Re: Temporary Art Activations on Basketball Courts and Great Highway

The Recreation and Parks Department (RPD) is initiating a series of art activations related to the following events:

- (1) Murals on RPD basketball courts in celebration of the NBA All Star Game in San Francisco on February 16, 2025; and
- (2) Art activations on the Upper Great Highway when it is permanently closed to cars following passage of Prop K. The intent of these activations is to transform the roadway to a recreational promenade, creating a fun and exciting destination with programming and activities that changes on a regular basis.

To facilitate an expedited review and approval of the multiple art installations, we request that the Commission authorize the Director of Cultural Affairs to approve the many art projects anticipated by this program for a period of one year.

Background on Prop K and Upper Great Highway Proposal

Prop K passed on December 5, 2024, with 54% of the vote. It requires the City to transform the Upper Great Highway to a permanent 24/7 recreational promenade for walking, biking, rolling and more. This supersedes the previously legislated Great Highway Pilot, which was to end December 31, 2025, with submittal of recommendations to the BOS regarding a preferred configuration. Further, the Great Highway Extension south of Sloat Blvd is also slated to close to vehicular traffic as part of the SFPUC's Ocean Beach Climate Change Adaptation Project. With Prop K's passage, the Great Highway Extension's southbound lanes will no longer be needed, and will likely close to vehicular traffic simultaneously with UGH's closure.

In addition to supporting traffic changes, additional infrastructure such as benches and garbage cans, signage and dune revegetation, the Recreation and Parks Department - in conjunction with community partners like the Friends of Great Highway Park and Building 180 - in order to enliven the new park with art and other activations, including:

- Temporary Public Art
 - Street murals at 8 major intersections:
 - Lincoln, Judah, Lawton, Noriega, Pacheco, Rivera, Taraval, Vicente
 - Placemaking Murals at 3 intersections:
 - Noriega, Judah, Sloat, Taraval or Vicente. Note these locations are subject to change. The idea is to prioritize retail corridors, transit lines and in the case of Sloat, a major node with vehicular access to the beach.
 - Bathroom wall murals at 2 locations Judah & Taraval
 - Sculptures at multiple locations
 - Wave Heart, Rock Spinner, Ocean Calling, Giraffes (near Zoo)

- Recreation/Active use
 - o Classes (recurring Yoga, fitness, dance, tai chi, etc.)
 - o Mobile Rec
 - Other Games (Bean bag toss, Foursquare, hopscotch)
 - Guided walking tours
- Music Performances
 - Scheduled performances, such as the existing Second Sunday Serenades program and seasonal events such as Friday Jazz Happy Hour concerts featuring local musicians.





Funding

Funding for art activations will be provided by multiple private sources via Friends of Great Highway Park and Building 180. Interim funding projections for planned installations include approximately \$186,000 for murals and up to \$448,000 for sculptures, the latter funded by the Sijbrandij Foundation. For reference, Friends of Great Highway Park is a neighborhood based 501(c)(3) nonprofit that has activated the pilot Great Highway Park since 2021, including recurring community events like art pop-ups (in partnership with a local art gallery, the Great Highway Gallery). Building 180 is a women-owned art production and consulting agency with extensive experience in public art in San Francisco, including with ground murals on JFK Promenade. Rec Park


is coordinating with these organizations on maintenance plans to ensure the art continues to enrich the park experience for the duration of their temporary installment.

While no final decision have been made on pieces or locations, RPD has worked closely with neighbors and artists and is considering some of the following installations:






BACKGROUND

The Art on Market Street Poster Series has commissioned new artwork by artists on an annual basis since 1992. Each year, the Program commissions four artists to create a new body of work that responds to a theme specific to San Francisco. Each poster series is on view for approximately three months and consists of at least 6 unique images that are printed at 68 inches high by 47 ¼ inches wide and installed in 15 bus shelters on Market Street between Steuart St. and 7th St. Due to discussions with SFMTA related to availability of shelters and subsequent timeline constraints, SFAC proposes a revised approach for 2025.





From a slender shaft rising from the ground, a busy network of branches expands outwards, dividing and sub-dividing to form a sphere of delicate, plant like tendrils. Composed of hundreds upon hundreds of bundled and tide steel wires, the supplier brings to mind ownitess visual references, from natural formations such as nerve cells and tree roots to the densely interconnected virtual structures of information networks.

Ruth Asswa was a prollife and important Bay Area artist. Born in Norwalk, Califoria to Japanese parents, Asawa found herself interested in art from an early age. As a teenager, she managed to continue her studies of drawing and painting despite her family's internment with other Japanese Americans during Will. After the war, Asawa attended the accidence Black Mountain College in North Carolina, where her instructors included such influential artists as Merce Cunningham, Buckminster Fuller, and Joseph Albers.

Asawa later traveled throughout Mexico, where she studied crocheting methods used by traditional basket weavers—an experience that was to play a significant role in her artistic development. By the 1950s, Asawa was exhibiting widely, in shows at STMOMA, the Oasland Museum, and the Whitney, Unitide is a representative example of Asawa's with from this period, in which basket wearing techniques are employed to produce intricate organic structures from branched and ted strands of wire. Rich with associations, Asawa's art continues to resonate

BACKGROUND (CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECT OVERVIEW)

The San Francisco Public Library (SFPL) has provided funds to the Arts Commission to commission an artist to partner with the Association of the Ramaytush Ohlone in the creation of a temporary vinyl mural that conveys the importance of intergenerational knowledge and wisdom sharing from an Indigenous perspective. The temporary mural will be installed in the atrium of SFPL's Main Branch, above a staircase leading to the Fisher Children's Center on the Library's 2nd floor.

ART OPPORTUNITY

- Temporary mural will measure a maximum of 600 sq ft and be installed on a wall above the stairway leading from the <u>Library's</u> central atrium to the Fisher Children's Center on the 2nd floor.
- The mural design will be printed on and installed as high-quality vinyl with UV lamination coating.
- Artwork will be on display for a minimum of one year beginning Fall 2025.

PROJECT GOALS

- Artwork will emphasize the importance of the sharing of knowledge and wisdom in all forms across generations from an Indigenous perspective.
- Artist will have a meaningful connection to and/or direct experience collaborating with Indigenous communities in the development and implementation of their previous artwork design(s).
- Artist will partner directly with the Association of the Ramaytush Ohlone on the development and implementation of the artwork concept and final design.

ARTWORK BUDGET

Total Project Budget: \$87,549 Total Artwork Budget: \$52,000

Artist Contract: \$17,000

Artist Contract will be for design only, and is inclusive of all artist's fees, as well as associated expenses for design and consultation during fabrication and installation.

Implementation Allocation: \$35,000

Vinyl fabrication, installation, maintenance, and deinstallation will be managed by SFAC under separate contract.

ARTIST RECRUITMENT APPROACH AND ELIGIBILITY

Arts Commission staff will post a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) which is open to professional practicing artists who reside in the United States. Recruitment will focus on artists whose practices align to the specific goals of the project. Artists will be asked to address their meaningful connection to and/or direct experience collaborating with Indigenous communities in their applications, which the review panel will be instructed to consider in their application evaluation.

ARTIST SELECTION PROCESS

After the application deadline, the Arts Commission staff will screen applications to establish the pool of artists meeting the minimum eligibility requirements, which are professional practicing artists who reside in the United States. The eligible applications will be presented to a review panel consisting of one (1) SFAC staff, one (1) representative of the Association of the Ramaytush Ohlone, one (1) outside arts professional and one (1) representative of the SFPL, who will review the applications and recommend one artist for the project. The recommended artist will be presented to the Arts Commission for review and approval. The Visual Arts Committee (VAC) and Commission meetings are open to the public.





- A Request for Qualifications was issued **September 4**, **2024 October 7**, **2024**.
- The Arts Commission received 774 submissions.

The panel reviewed the qualifications of each applicant and scored them using the following criteria:

- Voting consisted of "Yes/No" majority votes based on the criteria of Artistic Merit, Relevant Skills and Experience, and Appropriateness to the Goals of the Project and the Civic Art Collection.
- Each artist was scored YES or NO by each panelist.
- Artists scoring a total of 3 or 4 YESES were advanced to the SFO Terminal 3 West Prequalified Artist Pool.

93 applicants scored within a competitive range to be included in the SFO Terminal 3 West Prequalified Artist Pool.






