General Information	Why was the Student Success Fund created?	<p>As we emerge from the COVID-19 pandemic, students in the San Francisco Unified School District (the “District”) are experiencing a greater need for an integrated academic and social/emotional learning and support system to succeed in school.</p> <p>Current conditions in the District’s schools, exacerbated by the pandemic and persistent funding constraints—due to historic underfunding of public schools, declining enrollment, and increasing costs of operating schools—have resulted in too many students struggling in core academic areas, with many testing below grade level and experiencing unmet mental health challenges and/or other barriers to learning, including pervasive poverty, systemic racism, and other trauma. Many schools lack robust enrichment activities, such as arts, music, and sports, that educate the entire mind and body, trauma-informed practices, and mental health services.</p> <p>The Student Success Fund was created to establish a fund whereby school(s) and the District could apply for grants to implement innovative programs designed to enhance student achievement or social/emotional wellness. The goal is to improve student outcomes through the funding of these programs.</p>

General Information	Could you please explain the specific differences between the Student Success Fund and RFP?	<p>The Student Success Fund (SSF) is the legislation that was passed (Student Success Fund Charter Amendment) to provide an opportunity for a school community to address the historic underfunding of public schools, declining enrollment, and increasing costs of operating school which have resulted in too many students struggling in core academic areas. The long-term funding support from the SSF aims to raise academic achievement and/or social/emotional wellness of students.</p> <p>The Department of Children, Youth and Their Families (DCYF) is the entity that is required to implement the legislation which includes creating a process whereby school(s) and the school district apply for SSF grants.</p> <p>The Student Success Fund Application process is the mechanism to solicit grants. The actual application provides details, requirements, and timelines. It also includes questions that the school(s) or District must answer when applying for the grant. The information in the application is reviewed and scored to determine which school sites are funded.</p>
General Information	What if our School Site Council is not ready?	If a school does not have a robust School Site Council that meets regularly, has active members, and is practicing shared decision making, that is ready to be engaged in, support or sign off on a full Student Success Fund Implementation Grant, the school can receive a Student Success Fund Technical Assistance/Readiness Grant for the first year to get up and running, and prepared to apply for a full implementation grant the following year.
General Information	Discrepancies in grant amounts... website says annual grants up to \$1m, the application says \$350k to 550k per year.	The Student Success Fund Readiness Grant allocations are up to \$350K. Implementation Grant allocations are up to \$550K. The website has been corrected. The legislation stated that grants will be up to \$1M however, DCYF retains the authority to reduce that amount.
General Information	Discrepancy between "Grant term" and "annual amounts"? does the Term mean 2x disbursements of the annual amount?	Grant Term refers to the duration of the grant. For example, Readiness Grants are for two (2) years and Implementation Grants are for 5 years. "Annual Amounts" refer to the amount of funding that school sites will receive each school year. For example, if you are awarded \$350K for a Readiness Grant you will receive \$350K for School Year 2024-2025 and \$350K for School Year 2025-2026.

General Information	The application does not clarify that the grant has to be for a *NEW* strategy exactly	<p>The program, initiative, or strategy identified in the grant application does not need to be a "new" strategy. It can be an existing program that has shown to improve student outcomes and additional funds would scale the program or keep the program intact.</p> <p>The purpose of the Student Success Fund was to establish a fund whereby school(s) and the District could apply for grants to implement innovative programs designed to enhance student achievement or social/emotional wellness. The goal is to improve student outcomes through the funding of these programs.</p>
General Information	What are the updated projected grant amounts over the next few years given the looming budget deficit and falling tax revenues?	<p>Currently the Student Success Fund allocation is at \$35M.</p> <p>Under Proposition G, each year the City would place money in the Fund, as follows:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • School Year 2023–2024: \$11 million • School Year 2024–2025: \$35 million • School Year 2025–2026: \$45 million • School Year 2026–2027: \$60 million <p>The City would make contributions to the Fund through fiscal year 2037–38 and the amounts would be adjusted annually. However, if the City is not able to follow this trajectory it will not fall below \$35M. We will closely monitor the city budget status over the next 5 years.</p>

General Information	Could I adjust the spending of these funds in March once I know if we get the grant so it can be more interconnected to our finalized site plan and the site budget?	Yes, school sites will be able to adjust their budgets. Grant recipients will have their award amounts loaded into their SFUSD site budget after March 13, 2024. The site budgets will be updated prior to the final budget submission date. Implementation Grantees must ensure all changes align with the Implementation Plan that has been submitted.
General Information	RFP needs approval by School Counsel?	According to the legislation: (A) The Eligible School must have a School Site Council that has endorsed the Eligible School's grant funding proposal and has committed to supporting the implementation of the programs and/or staffing funded by the grant. The SSF grant funding proposal must be endorsed by the School Site Council (SSC) and the SSC must commit to supporting the implementation of the programs and/or staffing funded by the grant.

General Information	Can non-profits apply?	Applications will only be accepted from individual school sites directly. All stakeholders, including students, families, educators, and community partners should be part of the co-creation and visioning of their school and are invaluable in this process. Individual schools may decide to include a non-profit's services as part of their strategy and comprehensive plan to improve academic or social emotional outcomes, but the school itself must apply, implement the grant, determine which strategies, and whether they are provided by a school staff or nonprofit/s, will best meet the needs of their student population.

All school sites funded through the Student Success Fund will be held accountable to the goals and outcomes they have identified in the proposal they submit. School sites will be required to engage in annual progress reporting to demonstrate growth in student outcomes, and to provide a narrative of what steps have been taken towards meeting site goals. At the 3-year mark school sites will be evaluated on the progress to date then again at the 5-year mark to determine if funding should continue for an additional 5 years. For the purposes of this definition, Core/Foundational Staffing also includes the school principal." Eligibility/Expenditures/Use of Funds

If our school is not listed on the eligibility list for Community Schools, can we still apply for this grant?

Yes, a school that is not listed on the eligibility list may apply for this grant.

However, the school must meet the Eligibility criteria in the legislation:

- (A) The Eligible School must have a School Site Council that has endorsed the Eligible School's grant funding proposal and has committed to supporting the implementation of the programs and/or staffing funded by the grant.
- (B) The Eligible School must have a full-time Community School Coordinator or must plan to hire and in fact hire a Community School Coordinator, who will serve in a leadership role working alongside the Eligible School's principal in implementing the grant and ensuring that the programs funded by the grant integrate with and enhance the Eligible School's academic programs, social/emotional supports, and other programming. If there is a program or a community-based organization integrally connected to the Eligible School that provides on-site services and support for students and their families, including without limitation an after-school, Beacon, or other program, the Community School Coordinator must fully integrate these programs or organizations so they work together to enhance the academic learning and social/emotional support that occurs during the regular school day. The Community School Coordinator must participate in the School Site Council to help it gain and maintain the skills and capacity to meaningfully reflect the values of the school community and support the implementation of programs funded by each Student Success Fund Grant. The District or the Eligible School may pay for the Community School Coordinator with monies allocated through Student Success Grants or Technical Assistance Grants.
- (C) The Eligible School must agree to coordinate with City departments and with the District's administration to ensure that all resources, strategies, and programs at the Eligible School best serve students and their families. If the Eligible School implements initiatives that advance the community school model but are not funded by a grant under the Fund (for example,

The legislation refers to this position as a 'Community School Coordinator,' this person's main job is to work with the school Principal and community to support and coordinate the success of the programs and/or school-wide strategies that the school chooses, to improve the academic achievement and/or social/emotional wellness of students who are falling behind (See Community School Coordinator description).</p>

Funding	How many of each grant (Readiness and Implementation) does DCYF anticipate awarding?	We do not have a set number of grants that we plan to award in each funding category. We have allotted \$6.35M for Readiness Grants and \$13.375M for Implementation Grants
Funding	Considering that the funding awards for DCYF's 5-year cycle are coming on March 11th, will those amounts impact the amount awarded for SSF if there is overlap of proposed work?	Funding awarded in DCYF's 5-year cycle has no bearings on the funding amount awarded through Student Success Fund. These are two separate processes that are not connected.
Funding	If we are awarded a Readiness Grant and then meet all qualifications for the Implementation Grant during the next school year, can we apply for an Implementation Grant at the end of the 2024-25 school year instead of waiting till the end of the grant period through the 2025-26 school year?	School sites that are awarded a Readiness Grant will have an opportunity to apply for an Implementation Grant at the end of FY24-25 as long as they have met all the eligibility requirements for the Implementation Grant. You do not need to have a CCSPP grant in order to apply.
Funding	What is the amount of approval for RFP Vs Student Success Fund?	The allocation amount for the Student Success Fund (SSF) in School Year 2024-2025 is \$35M. The total amount available in direct grants to school sites will be \$19.9M (<i>\$6.35M for Readiness Grants and \$13.375M for Implementation Grants</i>) in School Year 2024-2025 with the anticipation that all awarded Readiness Grantees will be eligible for Implementation Grants by School Year 2026-2027, increasing total allocation available in direct grants to schools to \$23.4M.
Funding	Moving from Readiness-> Implementation. Can we do that faster than the two-year grant term if possible? can schools progress from Readiness to Implementation ahead of Term? or must we wait the full two years.	School sites that are awarded a Readiness Grant will have an opportunity to apply for an Implementation Grant at the end of School Year 2024-2025 and School Year 2025-2026 as long as they have met all the eligibility requirements for the Implementation Grant. Funding	What is that difference between Readiness Vs Implementation Grants? Who can apply where to get mor information	<p>The Student Success Fund Readiness Grants are for school sites that need support to meet the eligibility criteria (https://www.dcyf.org/2024ssfapp) for an Implementation Grant. For example, if your School Site Council is not yet ready to engage in and plan for a full Implementation Grant, you may apply for the Readiness Grant. The funds can be used to pay for a position to work with the school community to coordinate the process, conduct a landscape analysis to identify existing resources and gaps (such as staffing, programs, and partnerships) to address the identified needs, support the completion of the Hopes & Dreams Assessments, identify key strategies across the school community and build shared decision-making structures.</p> <p>The Student Success Fund Implementation Grants are for school sites that have a plan and are ready to implement. For example, if your school has a School Site Council that is engaged and are able to give input into and sign off on an Implementation Plan Grant to raise the academic achievement or social/emotional wellness of your students, you may apply for the Implementation Plan. The funds allocated with this grant can support a position to coordinate the process (what is being called the Community Schools Coordinator), cover the specific programs and/or school-wide interventions you have identified. The Implementation Grant can also fund an existing and current strategy that has shown promise or growth with students in academic achievement and/or social emotional wellness.</p> <p>More information can be found at https://www.dcyf.org/2024ssfapp.</p>
Funding	When will there be another grant cycle?	Yes, there will be another grant cycle. Any school site that is awarded a Readiness Grant will have the ability to apply for an Implementation Grant for School Year 2025-2026 or School Year 2026-2027.
Funding	The current budget template reflects 23-24 salary rates, how should we project salary costs accurate to 24-25 rates?	When sites receive their SFUSD Site Based Budget Guide, you can use the updated 24-25 salaries rates to project costs according to updated average salary costs.

Any info you could provide to get me started would be really helpful.</p>	<p>SFUSD does not have the capacity to support with providing community partners lists of organizations that hold MOUs or contracts with individual sites. Organizations may view the MOU Status list on the District public page for completing an MOU.</p>
Outreach	<p>Do you know if there have been any schools that have not been receptive to the community schools model within the district? If so, I think sharing what school sites those are will support the council to prepare for conversations at non community schools, including how to strategize around school buy in and receptivity to the community schools model.</p>	<p>All SFUSD school sites that qualified for the California Department of Education- California Community School Partnership Program grant were invited to apply. School sites with an Unduplicated Pupil Percentage (UPP) of over 50% (calculated by dividing the number of students who are either foster youth, English Language Learners, or qualify for free and reduced lunch, divided by the total enrollment as represent in the CALPADS CDE Dashboard), were invited to apply. During the 2021-2022 application, only sites above an 80% UPP received the grant, in the 2022-2023 application, only sites above 69% UPP received funding.</p> <p>Any school site with interest in applying for funds related to implementing a Community Schools can seek assistance from Chris Tsukida, Director of Community Schools at tsukidac2@sfusd.edu.</p>

Partnerships	Why are they connected?	<p>The Student Success Fund Grants were intentionally planned to leverage those sites with existing funding from the California Community School Partnership Program through the California Department of Education (CDE) in order to ensure that site awards can be sustainable and consistent over time, even after the five-year CDE grants sunset. Once CCSP grants sunset the Student Success Fund will pick up the loss of funding in order to keep funding consistent and sites whole. In addition, both grants require the use of a community-school framework and we wanted to provide an opportunity of alignment for the CCSP funded school site.</p>

The Rapid Response Funds are flexible funds set aside for emergency needs (such as crisis support etc.), as well as to fund discrete problem solving and emergent strategies from school sites in service of SFUSD's Goals and Guardrails , particularly the Whole Child guardrail. In general, funds will be available annually and accessible year-round for short term services.
Rapid Response	Can Rapid Response Funds be spent on Gift Cards as an incentive for families of Truant Kids (e.g., gas or food), to help curtail the high absenteeism at our school?	Currently gift cards are not an allowable incentive for students/families to address absenteeism. Direct incentives as part of program participation are allowable in partnership with the SFUSD Career Technology Education team by way of student stipends. School sites must adhere to all requirements of the SFUSD CTE and Accounting Department. Students can receive a stipend maximum of \$599.

Staffing	What SFUSD staff positions are eligible to be funded by SFF (assuming they are matched to Needs Assessment & not previously budgeted positions)?	<p>The Student Success Funds are not meant to supplant core staff (now known as Foundational Staff).</p> <p>Schools applying for Implementation Grants may be able to use the Funds to pay for supplemental staff such as paras, nurses, and social workers if these positions are essential to an overall and coherent school-wide strategy and can demonstrate that they are essential to moving the needle in one of two areas: student academic achievement and/or social/emotional wellness.</p> <p>Some examples might be:</p> <p>Example 1: If a school is implementing a strategy to support newcomer students with individualized plans that include in-class academic and socio-emotional supports, you may want to request funding for either a Social Worker and/or a CBO staff to provide these essential services.</p> <p>Example 2: If a school has identified that there is a need to increase literacy and attendance scores of 9th graders, a plan may be to hire a counselor and/or para to case manage, provide additional tutoring, incentives to attend class every day and be on time. It is designed to expand the SFUSD educator and college and career pathways and to address workforce shortages in paraprofessional, school social worker, school district nurse and after school staffing. School sites are not eligible to apply for this funding.</p>

Staffing	What is the role of the Community School Coordinator?	<p>The legislation requires that the Community School coordinator will serve in a leadership role working alongside the Eligible School’s principal in implementing the grant and ensuring that the programs funded by the grant integrate with and enhance the Eligible School’s academic programs, social/emotional supports, and other programming.</p> <p>The Community School Coordinator is the primary person overseeing the implementation and ultimate success of the programs and/or school-wide interventions that the school chooses, to improve the academic achievement and/or social/emotional wellness of students who are falling behind.</p> <p>If there is a program or a community-based organization integrally connected to the Eligible School that provides on-site services and support for students and their families, including without limitation an after-school, Beacon, or other program, the Community School Coordinator must fully integrate these programs or organizations so they work together to enhance the academic learning and social/emotional support that occurs during the regular school day.</p>
Staffing	Does a school have to hire a community school coordinator?	The Eligible School must have a full-time Community School Coordinator or must plan to hire and in fact hire a Community School Coordinator.
