NOTICE OF COMMISSION HEARING POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

A. Commission Office

The Civil Service Commission office is located at, 25 Van Ness Avenue, Suite 720, San Francisco, CA 94102. The telephone number is (628) 652-1100. The fax number is (628) 652-1109. The email address is civilservice@sfgov.org and the web address is www.sfgov.org/civilservice/. Office hours are from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

B. Policy Requiring Written Reports

It is the policy of the Civil Service Commission that except for appeals filed under Civil Service Commission Rule 111A Position-Based Testing, all items appearing on its agenda be supported by a written report prepared by Commission or departmental staff. All documents referred to in any Agenda Document are posted adjacent to the Agenda, or if more than one (1) page in length, available for public inspection and copying at the Civil Service Commission office. Reports from City and County personnel supporting agenda items are submitted in accordance with the procedures established by the Executive Officer. Reports not submitted according to procedures, in the format and quantity required, and by the deadline, will not be calendared.

C. Policy on Written Submissions by Appellants

All written material submitted by appellants to be considered by the Commission in support of an agenda item shall be submitted to the Commission office, no later than 5:00 p.m. on the fourth (4th) business day preceding the Commission meeting for which the item is calendared (ordinarily, on Tuesday). An original copy on 8 1/2-inch X 11 inch paper, three-hole punched on left margin, and page numbered in the bottom center margin, shall be provided. Written material submitted for the Commission's review becomes part of a public record and shall be open for public inspection.

D. Policy on Materials being Considered by the Commission

Copies of all staff reports and materials being considered by the Civil Service Commission are available for public view 72 hours prior to the Civil Service Commission meeting on the Civil Service Commission's website at https://sf.gov/civilservice and in its office located at 25 Van Ness Avenue, Suite 720, San Francisco, CA 94102. If any materials related to an item on this agenda have been distributed to the Civil Service Commission after distribution of the agenda packet, those materials will be available for public inspection at the Civil Service Commission's during normal office hours (8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday).

E. Policy and Procedure for Hearings to be Scheduled after 5:00 p.m. and Requests for Postponement

A request to hear an item after 5:00 p.m. should be directed to the Executive Officer as soon as possible following the receipt of notification of an upcoming hearing. Requests may be made by telephone at (628) 652-1100 and confirmed in writing or by fax at (628) 652-1109.

A request for a postponement (continuance) to delay an item to another meeting may be directed to the Commission Executive Officer by telephone or in writing. Before acting, the Executive Officer may refer certain requests to another City official for recommendation. Telephone requests must be confirmed in writing prior to the meeting. Immediately following the "Announcement of Changes" portion of the agenda at the beginning of the meeting, the Commission will consider a request for a postponement that has been previously denied. Appeals filed under Civil Service Commission Rule 111A Position-Based Testing shall be considered on the date it is calendared for hearing except under extraordinary circumstances and upon mutual agreement between the appellant and the Department of Human Resources.

F. Policy and Procedure on Hearing Items Out of Order

Requests to hear items out of order are to be directed to the Commission President at the beginning of the agenda. The President will rule on each request. Such requests may be granted with mutual agreement among the affected parties.

G. Procedure for Commission Hearings

All Commission hearings on disputed matters shall conform to the following procedures: The Commission reserves the right to question each party during its presentation and, in its discretion, to modify any time allocations and requirements.

If a matter is severed from the *Consent Agenda* or the *Ratification Agenda*, presentation by the opponent will be for a maximum time limit of five (5) minutes and response by the departmental representative for a maximum time limit of five (5) minutes. Requests by the public to sever items from the [*Consent Agenda* or] *Ratification Agenda* must be provided with justification for the record.

For items on the *Regular Agenda*, presentation by the departmental representative for a maximum time of five (5) minutes and response by the opponent for a maximum time limit of five (5) minutes.

For items on the Separations Agenda, presentation by the department followed by the employee's

representative shall be for a maximum time limit of ten (10) minutes for each party unless extended by the Commission.

Each presentation shall conform to the following:

- 1. Opening summary of case (brief overview);
- 2. Discussion of evidence;
- 3. Corroborating witnesses, if necessary; and
- 4. Closing remarks.

The Commission may allocate five (5) minutes for each side to rebut evidence presented by the other side.

H. Policy on Audio Recording of Commission Meetings

As provided in the San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance, all Commission meetings are audio recorded in digital form. These audio recordings of open sessions are available starting on the day after the Commission meeting on the Civil Service Commission website at www.sfgov.org/civilservice/.

I. Speaking before the Civil Service Commission

Speaker cards are not required. The Commission will take in-person public comment on all items appearing on the agenda at the time the item is heard. The Commission will take public comment on matters not on the Agenda, but within the jurisdiction of the Commission during the "Requests to Speak" portion of the regular meeting. Maximum time will be three (3) minutes. A subsequent comment after the three (3) minute period is limited to one (1) minute. The timer shall be in operation during public comment. Upon any specific request by a Commissioner, time may be extended. People who have received an accommodation due to a disability (as described below) may provide their public comments remotely. The Commission will also allow public comment from members of the public who choose to participate remotely. It is possible that the Commission may experience technical challenges that interfere with the ability of members of the public to participate in the meeting remotely. If that happens, the Commission will attempt to correct the problem, but may continue the hearing so long as people attending in-person are able to observe and offer public comment.

J. Public Comment and Due Process

During general public comment, members of the public sometimes wish to address the Civil Service Commission regarding matters that may come before the Commission in its capacity as an adjudicative body. The Commission does not restrict this use of general public comment. To protect the due process rights of parties to its adjudicative proceedings, however, the Commission will not consider, in connection with any adjudicative proceeding, statements made during general public comment. If members of the public have information that they believe to be relevant to a mater that will come before the Commission in its adjudicative capacity, they may wish to address the Commission during the public comment portion of that adjudicative proceeding. The Commission will not consider public comment in connection with an adjudicative proceeding without providing the parties an opportunity to respond.

K. Policy on use of Cell Phones, Pagers and Similar Sound-Producing Electronic Devices at and During Public Meetings

The ringing and use of cell phones, pagers and similar sound-producing electronic devices are prohibited at this meeting. Please be advised that the Chair may order the removal from the meeting room of any person(s) responsible for the ringing or use of a cell phone, pager, or other similar sound-producing electronic devices.

Information on Disability Access

The Civil Service Commission normally meets in Room 400 (Fourth Floor) City Hall, 1 Dr. Carlton B. Goodlett Place. However, meetings not held in this room are conducted in the Civic Center area. City Hall is wheelchair accessible. The closest accessible BART station is the Civic Center, located 2 ½ blocks from City Hall. Accessible MUNI lines serving City Hall are 47 Van Ness Avenue, 9 San Bruno and 71 Haight/Noriega, as well as the METRO stations at Van Ness and Market and at Civic Center. Accessible curbside parking has been designated at points in the vicinity of City Hall adjacent to Grove Street and Van Ness Avenue.

Subject: Personal Services Contracts Approval Request

This report contains four (4) personal services contracts (PSCs) in accordance with the revised Civil Service Commission (CSC) procedures for processing PSCs that became effective on November 5, 2014.

City resources do not possess the requirements of needing firms to be registered with both the Security and Exchange Commission and the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board. City staff do not possess the qualification of having passed the Series 50 exam which is required in order to engage in municipal advisory activities.

1. Description of Work

A. Scope of Work/Services to be Contracted Out:

Provide municipal financing advisory services to Office of Public Finance and other Controller's Office and City department staff in the following areas: general obligation bonds, certificates of participation, lease revenue bonds, Mello-Roos special tax bonds, tax allocation bonds, revenue bonds, tax-exempt commercial paper, special tax and fiscal consulting, and other forms of municipal financing.

B. Explain why this service is necessary and the consequence of denial:

Thanks for the additional questions. Please see answers below.

1. In the first few months of Covid, many of our current clinics were modified to expand services (such as being requested in this PSC) and increase capacity, i.e. Tom Waddell, Curry Center, and many more. Does this not meet your urgency need?

These clinics do not have the physical space capacity to provide a drop-in lounge for 100-200 people a day. The main service being solicited in this RFP is a drop-in space, where people who use drugs can access to rest, and receive other health-supporting services.

2. What specifically do you mean by lower-barrier care, and can you provide the internal data you referred to that reflects that a large number of PWUD/PEH clients are not getting served?

By lower-barrier care we mean drop-in services, where a client does not need an appointment to access services. We also mean services that do not require lengthy eligibility paperwork, or insurance to access the sites. We have done internal reviews of overdose decedents that show only 48% of overdose decedents in calendar year 2022 had accessed any DPH services in the 3 years prior to their death, indicating that we need to expand our reach to ensure we are reaching those at the highest risk of overdose deaths. This data is internal, and should not be shared outside of this thread.

My apologies for the delay, our Syringe Access Program Manager was OOO with COVID, but has returned and provided the information you requested at our meeting on 9/27.

Firstly, the Syringe Access Collaborative (SAC) is funded through the Department of Public Health to provide harm reduction services to people who use drugs in San Francisco. The SAC sites comprise of 4 agencies that provide services either at their fixed sites, or at pop-up style sites that operate on a weekly basis. The current sites are limited in their capacity to provide services, and clients are able to visit the sites to receive harm reduction supplies, linkages, and other services, but they do not provide a drop-in or lounge space for clients due to their limited size. The following list of services are not provided at all sites, and some are offered on a rotational basis based on program capcity (i.e. on-site HCV treatment may only be offered one day a week, during specific times).

Hi Thomas,

My apologies for the delay, our Syringe Access Program Manager was 000 with COVID, but has returned and provided the information you requested at our meeting on 9/27.

Firstly, the Syringe Access Collaborative (SAC) is funded through the Department of Public Health to provide harm reduction services to people who use drugs in San Francisco. The SAC sites comprise of 4 agencies that provide services either at their fixed sites, or at pop-up style sites that operate on a weekly basis. The current sites are limited in their capacity to provide services, and clients are able to visit the sites to receive harm reduction supplies, linkages, and other services, but they do not provide a drop-in or lounge space for clients due to their limited size. The following list of services are not provided at all sites, and some are offered on a rotational basis based on program capcity (i.e. on-site HCV treatment may only be offered one day a week, during specific times).

SAC Average Number of Contacts per Month: 13,280 # of SAC Sites: 12 locations (some are fixed, and some are weekly pop-ups)

- overdose prevention

Q: Are there contractors in mind or contractors you believe will bid on this?

A: There are contractors that have historically provided services to People Who Use Drugs (PWUD) and any are invited to bid

Q: Are there any of these that meet the requirements that you believe will apply? A: Yes

Q: The clinic current state is described as having an overcapacity and currently unable to handle the needs by the community. Why can't the additional needs be absorbed?

A: There is such an urgency due to the overdose crisis and need to reach People Experiencing Homelessness (PEH), many who have history of not trusting City clinics and City providers.

Community providers have developed trust with this population. There is often historical mistrust of governmental agencies among this group.

Q: This implies a large fraction of the population is in this category. Is there any evidence?

A: There is anecdotal evidence and some internal data that reflects a large number of PWUD/PEH that are not getting served and there is a goal to be able to reach this population by getting served by community harm reduction providers.

Q: Have you done surveys with the community to come up with this hypothesis? If so, please share.

A: No formal surveys available to share.

Q: Many of these services are being provided, is their data with regards to the current services being provided?

A: Yes, Business office would be able to provide service utilization for similar services because there is currently not a model of care providing the services as being requested by the new solicitation.

Q: how was the \$72M PSC amount determined

A: \$4M per site x 3 sites x 5 years

NOTES:

Q: Regarding the duration of the contract, why 5 years?

A: The default is usually 10 years. We want to review and reconfigure the strategy if needed within 5 years.

Q: What is the strategy based off? Is there a model we're following?

A: The model is one where there is a drop-in space available, where anyone can come in off the street and access services at anytime.

Q: Are the linkage services just to a DPH site?

A: Yes, and to nonprofit city partners or other social services sites.

Q: Essential functions are currently being performed by current members, what data do you have and why the need for so many additional sites and pop-ups?

A: There are no pop-ups for this program. For the RFP, there are 3 new brick and mortar locations. Due to the increased number of overdose deaths in the community, there is a need to get people off the street in as many settings as quickly as possible.

Q: Is this an overflow? How much of an increase has occurred? What length of time? A: We're looking at number of overdose fatalities. We're looking at data since 2018 when fentanyl arrived in SF from the Office of Medical Examiner. Links provided:

Q: Where are the 3 sites located?

A: To be determined. They will be located in high priority neighborhoods – Tenderloin and SOMA primarily.

Q: Are these going to be 24/7 clinics? 9-5? To be determined?

A: To be determined based on proposals we receive. At minimum, sites will operate 40 hours per week with possible evening hours.

Q: Who are the contractors?

A: We don't know. We are doing a competitive solicitation.

Q: How did we come up with dollar amount?

A: It is based on an estimate that we have budgeted. It is a new initiative. In the PSC, we add in a buffer with our standard contingency if there's growth or if we want to add an additional site. Growth is built into the model.

Q: What metrics are we using? If fentanyl deaths go down?

A: Metrics include number of deaths, racial disparities, and other substance use treatment. We will look at how many people enter a form of substance use treatment, or if they get successfully linked to an outside entity.

Q: Is there anything we're going to do differently? We want to lower barriers and have people feel welcome to come in, but the way it was portrayed led to a poor image on DPH (e.g. Tenderloin Center). [I stated this as: There was backlash from the prior Tenderloin efforts by HR360. What is being done differently.]

A: This will be drastically different. We will have neighborhood sites instead. The goal is to spread this out and have a neighborhood based approach that can reach a smaller volume of people with more onsite services, particularly medical care and treatment.

Q: Will people be allowed to use onsite?

A: No. Just prevention and treatment services will be available.

Q: Why couldn't any of our existing clinics or facilities be expanded to offer SAC services?

A: Due to the urgent need to rapidly implement these sites to combat the rising number of unintentional drug overdose deaths in San Francisco, DPH aims to solicit and implement these services as quickly as possible. Existing clinics are not able to expand services because they are already serving the maximum number of clients. Implementing these programs sites at new civil services sites would cause a much longer implementation period, working against the urgency to bring services to people who use drugs as quickly as possible.

Q: Is there any data that evidences that clients prefer SAC sights over DPH clinics or that they produce better outcomes?

A: DPH already serves an important function in providing services to people who use drugs, but syringe access sites are able to provide lower-barrier care to people who use drugs that may not be ready to access a DPH civil services program or site. Further, syringe access sites have been providing services to people who use drugs for over 30 years in San Francisco, and have built trusting relationships with people who use drugs. DPH's aim is to offer as many points of entry for people who use drugs to access care. There is anecdotal evidence and some internal data that reflects a large number of PWUD/PEH that are not getting served and there is a goal to be able to reach this population by getting served by community harm reduction providers.

1. Description of Work

A. Scope of Work/Services to be Contracted Out:

These services will be provided by contractors responding to a new RFP to create a Drug Medi-Cal Organized Delivery System (DMC-ODS) pilot, which tests a new paradigm for the organized delivery of health care services for Medicaid eligible individuals with a substance use disorder. Its purpose is to demonstrate how such a system will increase the success of DMC beneficiaries while decreasing other system health care costs. Critical elements include:

- --Providing a continuum of care modeled after the American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) Criteria for Substance Use Disorder (SUD) treatment services, which describes specific service levels within Opioid Treatment, Intensive Outpatient, and Residential SUD services;
- --Increasing local control and accountability, creating utilization controls, and increasing program oversight and integrity;
- --Requiring evidence-based practices and increasing coordination with other systems of care, including primary care and mental health;
- --Expanding the SUD treatment workforce by including Licensed Practitioners of Healing Arts; and
- --Providing more intensive services for the criminal justice population.

Services will:

- --Prioritize services to specific populations, including persons who are Black/African American, homeless, incarcerated or involved with the criminal/juvenile justice systems/Drug Court, adolescents aged 10-18 years old, Transitional Aged Youth (TAY) aged 18-24 years old, Lesbian/Gay/Bisexual/Transgender/Queer/Questioning/Intersex/Ally/Two-Spirit, Pregnant/Parenting women with children, and/or whose primary substance is alcohol.
- --Prioritize services in specific geographic areas, including Hayes Valley/Tenderloin/North of Market, South of Market, Bernal Heights/Inner Mission/94110, Bayview Hunter's Point/94124, and Southeast/Visitacion Valley/Sunnydale/94134
- --Include patient engagement and peer support, medication assisted treatment, withdrawal management, case management, and recovery services and supports, with appropriate integration of adolescent-specific considerations, pregnant women and women with dependent children residential treatment requirements, evidence-based practices, DMC-ODS compliant policies and regulations, electronic health records and data systems, evaluation and quality improvement, workforce development and staffing, ancillary treatment and

outreach services.

B. Explain why this service is necessary and the consequence of denial:

The State funding that San Francisco receives for Substance Use Disorder treatment is now the result of California's Medi-Cal waiver, which received Federal approval August 2015 and was rolled out to counties in steps throughout 2016. This waiver allows counties to support a much wider range of options to people with low incomes who are on Medi-Cal. Without this funding, San Francisco's funding for SUD treatment would be severely limited and people needing these services would likely be untreated and/or require significant increases in repetitive primary care and mental health treatment, experiencing worsening symptoms, requiring more expensive treatment, and escalating mortality rates.

To extend the PSC duration with a corresponding increase in amount to enable the continuation of services.

All providers must also meet State and City requirements for Drug Medi-Cal certification, harm reduction, cultural and linguistic competency, Americans with Disabilities Act and other access requirements, as well as have the ability to serve priority service populations and geographic service areas.

"5000. This part shall be known and may be cited as the Lanterman-Petris-Short Act.

"5120. It is the policy of this state as declared and established in this act and in the Lanterman-Petris-Short Act that the care and treatment of mental patients be provided in the local community. In order to achieve uniform statewide implementation of the policies of this act, it is necessary to establish the statewide policy that, notwithstanding any other provision of law, no city or county shall discriminate in the enactment, enforcement, or administration of any zoning laws, ordinances, or rules and regulations between the use of property for the treatment of general hospital or nursing home patients and the use of property for the psychiatric care and treatment of patients, both inpatient and outpatient. Because these services are primarily temporary crowd and traffic safety needs, the City typically requires a short-term rental of equipment. Contractors own and bear responsibility for a safe and proper setup and removal of the rental equipment.
