BUSINESS DESCRIPTION

Established in 1969 by forward-thinking landscape architect Michael Painter, MPA Design is an acclaimed landscape architecture and urban design firm with a portfolio consisting of over 3,000 completed projects.

MPA Design is one of the oldest continuously operating design firms on the West Coast and provides a holistic design approach to its projects that is site-specific. Over the past five decades, MPA Design has contributed to the growth and vibrancy of the San Francisco Bay Area through producing sustainable design projects, including the Doyle Drive Redesign Plan, the St. Regis Hotel, the U.C. Davis Medical Center Cancer Treatment Facility, the John F. Kennedy Gravesite, Twin Peaks Overlook Project, and the Great Highway and Ocean Beach Reconstruction Plan. MPA Design counts among its clientele many corporate, academic, and non-profit institutions including Stanford University, U.C. Berkeley, Hewlett Packard, and The Presidio Trust, among others.

Founder Michael Painter passed away in June 2018, and the business is now directed by Susan Painter, Michael's wife.

- MPA Design was founded by Michael Painter, a significant, nationally recognized landscape architect who contributed to the landscape architecture and sustainable design fields. Painter earned a bachelor's degree in landscape architecture from the University of California, Berkeley, in 1956, followed by a master's degree in urban design from the Harvard Graduate School of Design. He completed over 850 projects throughout his career. Significant local projects included the Presidio Parkway, the AT&T Administrative Center, the Genentech Campus, the HP Corporate Headquarters, and the Great Highway/Ocean Beach Re-Construction.
- The business rents its office at 414 Mason Street, in the Native Sons Building, which is an Article 11 Individual Resource and is located within the Kearny-Market-Mason-Sutter Conservation District. Additionally, the building appears eligible for the National Register as an individual property through survey evaluation. The building at 414 Mason Street is discussed in Architecture, Planning, And Preservation Professionals: A Collection of Biographies Historic Context Statement.
- Michael Painter and MPA Design have been mentioned in numerous publications including Landscape Architecture Magazine and The Washington Post.
- The firm has received over 100 awards since 1969, including earning the Community Service Award from the American Institute of Architecture for the San Francisco Presidio Parkway project; numerous American Landscape Architecture Association Merit and Honor Awards; and an Award of Excellence from the Urban Land Institute.
- With regard to racial and social equity, MPA Design is one of the oldest, continuously operating, women-owned small business landscape architectural firms in the Unites States. This business contributes to the cultural fabric of San Francisco through high quality landscape design for local parks and educational institutions. MPA Design has also participated in several community groups within the design field, including SPUR (San Francisco Bay Area Planning and Urban Research Association) and the local chapter of the American Society of Landscape Architecture.

Written Historical Narrative

INTRODUCTION

a. Describe the business. What does it sell or provide?

Founded in 1969 by Michael Painter, San Francisco based MPA Design is a highly acclaimed landscape architectural and urban design services firm with a portfolio consisting of over 3,000 completed projects. MPA Design is one of the oldest continuously operating design firms on the West Coast. The success of the firm is recognized through its large base of repeat clients, over 100 design awards, and notable work featured in numerous books and publications. Projects have spanned a broad spectrum of geographies, topographies, and climactic zones. Examples of the firm's work can be found throughout many regions of the continental United States, Hawaii, Tahiti, and several European countries.

b. Describe whom the business serves.

MPA Design has three primary focused areas of client service – commercial, mixed-use/multi-family housing, and non-profit/government.

Select clients have included Stanford University, U.C. Berkeley, Genentech (Roche), Hewlett-Packard, Bayer, The Presidio Trust, U.S. Department of Defense, U.S. Department of the Interior and many others.

c. In about 2-5 words (15-30 characters), describe what the business is known for.

Client-centric, innovative, and sustainable design.

a. Provide a short history of the business, including locations and owners.

Michael Painter founded Michael Painter & Associates as a California Corporation in San Francisco on 17 July 1969. The firm's original office and headquarters was located at 562 Mission Street in the South of Market neighborhood.

On 28 September 1984, the firm's name was changed to MPA Design.

Subsequently, on 1 December 1994, the business relocated its headquarters to 414 Mason Street in the Union Square neighborhood, where it remains today.

After relocating, Michael continued working with his local strategic partners, the San Francisco city government, and several federal agencies to adopt one of his most impactful projects. He proposed redesigning the roadway which runs through the Presidio of San Francisco and connects San Francisco to the Golden Gate Bridge. Today nearly 40 million motorists each year enjoy traversing this significantly improved thoroughfare. The resultant, Presidio Parkway, has become one of the firm's marquee projects in recent years.

Unfortunately, Michael Painter passed away in June 2018. At that time, Susan Painter, MPA's Corporate Secretary and Michael's wife, assumed the role of President and became 100 percent shareholder of MPA Design. The business continues to further penetrate its installed base from its Mason Street headquarters while, simultaneously, renewing its growth by both (a) adding new clients and (b) diversifying into markets.

b. Provide the ownership history of the business in a consolidated year-to-year format.

c. Describe any circumstances that required the business to cease operations in San Francisco for any significant length of time.

MPA Design has remained in continuous operation in San Francisco since its founding in 1969. While navigating challenges across numerous business cycles, the business has never ceased operations for any length of time.

a. Describe the business' contribution to the history and/or identity of the neighborhood, community, business sector, or San Francisco as a whole.

Since 1969, MPA Design has significantly contributed to the growth and success of the local San Francisco Bay Area and many other regions throughout the United States – helping to foster sustainable and environmentally conscious design. MPA Design has also launched and nurtured the careers of many young designers who have gone on to develop their own award-winning practices. Finally, its designs have contributed to the growth of many anchor corporate and non-profit institutions that have proven critical to the development of critical U.S. industries as well as global economic growth.

MPA Design is currently one of the oldest, continuously operating, Women-Owned Small Business (WOSB) landscape architectural firms on the West Coast of the Unites States.

The company's headquarters is located just off Union Square and has become a business staple in a neighborhood that has recently experienced a sharp drop in business occupancy levels post-pandemic. Nevertheless, MPA Design has remained a great business neighbor. During these challenging times, the firm has served its local community through not only donating its design services to efficiently deliver impactful projects to local clients, but also through supporting other San Francisco businesses in its procurement and strategic partnering strategy.

b. Is the business associated with significant people or events, either now or in the past?

The firm's founder, Michael Painter, was a significant, nationally-recognized landscape architect. Following are a few references to Michael and his impact on the San Francisco Bay Area and the national landscape architectural ecosystem:

c. How does the business demonstrate its commitment to the community?

Throughout its history, MPA Design has positioned the business as offering its services to support the needs of the public at large. Although the firm primarily serves business-to-business (B2B), business-to-nonprofit (B2NP), and business-to-government (B2G) clients, most projects ultimately benefit the associated individuals and their communities. For example, MPA Design has worked on a number of projects for local parks, and San Francisco Bay Area universities and colleges. These projects have significantly improved the health, safety and general environment for individuals in those work/play/learn communities.

Over the years, MPA Design has participated in several community, city, and regional commissions that strive to leverage the synergies and improve effectiveness within the design and construction ecosystem for the public good. For example, historically the firm has been an active participant and leader within SPUR (San Francisco Bay Area Planning and Urban Research Association). Also, MPA's principals have held leadership positions within the local chapter of the ASLA (American Society of Landscape Architecture). On numerous occasions, MPA Design has been quite actively involved in communicating with and advising local and regional governments as their associated agencies revise their plans to optimally adapt to dynamic local issues such as population growth, regional transportation, and climate change.

Finally, MPA Design has fostered the careers of numerous emerging landscape architects. The firm's principals have traditionally worked closely with regional schools to educate and advise students considering a career in the design industry, and subsequently mentoring new entrants as they commence their careers. While at MPA Design, young designers have received exposure to a diverse range of challenging projects while receiving the necessary support as they progressed through the licensing process. After discovering the appeal of entrepreneurial pursuits, several of these young, licensed architects have, subsequently, spun off to launch their own successful ventures here in the Bay Area and around the country.

f. How would the community be diminished if the business were to be sold, relocated, shut down, etc.?

As a preeminent thought leader in Landscape Architectural Design, MPA Design has become the design partner of choice for a plethora of commercial enterprises, multi-family housing developers, non-profit organizations, government agencies, and construction partners throughout the San Francisco Bay Area. Moreover, the firm's longevity has afforded it the opportunity to become a catalyst for growth throughout the Global Silicon Valley (GSV). Its long tenure in this key region for U.S. and global innovation has enabled MPA Design to form relationships with many current Silicon Valley stalwarts throughout the early days of their growth. The company's designs have incrementally improved the prospects for all stakeholders of numerous GSV veterans such as

Genentech, Bayer, BioMarin, Gilead, Hewlett-Packard, AT&T, TotalEnergies (SunPower), UC Davis, UC Berkeley and Stanford University.

We believe that if MPA Design were to shut down or be relocated, it could cause irreparable near-term harm throughout the design ecosystem. Employees would lose their jobs. The firm's long-term strategic consultants would lose project work and associated revenue. The aforementioned clients and partners may scramble to replace MPA Design with substitute design partners, but those substitutes would lack the historically relevant institutional knowledge on which clients have come to rely upon from MPA Design. The Native Sons of the Golden West (NSGW) Building management would lose an attractive, long-term tenant. In short, the region would lose a core leader in the landscape architectural design ecosystem.

While it may be true that MPA Design could be replaced, we believe that its replacements could take years to offer a comparable level of client service, innovative thought leadership, and sustainable design execution that the business offers today.

CRITERION 3: The business is committed to maintaining the physical features or traditions that define the business

a. Is the business associated with a culturally significant building, structure, object, signage, mural, architectural detail, neon sign, or any other special physical feature that defines the business?

MPA Design leases its office space. However, the business is one of the longest-term tenants (since December 1994) of the architecturally significant Native Sons of the Golden West (NSGW) Building located at 414 Mason Street (https://hoodline.com/2017/12/3-centuries-of-history-in-8-stories-the-nsgw-building/).

b. In a few words, describe the main business activity you commit to maintaining.

MPA Design is committed to providing innovative, client-centric, sustainable landscape architectural design.

c. What challenges is the business facing today?

- 1. Access to capital at reasonable terms.
- 2. Post COVID-19-pandemic business development of new clients.
- 3. Recruitment of promising young talent.

Just as MPA Design began to recover from the softness in its business related to the COVID-19 pandemic, the firm was unfavorably impacted by the quite disruptive and unusual weather patterns that our region experienced during late autumn of 2022 and into the winter of 2023. During this timeframe, select new MPA Design clients leveraged their size and prowess to improve their cash cycles by engaging in "slow-pay" and/or "no-pay" tactics. Needless to say, this became a catalyst for some cashflow issues and associated employee angst. However, MPA Design's management remains optimistic and continues to address these challenges with its redoubled multi-dimensional growth strategy.

In the most recent weeks of third quarter 2023, several of MPA Design's established clients have commenced accelerating their pace on executing numerous projects that had been previously approved but delayed throughout the pandemic and into early 2023. The firm has also been approached to propose on innovative projects from new clients outside its installed base. MPA Design has also recently received new client referrals from its already solid yet growing strategic partner relationships. However, management feels that the business is currently constrained to appropriately execute on these new opportunities consistent with MPA Design's standards due to its less-than-optimal access to capital on reasonable terms and the need to grow the firm's talent.

As a part of MPA Design's growth strategy, the firm seeks to complement its currently resurging B2B business with accelerating growth in its B2G and B2NP markets to return to MPA Design's historical levels. Management feels that this restoration of balance within the firm's three target markets while continuing to acquire new clients within the B2B market will allow MPA Design to maintain sustainable growth for the next five decades. Today, management continues to implement its multi-pronged business development strategy while maintaining relationships with select talented emerging Architects that MPA Design believes may be optimally positioned to carry the firm into the next century and beyond.







The building appears to be eligible for the National Register as an individual property through survey evaluation.
















Gathering Nov. 12 to dedicate the new Memorial Garden in Colma. (Photo/Patrick Walls Photography)

Memory Garden in Colma is first Jewish place in U.S. to mourn pregnancy loss

It could have been raining, but instead the sun chose to shine on the 100 or so people gathered on Nov. 13 at Eternal Home Cemetery in Colma. They were there for the

dedication of a new Jewish space for those who have experienced the grief of a miscarriage, stillbirth or death of a newborn. The Memory Garden is the first specifically Jewish memorial place for prenatal and neonatal loss in the country, its founders said. In creating the garden, they wanted to provide an external, physical location for the internal expression of grief and mourning.

"For the Jewish community, that's very important to us, to have a physical place to go," said Debbie Findling, senior philanthropic adviser to the Lisa and Douglas Goldman Fund, who founded the garden project along with Abby Porth, director of the Lisa Stone Pritzker Family Foundation.

The dedication was the culmination of a long journey that began with a conversation between Findling and Porth more than a decade ago. Both women had experienced pregnancy loss and wanted to turn to Judaism and Jewish ritual for support in their grief, but felt a lack.

"There wasn't really a way to kind of move through the experience from a Jewish perspective," Findling said.

Much of Jewish practice involves marking time and repeating ritual, as it does with the many traditions around mourning. But Judaism doesn't prescribe specific rites for miscarriage or stillbirth. According to Maimonides: "We do not [perform ritual mourning rites] for stillborn infants."

So finding Jewish solutions was hard for Findling. "For example, I didn't know what to do on the anniversary, the yahrzeit, of my stillbirth," she said.

Porth and Findling began a conversation that expanded to include the Bay Area Jewish Healing Center and Sinai Memorial Chapel Jewish funeral home, which agreed to provide land at the cemetery it owns for the Memory Garden.

"It has been a long time in the making," said Sam Salkin, executive director of Sinai Memorial.

Salkin said it had taken so much time to create the garden because of fundraising and the legal steps involved in setting up the space, which included undergrounding important PG&E infrastructure and dealing with a BART right-of-way.

The process also required a lot of listening to the community, and dialogues with those who had experienced grief related to prenatal loss or infertility issues. The result is a design by MPA Design, an S.F.-based landscape architecture firm that also worked on

the John F. Kennedy memorial at Arlington National Cemetery, San Francisco's Doyle Drive Redesign Plan and the St. Regis Hotel in San Francisco.

It features an open space with native California plants, with redwood trees and a large, flat circular pool, "round like a womb," Findling said.

"The outer edge of the circle are the months of the year, both in English and in Hebrew," she said, and in the water are stones that can be moved and repositioned by visitors, a nod to the placing of stones on grave markers and to the marking of sacred days on the Jewish calendar.

But it's meant to be open to interpretation, Findling added. She hopes families, rabbis and those who are grieving will find a canvas on which to make their own rituals.

"It's for them to create the meaning," she said. "We have created the space."

Salkin said that although the garden is adjacent to the cemetery, it offers "intimacy and seclusion" — which will be even more true once the new seedlings have grown a

bit.

The Memory Garden's opening Sunday was attended by clergy from across Jewish denominations. Cantor Marsha Attie of Congregation Emanu-El (Reform) in San Francisco and Rabbi Yitzchok Feldman of Emek Beracha (Orthodox) in Palo Alto both participated in the dedication, along with Findling, Porth, Salkin and Jennifer Kaufman, an artist and Sinai Memorial staff member.

While it was created in a Jewish space, the garden is open to all. It's open to the public from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sunday through Friday and closed on Jewish holidays.

Reservations are required for private gatherings by contacting Eternal Home or Sinai Memorial.

Findling said that for her, the garden has proven to be a place where she can create meaning and connection with Judaism in relation to the loss she experienced many years ago but still carries with her.

"It's where I go now on the anniversary of my stillbirth," Findling said. "I go to the Memory Garden."




The 2014 Silver SPUR Awards, held on November 18, recognized five individuals whose achievements have made San Francisco and the Bay Area a better place to live and work.



Business Description

Established in 1969 by forward-thinking landscape architect Michael Painter, MPA Design is an acclaimed landscape architecture and urban design firm, with a portfolio consisting of over 3,000 completed projects. MPA Design is one of the oldest continuously operating design firms on the West Coast and provides a holistic design approach to its projects that is site-specific. Over the past five decades, MPA Design has contributed to the growth and vibrancy of the San Francisco Bay Area through producing sustainable design projects, including the Doyle Drive Redesign Plan, the St. Regis Hotel, the UC Davis Medical Center Cancer Treatment Facility, the John F. Kennedy Gravesite, Twin Peaks Overlook Project, and the Great Highway and Ocean Beach Reconstruction Plan. MPA Design counts among its clientele many corporate, academic, and non-profit institutions including Stanford University, U.C. Berkeley, Hewlett Packard, and The Presidio Trust, among others. Founder Michael Painter passed away in June 2018, and the business is now directed by Susan Painter, Michael's wife.

The business's primary location at 414 Mason Street is a Category A (Historic Resource Present) structure on the east side of Mason Street between Post and Geary streets in the Union Square neighborhood. It is within the C-3-G - Downtown- General Zoning District and the 80-130-F Height and Bulk District. 414 Mason Street is known as the Native Sons Building, which is an Article 11 Significant Building – Category II and is located within the Article 11 Kearny-Market-Mason-Sutter Conservation District. Additionally, the building appears eligible for the National Register as an individual property through survey evaluation.

Staff Analysis

Review Criteria

1. When was business founded?

The business was founded in 1969.

2. Does the business qualify for listing on the Legacy Business Registry? If so, how?

Yes. MPA Design qualifies for listing on the Legacy Business Registry because it meets all the eligibility Criteria:

- a. MPA Design has operated continuously in San Francisco for 55 years.
- b. MPA Design has contributed to the history and identity of the Union Square neighborhood and San Francisco.
- c. MPA Design is committed to maintaining the traditions that define the organization.

3. Is the business associated with a culturally significant art / craft / cuisine / tradition?

No.

4. Is the business or its building associated with significant events, persons, and / or architecture?

MPA Design was founded by Michael Painter, a significant, nationally recognized landscape architect who contributed to the landscape architecture and sustainable design fields. Painter earned a bachelor's degree in landscape architecture from the University of California, Berkeley, in 1956, followed by a master's degree in urban design from the Harvard Graduate School of Design. He completed over 850 projects throughout his career. Significant local projects included the Presidio Parkway, the AT&T Administrative Center, the Genentech Campus, the HP Corporate Headquarters, and the Great Highway/Ocean Beach Re-Construction.

5. Is the property associated with the business listed on a local, state, or federal historic resource registry?

The business rents its office at 414 Mason Street, in the Native Sons Building, which is an Article 11 Individual Resource and is located within the Kearny-Market-Mason-Sutter Conservation District. Additionally, the building appears eligible for the National Register as an individual property through survey evaluation.

6. Is the business mentioned in a local historic context statement?

No; however, the building at 414 Mason Street is discussed in *Architecture, Planning, And Preservation Professionals: A Collection of Biographies* Historic Context Statement.



7. Has the business been cited in published literature, newspapers, journals, etc.?

Yes. Michael Painter and MPA Design have been mentioned in numerous publications including *Landscape Architecture Magazine* and *The Washinton Post*. Additionally, the firm has received over 100 awards since 1969, including earning the Community Service Award from the American Institute of Architecture for the San Francisco Presidio Parkway project; numerous American Landscape Architecture Association Merit and Honor Awards; and an Award of Excellence from the Urban Land Institute.

Racial and Social Equity Analysis
