Welcome and Introductions Background

San Francisco must identify approximately \$320 million in new revenue to replace exhausted one-time federal and state relief. These funds will sustain Muni service, paratransit service, programs that keep our streets safe, and other transportation services.

To solve the short-term and long-term problem, we need to make decisions and implement solutions that generate new revenue in FY25-26.

Previous working groups like T2030, T2045, and the Muni Reliability Working Group addressed other SFMTA structural problems were successful because they:

- Included voices from labor, business, and advocacy
- Were open to the public and interim deliverables were available for review

This Muni Funding Working Group will build on these past efforts to address today's funding situation.

Welcome and Introductions Goals and Vision for this Working Group

- Dealing with the magnitude of the SFMTA's structural deficit, while preserving the agency's core values of trust, equity, environmental stewardship, and economic recovery, will require hard choices among unpopular options.
- Convened by the Controller's Office and the SFMTA, the Muni Funding Working Group will review and prioritize policy options that SFMTA can implement to address its funding gap.
- The outcome for this working group is a prioritized by the group set of options that can be provided to the SFMTA Director of Transportation and SFMTA Board of Directors, and elected policymakers, including Mayor and Board of Supervisors, for consideration.

Welcome and Introductions Roles and responsibilities of working group members

The Working Group includes representatives from the Mayor's Office, Board of Supervisors, SFMTA and SFCTA leadership, labor and business partners, community partners and transportation industry experts.

This is not a decision making or advisory body.

Work Plan

The Muni Funding Working Group will review detailed options in the following categories and will recommend a suite of options designed to reduce the funding gap.

- (I) Efficiency Improvements: streamline systems and processes to decrease operating costs.
- Service Cuts: reduce service to decrease operating costs.
- **Revenue Enhancements**: increase fees, revenue, or taxes to increase overall revenue.
- Service Enhancements: enhance services to win voter support for new revenue.

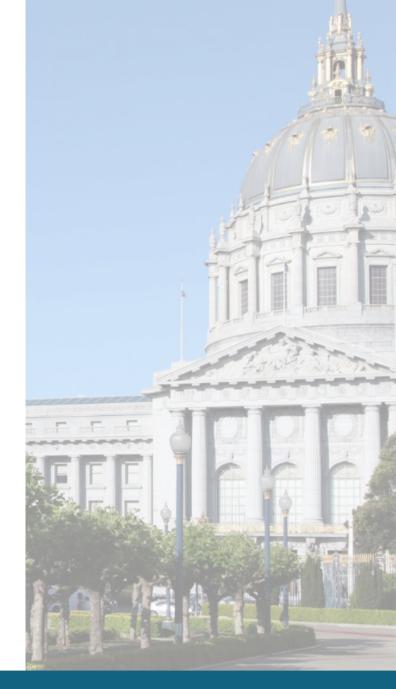

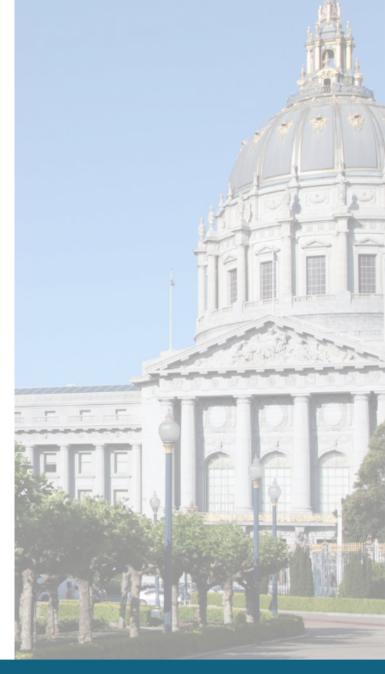

In Progress Efficiency Options

Options

The Muni Funding Working Group will review detailed options in the following categories and will recommend a suite of options designed to reduce the funding gap.

- **Efficiency Improvements:** streamline systems and processes to decrease operating costs.
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- SFMTA has improved efficiency reducing spending since FY18-19 by 16%, adjusted for inflation. However, even these reductions are not keeping pace with deficit growth.
- SFMTA continues to become more efficient, with on-going efforts highlighted in the following slides.
- Information on on-going efficiency projects is included for context and does not require further action from this group.



Hiring Slowdown

- FY24 actuals were higher than anticipated because budget was based on previous pace of hiring.
- The SFMTA has become more efficient at hiring.
- Based on this, we are slowing down hiring to see how separations and salary savings are adjusting.

Next steps:

Active monitoring throughout FY25



Work Order Efficiencies

- Services of other departments or "work orders" are 8.5% of the entire SFMTA budget or \$123M in FY25.
 - Work order budgets have grown at an average of 7.75% per year since FY18
 - Work orders have exceeded budgeted amounts by an average of 6.1% or \$5.6M each year since FY18.
- Opportunity: Decreased work order commitments could free up funding to maintain service
- Challenges: Funding for other City departments may be impacted by reduced work orders requested by SFMTA.
- **Next steps**: SFMTA to assess workorders and may reduce or identify services that could be brought in house to achieve cost savings.



Fiscal Monitoring Efficiencies

- Strengthen expenditure monitoring by implementing monthly budget monitoring for labor and non-labor spending
- Enhance monitoring of labor actuals to ensure costs are fully charged to capital projects
- Ensure legal costs are charged to capital projects by collaborating with City Attorney to restructure billing structure

Estimated Financial Impact: Savings would range depending on the initiative. For example, charging City Attorney invoices to projects may result in approximately \$500k-\$1 million in operational cost savings per year.



Energy Efficiencies

- Agency power expenditure is 1.5% of the entire SFMTA budget or \$22.2M in FY25.
 - Power Expenditures have nearly doubled in the past 5 years.
 - Local power sources (Hetch Hetchy Power and PG&E) are projected to grow in cost per kilowatt hour by an average of 6.3% per year through 2034.
- **Opportunity**: Decreased utility expenses could free up funding to maintain service.
- Next steps: The FY25 Agency Efficiency Project will replace old electric and gas fixtures, pumps, and heaters and is projected to reduce SFMTA energy use by 5%.
 - Capital Costs are \$1.3 million in FY25 and FY26
 - The project annual deficit reduction ranges from \$1.3M to \$1.7M starting in FY26



Approved Muni Forward Projects

- Already approved Muni Forward projects approved but not fully implemented including
 - 22 Filmore 16th Street Improvement Project
 - L Taraval Improvement Project
 - Permanent infrastructure for installed quick-builds (29 Sunset, 38 Geary, J Church, K Ingleside, M Ocean View)
 - J Church, K Ingleside, M Ocean View quick-builds
 - 5 Fulton

Estimated Financial Impact: \$5-10 million per year saved by implementing past Muni Forward projects (conservative estimate)



Efficiency Improvements

What efficiency improvements are under discussion for the Muni Funding Working Group?

Options that:

- Require a significant policy change or operational tradeoff
- Require some political buy-in or public support
- Require a change in local or state law
- Has a significant financial impact ranging from \$1 million to \$10 million



Efficiency Improvements

What efficiency options we will review for your input today?

Options	Cost Savings	Notes
Accelerated Work on Muni Forward	\$5 million	starting as soon as FY27
HOV lanes on State highways	\$700,000 to \$1 million	starting as soon as FY28
Mailed Parking Citations	~ \$740,000	possible start date FY27
Automated Parking Enforcement	\$3.5m - \$7.2m	possible start date FY28

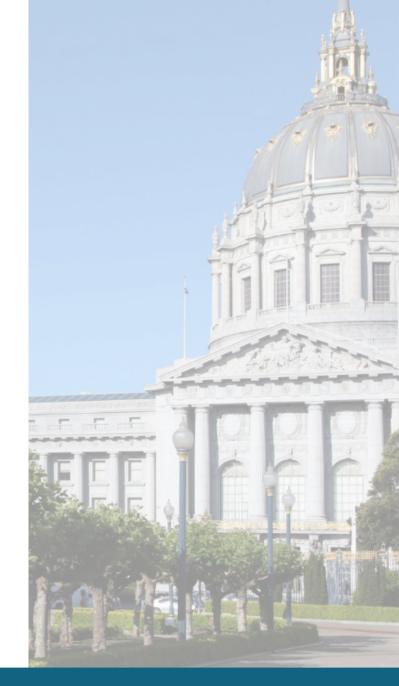

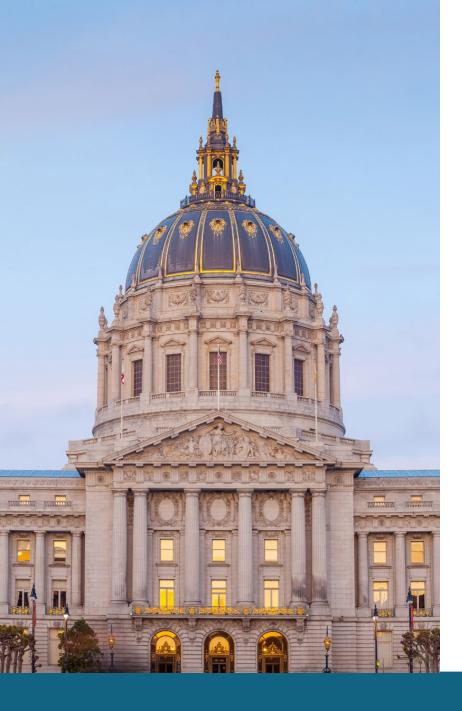
