BUSINESS DESCRIPTION

Central Drug Store is a local, family-owned traditional pharmacy and general store in the Excelsior District. In addition to being a knowledgeable pharmacy medications and consultations, Central Drug Store sells household goods, toys, perfumes, colognes, and durable medical equipment. Central Drug Store was founded by William Brenner in 1908 located at 4394 Mission Street. After a year in the business, Brenner moved the business to 4513 Mission Street. In 1918, Brenner moved the business to its current location at 4494 Mission Street. In 1921, Brenner sold the business over to Wilbur G. Stahl. Stahl operated and ran the Central Drug Store until 1927 and sold the business over to Claude L. DeVecenzi. Claude L. DeVecenzi included two additional business partners George DeVencenzi and William Tonelli in 1950 and operated two other pharmacies, which were Golden State Pharmacy and Rex Drugs. After working as a pharmacist at Central Drug Store for about 16 years, Dino Tonelli took over all three pharmacies. Over time, the business split off and Central Drug Store ran independently. When Dino Tonelli died in 1991, Jerry Tonelli, Dino's son, took over the business and manages the business with his mother, Elsie Tonelli. Both Jerry and Elsie have been running the business ever since.

Through its extensive history in the Excelsior neighborhood, Central Drug Store has been providing reliable service to the Excelsior neighborhood. Central Drug Store has served customers that are multigenerational from the community and the Bay Area. Central Drug Store has always been involved with making the community a better place. Dino Tonelli started the Excelsior Business Association and one of his main initiatives was to decorate the storefronts and streets around the Excelsior District for the Holiday Season. Central Drug Store has been a community resource to the Excelsior community. They pride themselves in being a friendly, safe, and welcoming place for all people. They provide free medical advice and free counter counseling. Some important affiliations they are with are Coalition of Concerned Medical Providers (CCMP) and Retail Clerks Union Local 648. Through CCMP, Central Drug Store provides free medication and counseling to the low-income and people without housing. Retail Clerks Union Local 648 provides employees with livable wages, health insurance and pension plans.

Besides hiring family members, Central Drug Store hires students from local high schools to provide them with after school jobs. Central Drug Store has supported multiple organizations like Coalition of Concerned Medical Providers, Corpus Christi Church, St. Roberts Catholic Church YMCA, St. Johns High School, St. Ignatius College Preparatory High School, Archbishop Riordan High School, Italian American Social Club, Lucchesi Nel Mondo, Excelsior Action Group, Jerry Garcia Day, Sunday Streets SF, Knights of Columbus, Pharmacist Society of San Francisco, and the San Francisco Democratic Club.

- Their existing site, 4494 Mission Street, is located in the center of the Excelsior District. The structureCategory B (Unknown / Age Eligible) structure. Although it is not been analyzed for its eligibility for historic resource status, the property has a well-preserved building façade and interiors in the Excelsior neighborhood since 1976 from their interior remodel.
- The business encountered some significant people like Jerry Garcia, Monty Stickles, Juan Marichal, Paul Tonelli, Quentin Kopp, Jackie Speier, Benito Santiago, and Rinaldo Joseph "Rugger" Ardizoia.
- Central Drug Store has been mentioned in San Francisco Chronicle and San Francisco Heritage. Central Drug Store has been mentioned in multiple awards like:
 - Most Successful Year in the History of Blue Stamp Award by the Blue Stamp Committee.
 - Certificate of Special Congressional Recognition Small Business Award from previous Congresswoman Nancy Pelosi.
 - San Francisco Certificate of Honor presented by former Mayor Edwin Lee.
 - Coalition of Concerned Medical Professionals Awards.

Attention Legacy Business Program:

I am nominating the Central Drug Store to represent District 11 in the San Francisco Legacy Business Directory. Central Drug Store, currently located at 4494 Mission Street in the Excelsior neighborhood, was established in 1908 by owner George Brenner. In 1921, Mr. Brenner sold the business to Wilbur G. Stahl who operated it until 1927. Claude L. DeVencenzi then purchased Central Drug Store. In 1950, George DeVencenzi and William Tonelli were brought on as coowners, and the three men together owned and operated three pharmacies: Central Drug Store on Mission Street at Santa Rosa Avenue, Golden State Pharmacy on San Bruno Avenue at Silliman Street, and Rex Drugs on Mission Street at Onondaga Avenue.

Dino Tonelli started as a pharmacist at Central Drug Store in 1949 after his service in the Army Air Corp and Air Force. Dino took over Central Drug Store, Golden State Pharmacy, and Rex Drugs in 1965. In 1984, Dino closed Rex Drugs due to rent increases by the new building owner, and Golden State Pharmacy split off from Central Drug Store. The Tonelli family took over ownership in 1965. Dino Tonelli passed away in 1991 doing what he loved — working in the pharmacy — at the age of 70. His son Jerry Tonelli, who worked with Dino as a pharmacist since 1978, took over day to day operations along with his mother Elsie Tonelli. Central Drug Store remains a family-owned business to this day.

Central Drug Store is a traditional pharmacy that has become an up-to-date pharmacy in technology, education, services, and medications, all while continuing to keep its classic look and feel. Central Drug Store takes pride in knowing their customers and patients, as well as being known as a friendly, safe, and welcoming place for all people. In addition to providing prescriptions, Central Drug Store provides free medical advice and over the counter counseling.

They have served generations of San Franciscans and still have customers well into their 90s that remember shopping at Central Drug Store as children. People that have moved out of the area will make a special trip just to come back from time to time. They always comment on how Central Drug Store is the one thing in the Excelsior that has remained the same.

Central Drug Store has always been a mainstay in supporting the Excelsior neighborhood that serves as an accessible pharmacy for all residents. Over the years, they have had a positive effect on the neighborhood. They regularly support the Coalition of Concerned Medical Providers, Corpus Christi Church, St. Roberts Catholic Church, YMCA, St. Johns High School, St. Ignatius College Preparatory High School, Archbishop Riordan High School, Italian American Social Club, Lucchesi Nel Mondo, Excelsior Action Group, Jerry Garcia Day, Sunday Streets SF, Knights of Columbus, Pharmacist Society of San Francisco, and the San Francisco Democratic Club. Central Drug Store also hires from within the neighborhood. Many of Central Drug Store's customer's children and grandchildren have worked at the store, and some have even met their future spouses while employed there.

The historic nature and the impact this business has made for the Excelsior community make the Central Drug Store an ideal District 11 representative in the San Francisco Legacy Business Directory.

Central Drug Store, currently located at 4494 Mission Street in the Excelsior neighborhood, was established in 1908 by owner William Brenner.

The pharmacy was originally located at 4394 Mission Street. Around 1909, Central Drug Store moved to 4513 Mission Street. By 1918, William moved the pharmacy to its current location at 4494 Mission Street at Santa Rosa Avenue.

In 1921, Mr. Brenner sold the business to Wilbur G. Stahl who operated it until 1927. Claude L. DeVencenzi then purchased Central Drug Store. In 1950, George DeVencenzi and William Tonelli were brought on as co-owners, and the three men together owned and operated three pharmacies: Central Drug Store on Mission Street at Santa Rosa Avenue, Golden State Pharmacy on San Bruno Avenue at Silliman Street, and Rex Drugs on Mission Street at Onondaga Avenue.

Dino Tonelli started as a pharmacist at Central Drug Store in 1949 after his service in the Army Air Corp and Air Force. Dino took over Central Drug Store, Golden State Pharmacy, and Rex Drugs in 1965. In 1984, Dino closed Rex Drugs due to rent increases by the new building owner, and Golden State Pharmacy split off from Central Drug Store. Dino Tonelli passed away in 1991 doing what he loved – working in the pharmacy – at the age of 70. His son Jerry Tonelli, who worked with Dino as a pharmacist since 1978, took over day to day operations along with his mother Elsie Tonelli.

As a side note, Dino and Elsie met while working at Central Drug Store when Elsie was 16 years old. She's 93 now and still working at the pharmacy!

b. Describe any circumstances that required the business to cease operations in San Francisco for more than six months?

Not applicable.

c. Is the business a family-owned business? If so, give the generational history of the business.

Central Drug Store is a family-owned business. The Tonelli family took over ownership in 1965. Dino Tonelli, who started at Central Drug Store as a pharmacist in 1949, bought the pharmacy in 1965 from then owners George DeVincenzi, Claude L. DeVencenzi, and William Tonelli. Dino operated the business until his passing in 1991. Dino's wife, Elsie Tonelli, and son Jerry took over the business after Dino's passing. Jerry started at Central Drug Store as a stock boy and store clerk in 1971. In 1978, Jerry began working alongside his father as a pharmacist. All 7 of Elsie's children and many grandchildren and even great-grandchildren, have worked at Central Drug Store at one time or another.

d. Describe the ownership history when the business ownership is not the original owner or a family-owned business.

The ownership history of Central Drug Store is as follows:

1908 to 1921: William Brenner 1921 to 1927: Wilber G. Stahl

1927 to 1950: Claude L. DeVencenzi

1950 to 1965: Claude L. DeVencenzi, George DeVencenzi, and William Tonelli

1965 to 1991: Dino Tonelli

1991 to Present: Elsie Tonelli and Jerry Tonelli

lifetime place to work or shop. You just feel the history of the building when you walk in, and if you listen intently you'll hear her story.

Central Drug Store takes pride in knowing their customers and patients, as well as being known as a friendly, safe, and welcoming place for all people. In addition to providing prescriptions, Central Drug Store provides free medical advice and over the counter counseling. Above all, they provide excellent customer service to the people of the Excelsior District. They have served generations of San Franciscans and still have customers well into their 90s that remember shopping at Central Drug Store as children. People that have moved out of the area will make a special trip just to come back from time to time. They always comment on how Central Drug Store is the one thing in the Excelsior that has remained the same. They say it feels like home.

b. Is the business (or has been) associated with significant events in the neighborhood, the city, or the business industry?

When Dino Tonelli took over ownership in 1965, the Excelsior was a vibrant corridor with a camera shop, hardware store, stationary store, donut shop, bike shop, and clothing stores. True to its name, Central Drug Store was central to it all. Dino started supporting local churches and schools. He was the founding member of the Excelsior Businessmen Association. As a member, he was able to promote decorating the Excelsior's streets and store windows during the holidays. His store was one of the original businesses to participate in the Excelsior Blue Chip Stamp program. Dino was Chairman of the Blue Stamp Committee and earned an award for "Most Successful Year In The History Of Blue Stamp 1961."

Elsie and Jerry continue to support the same churches and schools. They've extended their community outreach by hiring local students, participating in Sunday Streets SF every year and are current members of Coalition of Concerned Medical Providers (CCMP). Through CCMP, Central Drug Store provides medications to the underserved, poor, and homeless free of charge. Jerry Tonelli is a current member of The Pharmacist Society of San Francisco and California Pharmacist Association. Elsie and Jerry also helped sponsor the mural on the side of Central Drug Store's wall, on Santa Rosa Avenue, that portrays the rich history of the Excelsior and its hope for the future.

Central Drug Store has been referenced in the following publications and has received the following honors:

- San Francisco Certificate of Honor presented by Mayor Edwin Lee, January 2013.

- Coalition of Concerned Medical Professionals Award presented for professional services to benefit underpaid workers, 2011.
- Associazione Lucchesi Nel Mondo San Francisco Award presented to Central Drug Store for its support of the Italian community, 2011.

d. Is the business associated with a significant or historical person?

Central Drug Store is associated with the following significant and/or historical people:

- Jerry Garcia, founder and front man for the Grateful Dead, was a regular at Central Drug Store as a young teen. He was likely found in the magazine section checking out the comics. He grew up near the store.
- Monty Stickles, San Francisco 49ers, regularly shopped at the store up until his passing in 2006.
- Juan Marichal, San Francisco Giants, would hang out and talk sports.
- Paul Tonelli, Morning radio show personality at 107.7 THE BONE and voice of the San Francisco 49ers, worked at Central Drug Store and continues to shop here for his prescriptions and everyday needs.
- Quentin Kopp, former San Francisco Supervisor and State Senator, was a regular at Central Drug Store.

e. How does the business demonstrate its commitment to the community?

Central Drug Store has always been a mainstay in supporting the Excelsior neighborhood. Over the years, they have had a positive effect on the neighborhood. They regularly support the Coalition of Concerned Medical Providers, Corpus Christi Church, St. Roberts Catholic Church YMCA, St. Johns High School, St. Ignatius College Preparatory High School, Archbishop Riordan High School, Italian American Social Club, Lucchesi Nel Mondo, Excelsior Action Group, Jerry Garcia Day, Sunday Streets SF, Knights of Columbus, Pharmacist Society of San Francisco, and the San Francisco Democratic Club. Central Drug Store also hires from within the neighborhood. Many of Central Drug Store's customer's children and grandchildren have worked at the store, and some have even met their future spouses while employed there. Central Drug Store also reaches out to our local high schools (St. Ignatius, Riordan, Balboa, and Sacred Heart Cathedral) when looking for after school help. They also take pride in being a member of the Retail Clerks Union Local 648, which provides employees with excellent wages, health insurance, and pension plans.

f. Provide a description of the community the business serves.

The Excelsior District is a very diverse neighborhood, so the customers and patients of Central Drug Store are of many different nationalities, languages, ages (multi-generational), and lifestyles. Central Drug Store is a special welcoming place for all people of the Excelsior.

Now that Airbnb is prevalent in San Francisco, there have been numerous customers at Central Drug Store from Europe, Asia, and South America.

g. Is the business associated with a culturally significant building/structure/site/object/interior?

The building that houses Central Drug Store has been a pharmacy for over 100 years. Central Drug Store is one of the only, if not the only, original "small business" to survive in the Excelsior since 1908 and continues to thrive today. Housing a simple mom-and-pop pharmacy since the building's construction, the building is unique to the neighborhood because of its 1940s-1950s-style décor. The storefront is distinctive with its bright neon "Central Drug Store" lettering on the building, backed by black tiles. The large display windows are always decorated according to the holidays and seasons. Small blue tiles decorate the bottom half of the building, including the entryway, accenting the structure. Old-time glass cabinets hold beautiful gifts of perfume, colognes, wallets, various knick-knacks, and home items.

Central Drug's interior was remodeled once in 1976, with the exception of the pharmacy room that is very much the same as it was in 1908. The store has a warm, inviting feeling. Jerry remembers falling down in the front of Corpus Christi Church (down the block from the pharmacy) when he was 5 years old and skinning his knees. His grandmother brought him straight away to Central Drug Store. The pharmacist, George DeVincenzi, put him up on the counter, cleaned up the scrapes, and bandaged his knees. Jerry now works at that very same counter and has bandaged up his share of scrapes.

h. How would the community be diminished if the business were to be sold, relocated, shut down, etc.?

If Central Drug Store were to close, it would be a tremendous loss to the city of San Francisco and the Excelsior District. San Francisco was built by independently-owned businesses (i.e., small businesses). In order for San Francisco to retain its character, small businesses such as Central Drug Store need to be here.

Central Drug Store is a pharmacy and general merchandise store, selling goods ranging from durable medical equipment, perfume and colognes, toys/stuffed animals, gifts, and household goods.

b. How does the business demonstrate a commitment to maintaining the historical traditions that define the business, and which of these traditions should not be changed in order to retain the businesses historical character? (e.g., business model, goods and services, craft, culinary, or art forms)

Central Drug Store is committed to maintaining its historical tradition as a pharmacy and general merchandise store as it has since 1908. As a staple in the Excelsior, Central Drug Store will continue to be a place that the community can rely on for their prescriptions, generalized goods, and familiar welcoming faces and family.

c. How has the business demonstrated a commitment to maintaining the special physical features that define the business? Describe any special exterior and interior physical characteristics of the space occupied by the business (e.g. signage, murals, architectural details, neon signs, etc.).



EXCELSIOR / Locals honor Garcia / Jerry Day pays homage to singer's neighborhood roots

Long before he was lead singer for the <u>Grateful Dead</u>, <u>Jerry Garcia</u> was a scrappy kid in the Excelsior -- pulling fire alarms, sticking his hands in wet cement, throwing cherry bombs in the Alemany tunnel.

"Seems like we were always in the back of a police cruiser," said Garcia's childhood buddy, <u>John Clark</u>, a writer and filmmaker who now lives in Orlando. "The Excelsior was a lot of fun for us. Harrington Street was our world."

The Excelsior is now embracing Garcia once again. Commemorating Garcia's 63rd birthday on Aug. 1 and the 10th anniversary of his death on Aug. 9, residents of the Excelsior are hosting Jerry Day at the McLaren Park amphitheater.

The free event, scheduled for Aug. 7, will feature four bands, food booths and arts and crafts.

Organizers are expecting 1,300 to 1,500 people to attend Jerry Day, which is in its third year. The purpose is to celebrate Garcia's life, art and music, as well as bring people to the Excelsior -- a neighborhood that doesn't get nearly enough attention, promoters say.

"I know what it feels like to grow up out there, not feeling like you're part of the city," said organizer <u>Tom Murphy</u>, who was raised in the Excelsior and now works in finance on the Peninsula. "We're trying to build pride, community spirit, bring positive attention to the neighborhood."

Garcia fans have also gathered 1,000 signatures to rename the McLaren Park amphitheater after the world-famous singer and guitarist. Three years ago, they printed and sold T-shirts with Garcia's artwork to raise money for a new playground at the park. In all, they netted \$5,000. The playground was completed in 2003.

There's also a movement to declare his childhood home, at 87 Harrington St., a landmark and place a plaque out front.

"Jerry Garcia and his accomplishments help put the Excelsior on the map," said Supervisor Gerardo Sandoval, who represents the neighborhood.

Sandoval is particularly pleased with the Garcia celebration because "it's a well-kept secret that I'm the only Deadhead on the board. I have more than 50 shows under my belt."

Garcia's family has been very supportive of Jerry Day and efforts to commemorate his childhood, Murphy said. His family donated an original Garcia painting to auction to raise money for Jerry Day. The painting will be auctioned at a fund-raiser Thursday at Cafe Mama, 4754 Mission St.

Fans say they can hear the Excelsior's influence in Garcia's music. Although he was a hippie icon for three decades, he also favored bluegrass, blues and other working-class types of music -- a throwback to his youth in the blue-collar Outer Mission.

Sandoval noted that Garcia was originally trained as a Spanish classical guitarist, a reflection of the traditional lifestyle and Latin influence of the Excelsior.

Garcia isn't the Excelsior's only famous son. Boston Red Sox Hall of Famer <u>Joe Cronin</u>, Mix Master Mike of the <u>Beastie Boys</u> and former heavyweight champion <u>Pat Valentino</u> also hail from the foggy streets of the Outer Mission.

"North Beach had <u>Ioe DiMaggio</u>; we have our own Hall of Famer," Murphy said.

Garcia grew up at 121 Amazon St., then moved when he was 5 to his grandmother's house at 87 Harrington St., where he lived until he was a teenager. Clark lived a few doors down at 32 Harrington.

"We were pretty inseparable," said Clark, who later wrote a book called "Dead Angel" about his childhood with Garcia.

Garcia, at the time of his death in 1995, was also working on a book about his youth, called "Harrington Street." It was published posthumously. Clark first met Garcia in the comic book aisle at the <u>Central Drug Store</u>, which is still in business near Mission and Excelsior Avenue. They spent their youth "mostly getting into trouble and having fun," Clark said.

They built tree houses, played Union and Confederate soldiers in vacant lots, made an underground fort complete with periscope, went on Easter egg hunts at McLaren Park, cleaned the park's horse stables in exchange for rides, and exploded a lot of firecrackers.

"As a kid, Jerry was very fun-loving, very kind. A little lost, in a sense," Clark said. "I remember once we were walking down the street and he was singing 'When the Red Red Robin Comes Bob-Bob-Bobbing Along,' and thinking, 'Boy, I hope he doesn't become a singer.' "

Clark and Garcia stayed in touch over the years, although Clark never considered himself a Deadhead.

Nonetheless, he plans to return to the Excelsior for Jerry Day and emcee the event.

"I haven't been back to McLaren Park in years," he said. "I still remember stealing the Easter eggs out of Jerry's basket there."

Harrington Street

In Jerry Garcia's posthumously published "Harrington Street" (<u>Delacorte Press</u>, \$22.95), he writes about his childhood. These are some of his memories of his Excelsior neighborhood:

"When I lived at 87 Harrington St., the neighborhood church was Corpus Christi (body of Christ) located one block northeast of Harrington Street and occupying about one half block of area. It was, when we first moved there, a typical wooden frame, sort of classic little old church-in-the-lane cum here's the church, here's the people, open the doors, etc.... kind of deal."

On another page, he wrote:

"The Excelsior district of San Francisco was ethnically mostly Italian and Irish. My family was pretty much Spanish-Irish, a stricken combination of Catholicism's Weirder Interpretations. ... So one block, scarcely 100 yards from the door at 87 Harrington, was God's House! In those days they still had the wonderful Latin Mass with its resonant sonorities and mysterious ritual movements, the incense, the music, choir, organ, bells, candles, the muted light through the stained glass windows."

Central Drug Store

(4494 Mission Street, built 1910)



The form is simple (a rectangle), but the drugstore on the corner at 4494 Mission Street at the corner of Santa Rosa Avenue has a couple of big reasons for making this list. Central Drug Store is the oldest still-operating business in the Excelsior District, having opened in this spot in 1910. A circa 1950 alteration to the building gave us the sleek Vitrolite sign with "Central Drug Store" in neon. Jerry Garcia bought comic books here when he was a boy, and he is still playing the guitar on the south side of the building along Santa Rosa Avenue in the 2009 work by Precita Eyes Muralists, The San Francisco You Should Know.

Business Descriptions

Central Drug Store is a local, family-owned traditional pharmacy and general store in the Excelsior District since 1908. In addition to being a knowledgeable pharmacy medications and consultations, Central Drug Store sells household goods, toys, perfumes, colognes, and durable medical equipment. Central Drug Store originally started with William Brenner back in 1908 located at 4394 Mission Street. After a year in the business, Brenner moved the business to 4513 Mission Street. In 1918, Brenner moved the business to its current location at 4494 Mission Street. In 1921, Brenner sold the business over to Wilbur G. Stahl. Stahl operated and ran the Central Drug Store until 1927 and sold the business over to Claude L. DeVecenzi. Claude L. DeVecenzi included two additional business partners George DeVencenzi and William Tonelli in 1950 and operated two other pharmacies, which were Golden State Pharmacy and Rex Drugs. After working as a pharmacist at Central Drug Store for about 16 years, Dino Tonelli took over all three pharmacies. Over time, the business split off and Central Drug Store ran independently. When Dino Tonelli died in 1991, Jerry Tonelli, Dino's son, took over the business and manages the business with his mother, Elsie Tonelli. Both Jerry and Elsie have been running the business ever since.

Through its extensive history in the Excelsior neighborhood, Central Drug Store has been providing reliable service to the Excelsior neighborhood. Central Drug Store has served customers that are multigenerational from the community and the Bay Area. Central Drug Store has always been involved with making the community a better place. Dino Tonelli started the Excelsior Business Association and one of his main initiatives was to decorate the storefronts and streets around the Excelsior District for the Holiday Season.

Central Drug Store has been a community resource to the Excelsior community. They pride themselves in being a friendly, safe, and welcoming place for all people. They provide free medical advice and free counter counseling. Some important affiliations they are with are Coalition of Concerned Medica Providers (CCMP) and Retail Clerks Union Local 648. Through CCMP, Central Drug Store provides free medication and counseling to the low-income and people without housing. Retail Clerks Union Local 648 provides employees with livable wages, health insurance and pension plans. Besides hiring only family members, Central Drug Store hires students from local high schools to provide them with after school jobs. Central Drug Store has supported multiple organizations like Coalition of Concerned Medical Providers, Corpus Christi Church, St. Roberts Catholic Church YMCA, St. Johns High School, St. Ignatius College Preparatory High School, Archbishop Riordan High School, Italian American Social Club, Lucchesi Nel Mondo, Excelsior Action Group, Jerry Garcia Day, Sunday Streets SF, Knights of Columbus, Pharmacist Society of San Francisco, and the San Francisco Democratic Club.

The business is located in a Category B (Unknown / Age Eligible) structure on the northwest side of Mission Street between Santa Rosa Avenue and Francis Streets. It is within the Excelsior Outer Mission Neighborhood Commercial District (Neighborhood Commercial District) Zoning District and a 40-X Height and Bulk District.

Yes. Central Drug Store qualifies for listing on the Legacy Business Registry because it meets all of the eligibility Criteria:

- a. Central Drug Store has operated continuously in San Francisco for 113 years.
- b. Central Drug Store has contributed to the history and identity of the Excelsior neighborhood and San Francisco.
- c. Central Drug Store is committed to maintaining the physical features and traditions that define the organization.

3. Is the business associated with a culturally significant art craft cuisine tradition?

Yes. The business is associated with the pharmaceutical and health care industry



4. Is the business or its building associated with significant eventszpersonszandor architecture

Yes. Their existing site, 4494 Mission Street, is located in the center of the Excelsior District. Although it is not been analyzed for its eligibility for historic resource status, the property has a well-preserved building façade and interiors in the Excelsior neighborhood since 1976 from their interior remodel.

The business encountered some significant people like Jerry Garcia, Monty Stickles, Juan Marichal, Paul Tonelli, Quentin Kopp, Jackie Speier, Benito Santiago, and Rinaldo Joseph "Rugger" Ardizoia.
