


WHOWE ARE

WHO WSERVE

We serve 3,000+ veterans in the San Francisco Bay Area every year. The majority are experiencing homelessness, extremely low-income, older than 55, and/or have a disability.

91%

are low - income

based on HUD guidelines.

56%

are veterans of color

with 41% identifying as Black.

44%

experienced homelessness

averaging **3.2 years** before seeking services.

62%

are diagnosed with disabling conditions

like PTSD and TBI.



ARRIERSO CARE OR VETERANS

vets are <u>not</u> taken care of by the VA or federal ograms.

ultural and bureaucratic barriers prevent many terans from accessing VA healthcare and benefits. ental health issues — often with co-occuring bstance use — are the primary cause cited for melessness among unsheltered veterans.

SD and depression rates are higher for underserved eterans: LGBTQ, women, senior, and Black veterans.




LGBTQ+ Veterans

2x more likely to experience depression than non-LGBTQ veterans.



Senior Veterans (65+)

2x as likely to have major depressive disorder compared to non-veteran seniors.



Women Veterans

Higher PTSD rates than both male veterans and non-veteran men and women.

Black Veterans

Military-related PTSD rates are 2x higher than in white veterans.
