SDDT Data Dashboard, Raimi & Associates [Discussion and Possible Action] 20 minutes Kym Dorman from Raimi & Associates provides update on FY 22-23 SDDT evaluation data. Data derives SDDT grantees from SDDT participant survey or annual or biannual data request/reports. The target of 1,000 surveys for the SDDT participant survey, 951 completed to date. Target for each survey topic was achieved 200+ surveys completed. Kym shares the online interactive SDDT evaluation data hosted on



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the sodatax-sf.org webpage.

Raimi & Associates will continue to support reporting for SDDT cohort 1 funded agencies and grantees. Evaluation plans to support cohort 2 for current fiscal year for PSE grantees is in the works. Please forward any feedback to backbone staff within the next week.

Member asks if survey includes any questions related to economic/income information. Kym will follow up with Paige.

There is an extended data collection phase and Raimi & Associates will work with organizations and anticipate evaluation report to be available by late September early October. Member shared that the the CBOs that were awarded to work with SFUSD are working with them to look at their pre-surveys; who they are outreaching to, can let us know who they are reaching out to, if they say they are to reach out to per their proposal.

Budget Descriptions: SDDTAC recommends investing in strategies that support mental health and well being and workforce pathways for impacted/priority populations. City Departments should contract directly with CBOs through an RFP process managed through **COMMUNITY-BASED GRANTS** the Community Health Equity and Promotion (CHEP) Branch of the Department of Public Health. CBG should support community-based programs and services that address the health inequities of those most targeted by the beverage industry. Funding should go to Community Based Organizations (CBOs) and Faith Based Organizations (FBOs) for the following strategies: 1. Health Education activities including, chronic disease prevention, healthy eating and active living, tap water promotion, oral/dental health 2. Physical Activity opportunities, including: a) Dance and movement, sports, yoga, walking groups, biking, etc.; b) Changes to the built environment (ie sidewalks, streets, parks, buildings, etc) or safety of the built environment that facilitates increased physical activity and active Health education, food security, transportation); physical activity 3. Food Security, including: a) Community-based pantries, community-based hot meals, community kitchens and community home delivery services; b) Increased financial resources (i.e. wages, income, government nutrition supplements, vouchers, etc.); c) Changes to the built environment that facilitate food security; and d) Pursuit of institutional or local policies that facilitate food security; and e) Food Access, including community kitchens and community home delivery services. 4. Water Promotion, such as support for Spa Water Supplies, station maintenance/beautification, refillable water bottles to distribute to communities, water testing 5. Community Based Participatory Research One time infrastructure and capacity building grants for 10 community based food organizations to prepare them to contract with health plans, use medical coding and billing, share confidential Food As Medicine MediCal patient information, and other areas needed to access Medi-Cal funding for meals and groceries Waiver Program and nutrition services rendered. This funding will build off of the successful capacity building cohort piloted in FY 2022-2023 which included 7 CBOs receiving both tailored, individualized technical assistance and cohort-level training and capacity building.
