Remote Accessible Vote-by-Mail System What is a remote accessible vote-by-mail system?



It is a ballot delivery option that allows voters with disabilities to access & mark their ballot from any computer with internet access



Voters must also have access to a printer to print their marked ballot

Remote Accessible Vote-by-Mail System Who is eligible to use the system?

Under California law, only voters with disabilities & those in the military or living overseas are eligible to use this system. To access the ballot, a person must be registered as a vote-by-mail voter








Remote Accessible Vote-by-Mail System

How can I access my ballot?



Please confirm your eligibility to access this system.

Under California law, only voters in the military, overseas voters, and voters with disabilities are eligible to use this accessible vote-by-mail system.

- I am either a voter with a disability or a military or overseas voter, and therefore I am eligible to use this accessible vote-by-mail system.
- I understand that my selections marked by this system and submitted to the San Francisco Department of Elections will then be transferred onto an official ballot for tabulation.
- I understand that my selections marked by this system must be printed by me and submitted to the San Francisco
 Department of Elections. Ballots that are mailed must be postmarked by June 5, 2018. Ballots that are not mailed
 must be received no later than 8 p.m. Pacific Time on Tuesday, June 5, 2018.



Instructions for Returning a Remote Accessible Vote-by-Mail Ballot

Welcome to the San Francisco Department of Elections Remote Accessible Vote-by-Mail system. This system allows you to mark an electronic ballot in a screen-reader accessible format. After marking your ballot, you will need to print and return it to the Department of Elections for counting.

To ensure the privacy of the voter's selections, the Remote Accessible Vote-by-Mail system does not store or transmit the voter's selections over the internet.

This page describes how to return your ballot. Please read through this page carefully. At the bottom of this page you will see a link that will take you to the ballot marking page. Once you begin to mark your ballot, you will not be able to return to this page. You can download the instructions on how to return your ballot in a PDF using the button below.




Step 2 of 3: Review Your Choices



Remote Accessible Vote-by-Mail System What are the deadlines to return my ballot?

Deadlines for Returning Voted Ballots to the Department		
By Mail	Ballots that are mailed must be postmarked or date stamped before or on Election Day , Tuesday , June 5 , & received by the Department no later than Friday , June 8	
In Person	Ballots that are returned in person must be received by the Department no later than 8 p.m. on Election Day, Tuesday, June 5

How does the system ensure voters' privacy and security of selections?



CONDITIONAL APPROVAL OF Democracy Live, Inc. Secure Select 1.0 REMOTE ACCESSIBLE VOTE BY MAIL SYSTEM

Whereas, pursuant to California Elections Code section 19281, no remote accessible vote by mail system, in whole or in part, may be used unless it has received the approval of the Secretary of State; and

Whereas, a remote accessible vote by mail system, in whole or in part, may be used for the sole purpose of marking an electronic vote by mail ballot remotely, outside a polling location, for a voter with disabilities or a military or overseas voter who would then be required to print the paper cast record to be submitted to the elections official; and

Whereas, Democracy Live, Inc., submitted an application for certification of the Secure Select 1.0, which is comprised of Secure Select 1.0 and the Web Server, submitted on or about December 19, 2016 and;

Whereas, during a series of tests conducted by the Secretary of State's office, the remote accessible vote by mail system performed in a manner consistent with California law; and

Whereas, the remote accessible vote by mail system was able to successfully and accurately execute all test cases, scenarios, and scripts developed by the Secretary of State's office; and

Whereas, the request for approval of the remote accessible vote by mail system as described above was considered at a public hearing held September 27, 2017, at Sacramento, California.

The system DOES NOT

- identify or keep track of users
- interact with any remote server when voter marks the ballot
- store or transmit votes over the internet
